INTRODUCTION

THE HISTORY OF THE SOCIETY

The Wiltshire Society, as its name implies, was a society of Wiltshiremen. Established at least as early as the first year of Cromwell's Protectorate, it was formally named the Wiltshire Society, but was more frequently referred to as the Wiltshire Feast, arising from the practice of holding an annual fund-raising dinner in London. Gentlemen who were natives of Wiltshire, living in London, Wiltshire and elsewhere, first attended a sermon (the Feast) preached by a Wiltshireman, and then a banquet. After their dinner they subscribed their quota towards the apprenticing of some poor Wiltshire child or another charitable cause directed at the native poor of Wiltshire. The little that is known of the history of this early society has been dealt with elsewhere. It appears that it had ceased to function by the start of the nineteenth century.

The modern Wiltshire Society, with whose records this volume is concerned, was formed in May 1817 and is still carrying out its charitable work today. The records of apprenticeships, contained in two volumes covering the period from 1838 to 1958, have been deposited in the Wiltshire Record Office. The whereabouts of the corresponding records for the period 1817 to 1838 are not known; records for the period 1958 to the present day are held by the Society. The contents of the two deposited apprenticeship registers form the basis of the records contained in this volume.

The first meeting of the modern Wiltshire Society was held on 14th May 1817 at the Albion Tavern, Aldersgate Street, in the City of London. Sir Bernard Hobhouse, Bart, MP, was in the chair, and, according to a report in the Salisbury and Winchester Journal,² 'At 4.0 pm a numerous and highly respectable company sat down to dinner consisting of everything the season afforded'. This initial meeting had been preceded by several notices in the same newspaper announcing the venue. Although the Times newspaper carried neither a report of this inaugural meeting, nor any advertisements for it, the Gentleman's Magazine reported the inaugural meeting thus:

Wednesday May 14, 1817. A public meeting of Noblemen and Gentlemen of Wiltshire was held this day at the Albert Tavern, for the purpose of forming an institution, the object of which is to apprentice the children of the deserving poor belonging to the county of Wiltshire, residing in London, who might otherwise be destitute of the means of acquiring a comfortable subsistence through life. The company dined together; after which several sums were contributed, and a Committee formed to carry the resolutions of the meeting into effect.

The Salisbury and Winchester Journal reported the proceedings at some length, including a lengthy speech by Sir Benjamin Hobhouse, who emphasised that the aims of the new society were to be the same as those of the Somersetshire Society; namely to: 'enable the children of the poor of the county of Wilts, residing in London, to be taught habits of industry before vice has gained an ascendancy in their minds, and the

means of a comfortable subsistence through life'. Other speakers at this inaugural meeting were Thomas Calley, MP for Cricklade, Philip Hurd Esq, of The Temple, Edward Frowd the Treasurer (*pro tempore*), and the Duke of Somerset, who agreed to be patron. Undoubtedly these gentlemen were among the committee formed to set up the first meeting.

The First Annual Report of the Society, under the patronage of the Duke of Somerset, was reported in the *Devizes and Wiltshire Gazette*. This report contained a summary of the objects of the Society which were decided at the inaugural meeting:

The object of the Wiltshire Society is to raise a fund by donations and by annual subscriptions, for the purpose of apprenticing the children of poor Wiltshire parents, resident in London, or within the Bills of Mortality; and also for lending to such as shall be so apprenticed, if their conduct shall have been meritorious, a certain sum of money at the expiration of their apprenticeship, to establish them in business.

The Fourth Annual meeting of the Society was held on 12th May 1820 at the same venue, the Albion House Tavern. A notice in the *Devizes and Wiltshire Gazette* announced the forthcoming meeting. It named Thomas G. Estcourt, MP, as the chairman, and listed the following as stewards: Ambrose Awdry, Esq; John Pearse, Esq, MP; Rev W.L. Bowles; Edward Phillips, Esq; T.C. Estcourt, Esq, MP; Charles Lewis Phipps, Esq; Richard Debary, Esq; William Salmon, Esq; Richard Hetley, Esq; Dr Stoddart; Robert Isherwood, Esq; Ernley Warriner, Esq; E.B. Kemble, Esq; William Pole Tylney Long Wellesley, Esq; Henry Merewether, Esq. Tickets for the meeting were a guinea, and could be obtained from the stewards or from John Britton, Hon. Secretary, of Burton Cottage, Burton St, Tavistock Square.

