John Lavan Kirby

John Kirby, who died on 29 June 2002, was the Wiltshire Record Society's Honorary General Editor from 1982 to 1988. Born in 1912, be was brought up in Blackheath and attended Colfe's School before going to Exeter College, Oxford, where he took honours in Modern History in 1934. He was later also awarded an M.A. by London University, and went on to become a Fellow of the Library Association, of the Society of Archivists, of the Society of Antiquaries, and of the Royal Historical Society. In the later 1930s, after he had completed a London M.A. thesis in 1936 on the medieval Hungerford family, he worked first for the London advertising agency Saward, Baker & Co. in Chancery Lane, where Dorothy Sayers also worked, and then for Reuters. During the war he served in the intelligence unit at Bletchley Park, along with others who later achieved great distinction and celebrity. After the war, having attended the London School of Librarianship and received training in archives, he was briefly County Archivist in Cumberland and then became an assistant librarian at the Institute of Historical Research, University of London. There, among other things, he wrote sections of the Victoria County History, from the 1950s contributing 23 articles to the histories of Wiltshire, Cambridgeshire, Middlesex and Staffordshire. From the Institute he moved to Marylebone Public Library before becoming librarian of the History Faculty Library of the University of Oxford. On his retirement he returned to London and began a highly productive period as an editor for the Public Record Office, producing a Calendar of Signet Letters, 1399-1422, and four substantial volumes of the Calendar of Inquisitions post mortem.

Anyone who has been involved in editing historical records will appreciate the skill, the learning, and the amount of work which John put into the general editorship of our Society's annual volumes, a task which he took on at short notice to fill a sudden and unexpected gap. Besides overseeing the publication of volumes 38 to 44, he found time and energy for two volumes which be himself edited, *Wiltshire Feet of Fines, 1377–1509* (vol. 41), and *The Hungerford Cartulary* (vol. 49). After he had retired from the editorship it was altogether fitting that the Society elected him as one of four honorary life members, together with Marjorie Reeves, Jack Pafford, and George Ramsay. Until a few years ago he came regularly, with his wife Heather, to our annual meetings, where old friends were always delighted to meet a man behind whose unassuming modesty lay wide-ranging knowledge and great ability.

INTRODUCTION

The Hungerford Cartulary, published by the Society in 1994 as volume 49 in its series, is an edition of the cartulary belonging to the earl of Radnor and deposited in the Wiltshire and Swindon Record Office (W.R.O. 490/1470). A second cartulary, which was formerly owned by the Hobhouse family and is now in the Somerset Record Office at Taunton (S.R.O. DD/SAS/H/348/1), is calendared below, along with the fragment of a third cartulary which belongs to the earl of Radnor and has been deposited in the Wiltshire and Swindon Record Office (W.R.O. 490/1469). The Hobhouse Cartulary complements the Radnor Cartulary, the contents of the two cartularies overlapping to a considerable extent. The introduction to volume 49 serves in most respects as an introduction to the present edition.

The Hobhouse Cartulary is an unusually large book of 341 parchment folios measuring 450 × 300 mm., besides a fly-leaf at the front, surviving from an early binding. It was rebound in the early 19th century, and the materials from that binding include part of a deed of 1808. A second rebinding in 1937–8, under the supervision of the British Museum library,¹ retained the ancient heavy oak boards, replaced the leather half-binding and added two new fly-leaves at the front and one at the back. Some of the earlier material and documents relating to the rebinding are gathered, along with notes from and about the cartulary, in a book kept with the cartulary in the box made for it at the time.