The same newspaper' carried a report of the meeting which opened:

In drawing the attention of our readers to the fourth Public Meeting of this excellent Institution, the last of which took place in May 1819, we venture to predict, that as the objects of the charity become understood and duly appreciated, so will the list of subscriptions be increased, and the patrons augmented. The benevolent object of this Society is to raise a fund by donations and subscriptions, for the purpose of apprenticing the children of poor Wiltshire parents, resident in London: and in furtherance of this object, two youths have been apprenticed during the last year, and the sum of £12 10s. paid to the masters with each, in compliance with the rules of the Society, which thus becomes the foster parent to the friendless, conducting the deserving and zealous youth into a path by which he may travel to prosperity, rescuing him from the evils of idleness and vice, and affording him a fair opportunity of becoming a useful and valuable member of the community. To countenance and give effect to an Institution like this, several gentlemen, about 120 in number, met together to dine, on Friday last, at the Albion Tavern, Aldersgate Street, embracing most of the principal gentlemen resident in, or connected with, the county of Wilts.

The report goes on to detail the events of the evening which, after the meal, was taken up with a succession of speeches and toasts. The reponse by John Britton, the Hon. Secretary, to a toast to him proposed by the chairman T. G. Estcourt Esq. MP, contains a clue to the beginnings of the Society:

The zealous Secretary then adverted to, and lamented the absence of Sir Benjamin Hobhouse, to whose excellent advice and influence was primarily indebted for its first meeting, and to whom this, as well as many other charitible institutions were under great and lasting obligations. - Though serious indisposition prevented the worthy Baronet's

presence on this occasion, Mr Britton could assure the company, that his mind would be actively awake to the proceedings of the day, and to the flattering prospects held out by this numerous and effective meeting.

The earliest surviving annual report (1823) states that:

The Committee have to report, that since the last Anniversary, four additional children have been admitted as Apprentices under this Institution; and that the petitions of other Candidates, are now under their consideration. They have been enabled by the continued support of the Friends of the Charity, to purchase a further sum of $\mathcal{L}200$, $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent; so that the realized fund of the Society at present consists of 4 per cent Stock ($\mathcal{L}1029$ 5s.0d.); $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent do. ($\mathcal{L}300$ 0s.0d.); in the Banker's Hands ($\mathcal{L}27$ 0s.0d.).

As the Committee conceive, that the objects of the Society can only be effectually secured, by means of a permanent fund, independent of incidental contributions, they entreat the Friends of the Institution, in order to compass that end, not to relax in their efforts which have hitherto been so successfully exerted.

The yield on the above investment was of the order of £50 per annum, and it was this sum which determined the number of placements. At that date the Society had fourteen boys in the course of their apprenticeships and three further candidates were listed. Only two of these boys were actually placed. At 1996 values the stated investment funds of the Society would have been approximately £54,000.8 The list of governors and contributors numbered 269, and included many notable names from Wiltshire and the surrounding counties. From the list of apprentices it is clear that the first apprentice was actually placed in January 1819.

The president for 1823 was Sir John Dugdale Astley, Bart, MP for Wiltshire, and the committee comprised: Thomas Aston, jun, Esq; Joseph Pitt jun, Esq; William G. Hayter, Esq; Thomas Poynder jun, Esq; James Harding, Esq; Joseph Pullen, Esq; Robert Isherwood, Esq; George Reed, Esq; E.B. Kemble, Esq; Francis Newman Rogers, Esq; Edward Montagu, Esq; Robert Sutton, Esq; John Britton, Esq, FSA (Hon. Secretary); Philip Hurd, Esq (Treasurer). The laws and regulations as agreed in 1817 were also included in the prospectus for 1823, and indeed for each succeeding year of publication; these are reproduced as Appendix A.

Originally the stated aim of the Society was the apprenticing of children resident in London, but in 1859 the rules were changed to admit children resident in Wiltshire. In the Annual Report for 1860 the Committee remarked on this change in the rules:

The Committee refer with pleasure to the election, in April last, of a candidate, resident in the County of Wilts, who became eligible in consequence of the altered rule of the Society. It happens that only one County Candidate came forward, although the Committee had so arranged to elect two, having for that object increased the number of Apprentices from ten to eleven. They now feel doubly entitled to exhort the County subscribers to greater efforts in aid of the Charity, so as to augment the number of County Apprentices.

The number of apprentices to be elected was fixed each year according to the available funds. Seven apprentices were to be taken from residents in London or within the Metropolitan Board of Works, originally defined as the 'Limits of the Bills of Mortality'. The remainder were to be taken either from London or the county of Wiltshire. Applications were received by the Society in January of each year and the

Committee examined each candidate. The application was often prepared by a solicitor and supported by references from the local vicar, or the child's teacher, as to his or her suitability for an apprenticeship.