The present binding makes it difficult to see the separate quires or gatherings, but the first 31 are numbered, in the lower right-hand margin of the first folio of each, with roman figures i to xxxv, quires iii, xxii, xxiv and xxxi being missing or the numbers not used. The quires are typically of twelve folios: their present arrangement is shown below, on page xvii. Some of the folios are numbered at the bottom right-hand corner with roman figures that show their position within the quire; trimming of the folios has removed the lower part of some such numbers, and it may be that many more folios were once so numbered. The quire numbered xiii, which now has only six folios, begins in the middle of an entry, the preceding folio (f. 112) ending with the completion of a charter, and the second folio in that quire has the folio-number v; it seems that the first three folios, and presumably the last three, have been lost, the quire once containing the

standard number of twelve folios,¹ and that the quires were numbered after the leaves were lost. Quire xxxv is followed by four unnumbered quires containing entries made after 1470, twenty years or more later than those of the main part of the cartulary. Five folios were in 1937–8 bound in between quires vii and viii, where they had previously lain loose:² the first two of those folios, in poor condition, may belong elsewhere in the cartulary, possibly at ff. 268–9, as the other three certainly do, being numbered as ff. 270–2 according to the later numbering, and where they once were ff. 273–4 have been partly cut.

The numbering of the folios within the volume uses arabic figures of an early form, running from 1 to 320. Folios 1-3 have lost their numbers, the corners having suffered from damp which has left the numbers on folios 4-6 very faint. The numbers were added evidently after at least some of the last four quires had been added and after some folios had been removed, perhaps when the quires were first bound together. Some folios, particularly blank ones, were not then numbered, and, along with the folios from 321 on, were given pencilled numbers apparently in the 19th century; nine remain unnumbered. There are gaps and overlaps in the numbering: between f. 24, which is blank, and f. 27 there is a single folio, blank and unnumbered; between ff. 28 and 32 are only two folios, blank and unnumbered; after the blank and unnumbered ff. 53 and 54 are five misplaced folios, as mentioned above; between ff. 165 and 169 are only two folios, blank and unnumbered; f. 208, blank and numbered only in pencil, is followed by the similar f. 212, omitting numbers 209-11; between ff. 231 and 232 is a folio (in its rightful place) numbered 231A in pencil; f. 267 is followed by f. 273; the blank f. 285, numbered in pencil, is followed by f. 287; the pencilled numbers of the last 27 folios include 322a and omit 343.3

Before the folios were numbered consecutively, three folios between folios 154 and 155 were removed from the cartulary; they are now bound, in the wrong order, into a book of evidences of the reign of Henry VII containing 30 folios, otherwise all of paper, in the Hampshire Record Office (ref. 7M54/207/1), where in 1993 they were identified by Miss Janet Stevenson

(Mrs. R. F. Hunnisett).¹ Their original position in the cartulary is clear: the first entry completes the last entry on f. 154 and the numbering of the entries is continuous.²

Folios 24, [25], [29–30], [53–4], [93], 165, [166–7], 192, 204, 208, 212, 267, 285, 305-6, 316 and 347 are blank, as are the versos of ff. 23, 45, 90, 92, 149, 191, 198, 203, 207, 249, 264, 266–7, 278, 284, 304, 312, 315 and 346. Some of the blank folios are at the end of a quire, though in several places an entry runs from one quire to another. The rectos of ff. 10, 257 and 259 are also blank. Nearly all the folios are faintly ruled with margins and a variable number of lines, averaging 46. The front fly-leaf on the verso has, in a medieval hand, a rough list of contents. The back fly-leaf is blank. On the inside of the front cover is the book-plate of the Rt. Hon. Henry Hobhouse with his coat of arms; at the top of the page is a note recording that the book was presented to the Somerset Archaeological Society in September 1911 by Hobhouse. The cartulary had passed to him from his uncle, Edmund Hobhouse (1817–1904), sometime bishop of Nelson, New Zealand, who may have added the pencilled folio-numbers and pencilled notes in the cartulary, usually interpreting the dates recorded in the documents. The cartulary had belonged to John Jenkyns (d. 1824), vicar of Evercreech, Somerset, whose forebears had been clients of the Thynne family when the Hungerford estates were broken up c. 1685. Jenkyns left the cartulary to his nephew Henry Hobhouse (1776–1854), the bishop's father.³