One such application has been unearthed in a Wiltshire solicitor's collection. The candidate was Frank Biggs (665) and the petition was made by his mother Sarah Biggs, (formerly Sarah Holder of Lacock). The parents were living in Holloway, north London, but their petition was made through the Calne solicitor Edward R. Henly. The petition listed the other children in the family and the parents' total means, and it was accompanied by copies of the mother's birth and marriage certificates, and the son's birth certificate. It was a necessary condition that a candidate was born within wedlock.

Details of successful candidates, together with copies of their respective claims, were then forwarded to each governor, who could exercise one or more votes for candidates determined by his qualification. A subscription entitled a governor to one vote for each candidate to be elected. Every additional donation, subscription, or payment that a governor made entitled him to additional votes. Two of these candidate lists have survived in a parish chest, and they make interesting genealogical reading. For example the following, from the 1852 list:

Bath, Edward (205); son of Thomas and Esther Bath. attained age 14 Sept 1851. Father born at Box and served his time to Mr. Tho. Shell of that place – is unable to depend on his trade in the winter months – mother who is ailing (was formerly Esther Tyler of Atworth).

and from the 1855 list:

Dawson, Joseph William (244); son of Joseph and Caroline Dawson. attained age 14 Aug 1854. Parents kept a Coffee-shop in New St., Brompton, which enables them to maintain their children but not to apprentice them. Candidate conducted himself well at the National school and received awards for good conduct. Mother (formerly Caroline Beauchamp) is from West Dean.

The list of successful candidates was published in April of each year, and apprenticeship to suitable masters followed quickly after that. Payment to a master was made in two equal parts. The first moiety was paid on execution of the apprenticeship indentures; the second was paid at mid-term in the apprenticeship, after receipt by the Society of a certificate from the master to the effect that the apprentice was still in his employ, and all was proceeding according to plan. It is clear from the annotations in the apprentice registers that the Secretary, or other officers of the Society, visited apprentices at their work-place. Often an apprentice was moved to another master for a variety of reasons. For example the apprentice may have found himself in the wrong trade, as in the case of Henry Lay Smith (364) of Collingbourne Ducis, who was apprenticed to James Rawlings of that place, carpenter and machinist. In October 1873 he was re-apprenticed to William Carter of East Stratton (Hants), tea grocer.

Often the master was declared bankrupt or, on one or two occasions, was found unsuitable. In this latter event an order was obtained from a magistrate for the indenture to be cancelled, and the apprentice was placed elsewhere. At all times the Society acted in the best interests of the apprentice. There were several cases of apprentices absconding. Sometimes it was to seek employment before the completion of their apprenticeship whilst in others the family emigrated and the apprentice went with them. There are at least two instances where the apprentice died, one by

drowning, but the circumstances were not reported.

The sum available for each apprentice was limited in 1860 to between $\mathcal{L}20$ and $\mathcal{L}30$, and indeed this sum had not changed significantly by 1914. Furthermore, the Society could lend up to $\mathcal{L}60$ free of interest, for a maximum period of four years, to any apprentice who, on completion of his apprenticeship, wanted capital in order to set up in business. The apprenticeship term varied between one and seven years to a wide variety of trades in London and Wiltshire.

Unlike its predecessor, the Society met only once a year for a formal presentation of its accounts, the nomination of its President, and election of the Honorary Secretary and the Treasurer; and of course to enjoy an annual dinner. During the year the governors of the Society met to conduct its business, that is to elect apprentices from the applications placed before them.

By the 1880s the nature of society itself was changing and the Wiltshire Society was quick to adapt to this changing world. It was accepted that a candidate might wish to become a seaman, and a payment would be made by the Society in lieu of an apprenticeship. Some apprentices were attending night-classes at the School of Science and Art, in South Kensington. As encouragement to these students, awards of £1, £2 and £5 could be made by the committee for success in examinations. The year 1880 saw the introduction of two exhibitions (i.e., scholarships) – one for 'Town' and one for 'County' (Wiltshire) candidates – each not to exceed £40, to meet the fees for attendance full-time at the School of Science and Art at South Kensington, or other schools approved by the committee. The Annual report for 1881 contained the following:

In April last, twenty Candidates presented themselves for election as apprentices, viz, eight from town and twelve from the county; of these seven of the former and four of the latter were elected by the Governors. The unsuccessful Candidates will be eligible for election next year.

For the Town Exhibition one Candidate only presented himself, William Davis Thomas (509), at present apprenticed to Messrs. Newton and Triggs, Clapham, Carpenters and Joiners. He has obtained at the night schools of Science and Art, Battersea, a second-class certificate for success in Practical Plane and Solid Geometry, and also second-class certificate for Building, Construction, and Drawing, and is about to commence study at King's College, London.