Like the Radnor Cartulary, the Hobhouse Cartulary, or an original from which it was copied, was probably made for Walter Lord Hungerford (d. 1449): the only documents in it of a date later than 1449 are four of 1459–60 on f. 132, which were added, as is clear from the difference in the hand, after the main part of the cartulary had been written, and the additional documents on ff. 317–46 relating to the concerns of Margaret, Lady Hungerford and Botreaux. As in the Radnor Cartulary, the deeds in the Hobhouse Cartulary are arranged in groups according to the places concerned, as shown in the list overleaf. The list in a medieval hand on the original fly-leaf of the cartulary is similar.

Nearly two thirds of the entries in the main part of the Hobhouse Cartulary, 916 out of 1,424 on ff. 1–316, duplicate entries in the Radnor

Cartulary which have already been calendared in volume 49. They are represented below simply by cross-references to that volume, as are the six deeds in the third, fragmentary cartulary that are calendared in volume 49. The Hobhouse Cartulary includes all but 32 of the 950 entries in the Radnor Cartulary. Although the edition of the Radnor Cartulary omitted the deeds relating to the Farleigh Hungerford chantry, the present edition includes such deeds (nos. 1269–80) since Canon J. E. Jackson's *Guide to Farleigh Hungerford*, in which they are calendared and translated, is not widely accessible.

The fragmentary third cartulary (W.R.O. 490/1469) comprises 15 unbound parchment folios, 285 × 225 mm., damaged and much repaired, and in many places illegible, within a parchment folder. Written in a neat and regular hand, the MS. has a space, two lines deep and about 2 mm. wide, for the initial letter of each entry, which has never been added. The first six folios form a quire of three folded sheets apparently without holes for stitching, the seventh is a single loose sheet, and the remaining eight form a quire of four folded sheets, again apparently without holes for stitching. They contain 37 deeds, of which six duplicate entries in the Radnor Cartulary, relating to 28 places in Wiltshire, 4 in Devon, and 13 in Cornwall. The earliest of the deeds are of 1421, and more than half are of a date later than 1449, the year in which Walter Lord

Hungerford died. Since the latest of the deeds is of 1470 the cartulary may have been made for Margaret, Lady Hungerford and Botreaux (d. 1478).¹

Included below as an appendix, from the records of the earl of Radnor, now in the Wiltshire and Swindon Record Office (W.R.O. 490/1471), are notes on the legal title of Walter Hungerford (d. 1540), evidently compiled between 1516, when that Walter's grandfather died, and 1529, when George Hastings, Lord Hastings, became earl of Huntingdon. It is a single stitched quire of sixteen unnumbered paper pages, 305 × 225 mm., in a fragile condition.

The calendar below follows in all important respects the editorial practices and style adopted for volume 49.

For this she quitclaimed 40s. rent from a fulling mill in Marlborough. Ralph his ancestor held, he said, these premises in his fee and right before the time of the peace of King Henry, the king's father, and the right descended to Roger his son and heir, Ralph his son and heir and so to Robert his son and heir. Such was his right.

Thomas came by his attorney and denied Robert's right. The premises, he claimed, were formerly held by Walter de Lacy who gave them to Ralph and his wife Parnel, Walter's daughter, in frank marriage. Ralph and Parnel had issue Roger. Parnel survived Ralph and enfeoffed Thomas. In the king's court at Salisbury on 30 Sept. 1281 (morrow of Michaelmas 9 Edward I) before Solomon de Roff and his fellow justices itinerant a fine¹ was levied between Parnel and Thomas by which Parnel recognised the right of Thomas by her gift to hold with warranty to himself and his heirs of her and her heirs, rendering a bunch of roses at Midsummer. This fine was made before the second Statute of Westminster, when it was lawful for these tenements to be given in frank marriage or fee tail. Thomas seeks judgement whether Robert can plead in this case.