For the County Exhibition three candidates presented themselves, and Emily Maud Hale, of Devizes, was elected by a large majority.

The names of only four exhibitioners have been found and are included at the end of the main apprentice list (A1-A4).

In 1900 the Committee permitted payments to be made to candidates for the provision of tools rather than for the apprenticeship premium.

As in most spheres of life at that time, the Great War (1914-18) caused a hiatus for the Society, as several of its committee members and the chairman were away on active service. The Annual Report for 1914 records that at the anniversary meeting of the Society on 4th November 1914 the Committee resolved that owing to the absence of the President, Lord Pembroke, on active service at the front there could not be an anniversary on the usual lines, but it would not be abandoned altogether. Colonel Calley, a former President, and Colonel Turnor consented to fill the vacancies on the Committee. The Committee also expressed their fears that the

Society's income would be curtailed by the war. However, the receipts of the Society in the year May 1914 to May 1915 show approximately a 20% increase in total income, which was balanced by a similar increase in payment of first and second apprenticeship moieties.

Many apprentices sought to have their apprenticeships held in abeyance until the end of hostilities to enable them to enlist, and a few forsook such formalities and immediately volunteered at the outbreak of war. The Society maintained a record of those on military service, their distinctions and their deaths, relying largely on letters received from the apprentices or their parents. At the end of the war many apprentices returned to their former employers, some to complete their apprenticeships. In spite of these exigencies the Society continued its work throughout the war period with many younger apprentices working in Government factories. This was summed up in the Annual report of 1920:

- 1. The Committee consider that the Governors may be interested to know that during the Period of the War up to the date of the Armistice eleven and since that date eight grants to Apprentices have been made to approved candidates. Of the former five including two girls apprenticed to Dressmakers, have completed their apprenticeship terms and one has been cancelled on a medical certificate.
- 2. About two-thirds (30) of the apprentices on the Society's books at the outbreak of the War enlisted when of military age, the remaining third being either under age unfit or in one or two cases working with firms under the War Office. Two were killed, a third as the result of wounds and several operations died two years after his discharge, and seven were wounded. Several have returned to complete their apprenticeships under the Government scheme and others have obtained good employment at high wages.
- 3. From the experience gained not only during the War but more especially since its termination the Committee are convinced of the necessity of making speedy grants to approved candidates and of their being empowered having regard to the general rise in wages, the requirements of the Education Act, etc. to increase the amount of the grants. With these objects and in view of the expense in the additional cost of printing and postage not only to the Society but also to the friends of candidates which a yearly election in April by voting papers issued to the Governors entails, the Committee are strongly of Opinion that by an alteration in the rules they should be empowered to continue as they have done since August 1914 to make Apprenticeship grants to approved Candidates without delay, whilst reserving the power to have an election by voting papers at any time if the Committee should think it desirable and not in the month of April only as fixed at present by the rules.

This latter change in the rules vested more power in the committee, but enabled a speedier response to be made to applicants. The savings were also significant since the cost of printing, postage etc, amounted to some 10% of the Society's expenditure.

At the Annual General Meeting in 1922, held at the Trocadero restaurant in London, it was reported that the Society had agreed with Wiltshire County Council to make plans for disabled children, and to investigate placing apprentices with farmers. It should be noted here, that the records of the Society show that from its commencement in 1817 several children who were crippled or disabled in some way had been apprenticed, so this was not really an innovation.

At the Annual meeting in 1923 Judge Radcliffe spoke about the difficulties posed by the various Trades Unions who had demanded that Union wage rates be paid to apprentices. This had led to great difficulties in finding masters. Similarly the proposals by Lord Radnor and General Calley some two years earlier to apprentice boys to farmers had met with opposition from the Branch Farmer's Unions in the County, and as a result there had been no progress. Judge Radcliffe concluded by proposing an addition to the rules as an outcome of the difficulties in finding masters. He proposed that in certain cases, where a formal apprenticeship could not be concluded, the Society should make the equivalent sum available to enable the applicant to receive training at a suitable institution. This was agreed by the meeting.

The financial statement at the Anniversary meeting in 1925 reported that £6,526 was held in stock, and receipts, including donations and dividends on stock, totalled £610. Of this £528 was spent on apprenticeship payments and tool grants. At today's values the Stock Holding was worth over £200,000, a healthy improvement over the Society's position in 1823. However the cost of premiums was rising, and the average was now nearer £50.

In 1929 the main preoccupation was concern about the small numbers of apprentices who were attending evening classes. Although the Society was prepared to consider inducements, the lack of facilities was recognised as being the main obstacle in many Wiltshire towns. In that year liaison commenced with the Ministry of Labour and the Board of Education. This situation was addressed by the Wiltshire Education Committee and in 1933 the Chairman was pleased to report:

Attendance at Evening Classes has considerably improved this year. This is due mainly to the establishment of suitable classes by the Wilts Education Committee both at Warminster and Devizes centres accessible to many of the Society's apprentices. In two cases fees and rail fares were paid by the Society to enable lads to attend the more advanced courses at Bath Municipal College. Full advantage was taken of these classes and the report on both lads was excellent.

It is apparent from the apprentice registers and the annual reports that the Society was always very deeply interested in the progress of its apprentices. An experiment in improving this contact was reported by the Secretary in 1933:

An experiment has recently been made by the Hon. Secretary in inviting present apprentices and those recently out of their time to a tea held in towns accessible to them. About 14 young men attended at Bradford-on-Avon and about 20 at Warminster. It is hoped to hold further tea parties at Devizes, Marlborough, Chippenham and Swindon. Personal contact is thus made with the young apprentices placed by the Society and the action seems to be appreciated by them. It is pleasing to record in this connection that of the eighteen apprentices who were out of their time during the past twelve months, fifteen remained on with their employers as improvers, two found work elsewhere at their respective trades and only one failed to find work on termination of his apprenticeship.

In more recent times the Society has moved more towards grants for vocational training, with bursaries for study at universities and colleges of higher education and assistance with travel costs. Grants for the purchase of tools, books and even musical instruments are now made.

In 1952 the annual subscription and Life membership donation remained at one guinea and ten guineas respectively, unchanged since 1817.

THE RECORDS OF THE SOCIETY

In 1956 the Secretary of the Society deposited with the Wiltshire Record Office: two apprentice registers, 1830-1903 and 1903-56; a committee minute book, 1903-56; annual reports for 1850, 1882, 1913, 1925, 1929.

The apprentice registers list the apprentice, the date of indenture, name and trade of master, the payment of the apprenticeship fees and a 'Remarks' column, which contains details such as apprentices who had absconded or died, and the action taken when masters were found unsuitable, or were declared bankrupt. Where the apprenticeship term was less than seven years it was noted in this column. Each apprentice was allocated a unique serial number and this has been used as the key reference throughout the calendar.

The survival of a number of the Society's annual reports in the Wiltshire Record Office, the Wiltshire Archaeological and Natural History Society Library, the Wiltshire Local Studies Library, and with the Wiltshire Society, has enabled the information from the apprentice registers to be supplemented in two ways. In many of the lists of children elected for apprenticeship each year, details of the parents' residence, occupation and background are given. Additionally, each report includes a cumulative list of apprentices placed up to that year.

The annual reports listed children who had been elected for an apprenticeship. However it is clear from the apprentice registers that some of these children failed to obtain an apprenticeship. These have been calendared at the end of the main sequence, and allotted numbers **B1-62**.

The apprentice registers contain details of the amount of the premium for each apprenticeship, and the dates on which the two payments were made. The first was paid when the indenture was enacted, and the second halfway through the apprenticeship period. This has been used as a check on the apprenticeship term, which in most cases can be assumed to be seven years unless noted otherwise in the remarks column of the register. On a few occasions this latter information has been found to be in error.

ANALYSIS OF THE APPRENTICESHIP DATA

During the period 1817 to May 1923 the Society apprenticed a total of 1006 children (831 male, 175 female). A further 62 candidates failed to secure apprenticeships. Of these 1006 apprentices, some 650 were placed with masters in the Greater London area. Most of the remainder were placed with masters in Wiltshire. A few were found apprenticeships in Hampshire, Berkshire and Somerset. Two only (447, 549) were placed with masters outside this general Wiltshire-London axis, to masters near Manchester and in Brighton.

Almost exclusively girls were apprenticed into dressmaking, millinery, and similar trades. In Wiltshire the approved apprentice master (or mistress) was Sarah Heathcote, dressmaker and milliner, of the Parade, Trowbridge. Between 1875 and 1897 she had ten apprentices placed with her by the Society. In 1895 an Arthur Egington Heathcote was also taking girls for dress-making apprenticeships, and he may well have been a relation. By 1905 Sarah Heathcote's establishment had moved to Bridge

House in Trowbridge, and in 1907 the references are in general to Messrs Heathcote and Co., also at this address.