Robert said that he should not be excluded from claiming in this case: by the statute of Gloucester it is provided that someone is not excluded by a father's deed from claiming his mother's inheritance, and the second statute of Westminster implied that similarly someone is not excluded by a mother's deed from claiming his mother's inheritance.

Thomas said that the heir was excluded even though nothing descended to him by hereditary right, and that Robert, as Parnel's heir, ought to warrant him.

Afterwards Robert failed to appear, so Thomas went sine die and Robert and his sureties are in mercy. Rotulo cclxiiijto.

They gave them by an indented charter to Beatrice and the heirs of her body, with successive remainders to Thomas Drewe senior and the heirs of his body, to John Berford, brother of Beatrice, and the heirs of his body, and to the

right heirs of Beatrice. On 2 Oct. (Sat. after Michaelmas) 1361 (35 Edward III) at Durnford Beatrice gave the charters to Emma for safe-keeping. Beatrice died and the manors descended to Edith, who now asks for the charters as daughter and heir. The charters were several times requested by Edith, and after her marriage by Edith and Richard Mawardyne, and they were unjustly refused. They say that they have suffered deterioration and damage to the extent of £50.

Emma by Nicholas Wotton her attorney says that she does not retain the charter of Beatrice to John Doget and Robert Bostere as alleged. She proffers the indented charter, which came to her on the death of her husband Thomas Drewe, in court, and says that one Laurence Dreu has brought a writ against her for detaining that charter, which he claims as son and heir of Thomas Drewe. Laurence comes and says that the indented charter ought to be delivered to him and not to Richard and Edith. Eventually the jury finds for Richard and Edith, awarding £10 damages to them against Laurence, and Emma delivers to them the indented charter, which is recited:

Walter, William, Richard and Robert Longe come by John Gylys their attorney and deny Thomas Dru's right, protesting that there was no such gift as he supposed. Placebo and Dirige, on 2 Dec. and solemn mass and seven other masses by the seven chaplains on 3 Dec. in Farleigh church for the souls of Thomas Hungerford, knight, and Joan his consort, Walter's parents, and for the good state of Walter and Katherine his wife and their sons and daughters

And because the said John de Scoter [sii], the warden, receives of the said lands, sown in the field, 23½ a. wheat, 10 a. barley, 8½ a. oats, 2½ a. beans, 3 a. peas and vetch besides the crop of the same, in all worth £8, on his departure he shall demise as much similarly sown to his successor. The charter is tripartite, one part to remain with the donor, one with the warden and one with the bishop.

Pleas of quo warranto before John de Metyngham and Geoffrey de Sandiacre, justices itinerant, in Gloucestershire. Nicholas de Valers comes by his attorney, and by his bill claims view of frankpledge in his manor of Down Ampney and freely agrees to answer without a writ. He says that Henry III was seised of the manor with the royal liberties belonging to the Crown; he enfeoffed his son Edmund in the manor with all its liberties, and Edmund enfeoffed Nicholas in the manor with all its liberties. When Godfrey de Craucombe held the manor, before it was in the king's seisin, he had view of frankpledge, and Henry III confirmed Edmund's grant by his charter, which Nicholas proffers and which attests this, given at Westminster 27 Jan. 1271 [above, no. 1387]. Asked if the whole vill is of his fee, Nicholas says yes; asked if he has judicial rights he says that he has tumbril only; asked of what articles he inquires at the view he says of those of which the sheriff inquires at his tourn etc. For the king, William Inge says that what has been said for Nicholas ought not to be sufficient warrant in that he claims the liberty from feoffment by Edmund, who does not have power to enfeoff with view of frankpledge, and the king's confirmation ought not to assist him because no Crown liberty is included. Judgement to be given a month from Michaelmas before the treasurer and barons of the Exchequer, when Nicholas comes, adjourned to the quindene of Easter, when he comes by his attorney, and adjourned successively to the quindene of Michaelmas, the quindene of Easter and the octave of Michaelmas.