Similarly in Collingbourne Ducis in 1867 Henry Lay Smith (364) was apprenticed to James Rawlings, carpenter and machinist. In 1886 the Society placed George Charles Annetts (617) with H. and W. Rawlings, agricultural engineers, who were presumably the successor business to James Rawlings of 1867.

The period covered by this calendar, 1817 to 1922, embraces a time of considerable changes in the nature of society as a whole. It was an age that saw great strides in scientific developments which are in some measure reflected in the trades (and in a few cases professions) followed by the apprentices of the Wiltshire Society.

The 650 apprentices placed with London masters may be assumed to have had either one or both parents of Wiltshire birth, or that the apprentice was born in Wiltshire. In 301 cases there were clear statements that either or both the parents came from Wiltshire, and of these 49 instances gave the mother's maiden name. For example the parents of Eliza Grist (272) were John Grist and his wife Jane (nèe Collier), both of Dilton Marsh in Wiltshire. Similarly the parents of James Alexander Frampton (403) and John G. Frampton (273) were Edmund and Elizabeth Frampton. Their mother was Elizabeth Newham from Britford, Wiltshire.

The individual human stories which these records tell may be set against the overall pattern of Victorian internal migration from rural to urban England deducible from other sources. In 1871, for instance, according to census data, 27,639 Wiltshire natives were living in London and the intra-metropolitan districts of Middlesex, Surrey, and Kent. They represented rather less than 1% of the total metropolitan population of 3.25 million, but in terms of Wiltshire's loss they were far more significant. Wiltshire in 1871 had a population of 257,177, so that for every hundred Wiltshire residents at this date another eleven Wiltshire natives were living in London. Whereas the population of England and Wales quadrupled between 1801 and 1911, Wiltshire's population during the same period increased by only 55%, and between 1841 and 1881 scarcely altered at all, despite the rapid growth of Swindon.

It has been calculated¹⁵ that between 1861 and 1900 nearly two-thirds of Wiltshire natives in the 15-24 age bracket left the county. Most (48% of males and 59% of females) migrated internally within England and Wales, and the remainder (15% of males, 7% of females) emigrated overseas. The higher proportion of female internal migrants (many of whom must have moved to London) is reflected also in census data, which show that female Wiltshire natives in London in 1871 outnumbered males at the ratio of about 6 to 4. This imbalance was paralleled by migrants from other rural counties close to London.¹⁶

Statistics such as these help to place in perspective the work of the Wiltshire Society, by demonstrating the scale of migration to the capital during the later nineteenth century. Similar figures do not exist before 1851, but the problems which such migration caused, and which the Society was formed to address, clearly existed already by 1817. Indeed, it should be recalled that the nineteenth-century Wiltshire Society was the successor to an earlier Society which provided apprenticeships to the children of Wiltshiremen living in London from the later seventeenth century.

Table 1 analyses the distribution of apprenticeships over some arbitrary trade groupings. It is clear that the majority of girls were apprenticed to the clothing industry, of which the major employer was in dressmaking and millinery. Although boys were apprenticed into the traditional trades of shoemaking and watchmaking, these numbers were far out-weighed by those entering building and engineering trades. This latter showed a considerable up-turn towards the end of the nineteenth century, with the development of mechanised transport and manufacturing processes. The clothing trades were evenly distributed between town and county as were the building trades (see Table 2), while watchmaking, jewellery, and gold-working were almost exclusively town occupations.

On an aggregate basis the ratio of boys to girls was about 5:1 both for town and county apprentices. However, as Table 3 illustrates, this varied from year to year and was probably as much influenced by numbers of applications as by any deliberate bias.

Comparison of the annual premiums (Table 4), with the variation (approximate) of the relative value of money¹⁷ (Table 5), shows that the Society operated in a fairly stable economic climate until the advent of the Great War. Inflation then grew rapidly with prices almost trebling by 1920, but the Society's premiums remained substantially constant numerically, and hence fell in real terms by the same ratio.

The Society reports also register a fall in the number of patrons during this period and into the 1930s.

Examination of individual apprenticeships reveals that the position becomes increasingly difficult to analyse on this gross basis. While many traditional trades took apprentices at the same premiums (numerically) as in the previous century, the newer occupations such as engineering demanded substantially higher premiums in line with the more specialised nature of the training provided and the real costs involved.

It is instructive to make comparisons between the Society and other, similar, apprenticing institutions in Wiltshire at that time. According to the Charity Commissioners' reports, in the mid-nineteenth century there were some 46 endowed charities committed to providing apprenticeships for children. Many of these dated from the late seventeenth century, and often only provided sufficient funds to apprentice one boy every two years or so. The principal Wiltshire charities which offer the closest comparison with the Wiltshire Society were the Devizes Bear Club and the Broad Town Charity.

The Devizes Bear Club dated from 1765 and continued to operate until 1877. Its history and details of its apprentices and subscribers have been described by John Hurley. Apart from the fact that its sphere of interest was restricted to Devizes and the immediate environs, it also differed significantly from the Wiltshire Society in that it provided elementary education for boys from the age of eleven years to fit them for apprenticeship at the age of fourteen.

The Broad Town Charity was an endowed charity established under the terms of the Dowager Duchess of Somerset's will in 1686. This charity provided apprenticeships for boys born and living in Wiltshire, and with special provisions for those from the Duchess's manors of Broad Town, Thornhill, Froxfield, Wootton Rivers and Huish. The income for the trust was derived from rents from these manors and investment of moneys left under her will.

Making exact comparisons between these three charities is limited by the available data. Hurley provides an extract from the annual accounts of the Bear Club for the year 1858, which shows the expenditure on apprenticing but not the numbers apprenticed. Similarly in that year the records of both the Broad Town Charity and the Wiltshire Society (before 1838) enable the number of boys apprenticed to be ascertained but not the cost. The average cost for the Broad Town Charity seems to have been £15 per boy (based upon those records which include the value of the premium) while that for the Wiltshire Society was £20 per child. The average payment for the Bear Club can only be estimated from a statement made in 1833 which suggests a figure of £15.

The higher average premiums paid per child by the Wiltshire Society were probably due to the higher proportion of placements in London rather than Wiltshire at that time. The premiums were substantially higher in both Wiltshire and London than those paid for parish apprentices. This undoubtedly gave the Society considerable clout in choosing masters for their apprentices, and in monitoring the progress of the apprenticeship.

EDITORIAL NOTE

The sequence of entries in this calendar follows the order in which the apprentices were indentured, and hence their appearance in the apprentice registers. The original serial number (1-1006) allocated to each apprentice has been retained as the key reference to the individual apprentice. The four candidates identified as exhibitioners, and the sixty-two who failed to gain apprenticeships are calendared after entry 1006, and have been assigned entry numbers A1-4 and B1-62 respectively. These numbers are artificial, and do not appear in the records.

Each entry presents some or all of the following details: serial number/ entry number; apprentice name (surname, forenames); parents' forenames (and surname, if different from apprentice surname); parents' address; master's name; master's occupation; master's address; term of apprenticeship; premium; indenture date. The parents' names and address, where given, have been taken from annual reports; other details, after 1830, derive from the apprentice registers. Supplementary notes, printed in smaller type, follow many entries. These summarize all substantial additional information about the apprenticeship supplied in annual reports. All places are in Wiltshire or London unless otherwise identified.

The rules of the Society as published in the report of 1823 are transcribed as Appendix A. Appendix B is a list of governors and subscribers, 1817-1921, compiled from annual reports. It reads like a court directory of the southern counties and indicates the wide range of patronage enjoyed by the Society over a long period. Appendix C lists the presidents of the Society from 1817 to 1923.

An index (to entry numbers, except where prefixed by p. for page number) combines all personal names, place-names, and names of companies and businesses. There is a second index, of occupations.

The data have been processed using a computer data-base, 20 and a copy of the data in machine-readable form will be deposited with E.S.R.C. Data Archive.