viii. daily in the chapel the chaplains are to say, together if possible, matins before the 8th hour before noon and vespers between prime and the ringing of the last bell for vespers, and one chaplain about the eighth hour before noon is to celebrate masses as follows, Sunday the Trinity, Monday the name of Jesus, Tuesday the Holy Spirit, Wednesday the requiem, Thursday Corpus Christi, Friday the five wounds of Christ, Saturday the Virgin Mary of the office 'Salva sancta parens' etc. and otherwise of the Virgin according to the use of Sarum, the other chaplain about the tenth hour before noon is to celebrate the mass of whatever day of the week, except on Monday that of the Virgin Mary of the office 'Rosate celi desuper' etc., remembering in the mass the persons and souls written above and [two half-lines left blank] and all benefactors of the chantry, and is to say daily except on Christmas day, Easter and Whit Sunday 'Placebo' and 'Dirige';

ix. daily immediately after vespers the chaplains are to say, genuflecting before the image of Christ in the chapel, a prayer (which is set out in full), then moving to the image of the Virgin, a prayer [etc.];

x. the chaplain are to live in a house in the close to be called the house of the chaplains of Robert Lord Hungerford's chantry;

xi. the chaplains may be absent for a month each year, but not both at the same time and not without the dean's leave;

xii. a chaplain is not to hold any other benefice or office;

xiii. when illness prevents a chaplain from saying mass he is to say or have said one nocturn each day during Lent and each day outside Lent, except at the principal feasts, two nocturns of the psalter of David;

xiv. if illness prevents both chaplains from celebrating mass the dean and chapter may provide for one mass each day from the chaplains' common stipend;

xv. the chaplains are to receive for their stipends a yearly rent of 24 marks, 12 marks each, and 20s. yearly for the rent of their house and 13s. 4d. for bread, wine and wax for celebrating mass;

xvi. neither the dean and chapter nor the chaplains are to use for any other purpose the money which is to be put in the common chest for the repair of the chapel and its book, vestments or other things;

xvii. the chaplains are not to remit, release or exchange the said rent, or to alienate any other goods of the chantry;

xviii. there is to be another chest in the chapel, in the wall, with a lock with two keys, one for each chaplain, for the vestments, ornaments and other necessaries for the daily celebration of mass;

xix. the chaplains on Sundays and festivals are to be present in habits like those of the vicars in the choir of the cathedral at high mass, vespers and compline, and are to attend the processions on those days, when they are to celebrate mass before the time of the procession;

xx. each chaplain on admission is, in the dean's presence and touching the gospels, to take an oath (of which the words are set out), to observe the ordinances and statutes:

xxi. reserving to Margaret during her lifetime the power to alter and interpret the statutes and ordinances.

Rules made by Margaret, John Cheyne of 'Pynne' and John Mervyn, esquires. The preamble cites Edward's IV's licence of 20 Feb. 1472 to establish an almshouse for 12 poor men and a woman, with a chaplain as warden or keeper to say prayers in Heytesbury church. The rules provide for

i. the dean and chapter of Salisbury to have power to remove the warden for default;

ii. the warden to be removed for acting in certain specified ways;

iii. the warden not to be absent for more than a month at a time;

iv. the warden to appoint a deputy when he goes out of the almshouse;

v. the warden on appointment to make an inventory of the goods of the almshouse;

vi. the dean of Salisbury in his visitation of Heytesbury to visit the almshouse and have the statutes read and to punish defaults, receiving 6s. 8d., with 12d. for his clerk;

vii. the warden not to hold another benefice or office, and his successor to be presented by Margaret and after her death by the chancellor of Salisbury cathedral or, if the chancellor is not resident, by the dean and chapter;

viii. the warden on receiving another benefice to leave;

ix. the warden in obtaining or seeking another benefice to be held as removed;

x. the warden daily to sing mass in Heytesbury church for the souls of Walter Lord Hungerford and Katherine his wife, Robert Lord Hungerford their son and Margaret his wife, William Lord Botreaux and Elizabeth his wife, Margaret's parents, and their ancestors and descendants, also for John Cheyne and John Mervyn and all Christian souls; also to sing mass in the chapel of the almshouse;