APPENDIX A RULES OF THE WILTSHIRE SOCIETY 1823

- 1. An Annual Subscription of One Guinea constitutes a Governor.
- 2. A single Subscription of Ten Guineas constitutes a Governor for life.
- 3. Any person presenting the Society a larger sum than Ten Guineas, in one payment, will be entitled to vote in the proportion of one vote for every ten guineas.
- 4. Every person who pays One Guinea a year, in addition to a Donation of Ten Guineas, will be entitled to a second vote, and so on in proportion.
- 5. Upon any Legacy being paid to the Treasurer, the Executors who have administered shall be made Life Governors, with one vote, calculating at the rate of \pounds 50 each; and in case the Legacy shall not amount to a sufficient sum to extend the privilege to all, preference shall be given to the person first named in the will.
- 6. A Donation of £210 in one payment, or paid in the course of one year, entitles the Donor either to the privilege of twenty votes, or to have one apprentice always on the Institution.
- 7. Any Governor whose subscription is one year in arrear shall not be entitled to a vote at any election, or sign any petition, until such arrear be paid.
- 8. The Society to be under the direction of a President, and a Committee of twelve gentlemen, besides a Treasurer and a Secretary, who are members of the Committee, ex officio.
 - 9. The President to be elected annually at the Anniversary meeting.
- 10. The Treasurer and Honorary Secretary to be appointed at such Anniversary meeting.
- 11. Such vacancies as shall occur in the Committee to be supplied at the Anniversary Meeting next ensuing, and the Secretary to call an extra meeting of the Committee, upon the request of three of the said Committee at least, and on having reasonable notice for that purpose. Any member who neglects to attend four successive Quarterly Meetings of the Committee, thereby forfeits his seat.
- 12. The Committee to meet four times at least in each year, of which Committee five shall be an efficient number for the transaction of business.
- 13. The Committee to be empowered to appoint Agents and Receivers for the Society; to print a state of its funds at each Anniversary, with the names and number of Children apprenticed in each year; together with a list of the Governors, and such other particulars as they may think advisable.
- 14. The Committee to call a General Meeting of the Society, upon a requisition for that purpose being made to them through the Secretary, signed by at least ten Governors of the Society (provided such requisition sets forth the special business to be done at such meeting), and that such General Meeting be convened within 21 days after the requisition be made.
- 15. A General Meeting of the Society may be convened for any special purpose by the President or by the Committee.
- 16. A General Meeting, when necessary, is to be held on the first Tuesday in February, in each year.

- 17. An Anniversary Meeting to be held for managing the Business of the Society, when the members will dine together, due notice of which is to be given by the Secretary, under the directions of the Committee.
- 18. No Governor, whose subscription shall be in arrear, will be entitled to vote, or affix his name to any petition; and no petition to be received unless signed by the President or by two Governors.
- 19. No sum exceeding $\angle 25$ will be given by the Society as a premium for apprenticeship.
- 20. The Committee for the time being to have the power of lending for four years, without interest upon proper security, sums of money not exceeding £60 each, to persons whose apprenticeship shall have expired, and whose conduct shall have been meritorious; and application for such loans, to be made in writing, to the Secretary before the 1st October in every year.
- 21. All petitions to be submitted to the consideration of the Committee, who are to report respecting such persons as are eligible, at the General meeting, previous to ballot.
- 22. All petitions to be admissible, if either the father or mother, or the object for whom the application is made, be a native of the county of Wilts., and such object not to exceed 14 years of age at the time of election. The parties interested, are to observe, that in cases where premiums are to be given, all persons entitled are to receive the same by two payments, and must make application for the first moiety of the premium, by sending one part of the indenture duly executed to the Secretary, at least one month previous to the then ensuing meeting of the Committee; and for the second moiety of the premium, by transmitting, at the expiration of half the apprenticeship, the certificate of the minister, and one of the churchwardens or overseers of the poor of the parish where the master resides, in the following form viz.

APPENDIX B GOVERNORS OF THE WILTSHIRE SOCIETY, 1817 - 1921

The Society's annual reports include lists of those who had supported its work by donations and subscriptions, and who were thereby known as governors. The scope of these annual lists altered over time. From those reports available for inspection, it appears that until 1843 all past and present governors were included. Thereafter, until c.1873, the lists excluded the names of those whose contribution had been less than £5, and had been made more than four years previously. Then, until c.1904, all donors and subscribers since 1869 were included, but only the names of those donating £5 or more before 1869. Between 1901 and 1913 (or later) two lists appeared, one of past governors donating at least five guineas (£5 5s.), and another of current governors. Later lists include only current governors and life members (eligibility for which required a donation of at least ten guineas, £10 10s.).

This appendix aims to present as complete a list as possible of those governors who contributed at least $\mathcal{L}5$ 5s. during the period 1817-1921. Its bases are the lists of past and present governors and contributors printed in the 1913 report, and the list of present governors and contributors printed in the 1921 report. These lists were evidently compiled from the lists in earlier reports, and, depending on the accuracy of earlier record-keeping, should be comprehensive, apart from contributors of sums less than $\mathcal{L}5$ 5s., or governors who both joined and left (having not become life governors), or joined and died, between 1913 and 1921.

Information is presented in this list in the following way: name, as printed in the report; address, where given (in some cases slightly abbreviated); date(s) of contributions; total amount of contribution (insofar as this can be calculated). A date followed by an asterisk denotes that the contributor was still listed as a governor in 1921. Some small amounts (generally £1 1s.) refer not to a total contribution, but to an annual subscription.

Because a payment of £10 10s. or more in a single year entitled the contributor to life governorship, contributors continued to be listed as present governors for a long time (sometimes fifty or sixty years) after they had made their contribution. It should not be assumed, therefore, that the last dates given for contributions in the list below are either the dates of death, or of contributors ceasing to be governors of the society.