xi. the chancellor of Salisbury cathedral, or if he is not resident the dean and chapter, to appoint a teacher of grammar for Heytesbury, free for all those with relatives [i.e. parents or others acting as such] whose income is less than £10;

xii. the warden to pay for bread, wine and wax out of his stipend;

xiii. the warden to pay 20s. a year to the dean and chapter, to be put aside for the upkeep of the chapel, vestments and books;

xiv. the warden's defaults to be punished by deduction from his stipend, with provision for his replacement during illness;

xvii. the removal of the poor men and the woman for ill behaviour;

xx. no man nor the woman to be absent a whole day, nor to leave the parish or the almshouse without the warden's leave;

xxi. the feeble poor to be attended by the fit poor, especially by the woman, and all to say prayers on rising and going to bed;

xxii. all when they have time to say specified prayers during the day;

xxiii. all to assemble after supper to say prayers for the dead;

xxiv. all to eat together unless ill;

xxv. those not already able to do so to be taught to say certain prayers;

xxvi. those newly admitted to bring their movable goods into the house; their livestock to be sold, half the money to be for the house and half for their own use;

xxvii. a poor man to be removed on inheriting or being promoted to 4 marks a year or more:

xxviii. a poor man on acquiring a livelihood of less than 4 marks a year to put half in the common chest, otherwise to be removed; no leper to be admitted, and one becoming leprous or otherwise infectious in the long term to be removed but to receive still his daily food and be counted one of the 12;

xxix. the woman to be sister housewife, doing the washing and attending the sick;

xxx. a common chest and a common seal;

xxxi. another chest in the parish church for books, chalices and vestments;

xxxii. the poor men at death to leave half their goods to the almshouse;

xxxiii. a gift to one of the poor men to be for his own use;

xxxiv. the distribution of the revenues of the manors of Cheverell Burnell and Cheverell Hales otherwise Great Cheverell [sc. as follows];

xxxv. the warden to have the issues of those manors, along with 33s. 4d. in Heytesbury, 40s. in Upton Scudamore, 18s. 8d. in Warminster, 24s. in Stockley by Calne, £10 8s. 8d.; and besides the allowance of £10 for himself, 20s. for his servant;²

xxxvi. an allowance for the poor's bread, with detailed provision for its variation according to the price of wheat;

xxxvii. the warden to buy clothes and shoes for the poor men and the woman; xxxviii. the woman to have 3s. 4d. a quarter for her work;

xlii. the manors of Cheverell Burnell and Cheverell not to be alienated;

xliii. the two parish priests of Heytesbury to have 7d. each a year for prayers for Walter and Katherine Hungerford and for Robert and Margaret Hungerford, the parish clerk 4d.

xliv. the ordinances to be read in Heytesbury parish church twice a year, on the Sunday before Halloween and the Sunday after Easter, by one of the parish priests, who is to have 8*d.* each time, with 4*d.* to the parish clerk for remembering the duty, to be paid by the warden;

xlv. obits in Heytesbury parish church for the souls aforesaid on Friday after Whit Sunday, for each parish priest 6d., the warden 8d., the brotherhood priest 6d., the parish clerk 4d., the two deacons 3d. each, bellringers 13d., with 13d. to 13 poor men and women of the parish, not being in the almshouse, and bread to those present to the value of 4s; and 6d. to the prebendaries for wax burning at the time of the obit;

This is the proof that the manor of Hungerford has nothing but what is parcel of the said manor, etc. Whereas Lord Hastyngs supposes that the manor of Hungerford should have in Chippenham divers messuages, lands and tenements which are not parcel of the manor, the truth is that the manor in effect is all in rent and service with little or no demesne, and was so before the Hungerfords had any interest in it, as appears by books of account.

[p. 10]. Upton Scudamore, the manor so entailed, as appears by deed enrolled and its exmplification, ready to be shown.
