The first extant minute-book or general Entry Book of the city of New Salisbury relates to the years 1387–1452. It contains valuable and unique information about the administration and the social and economic life of the city. While it is a formal record of meetings of the citizens, with long lists of those attending the meetings and of those assessed for taxes, it illuminates many facets of the city's history. Interspersed among the records of meetings are miscellaneous memoranda, notes, and documents related to the business of the meetings.

THE MANUSCRIPT

The book is the first of a series of eight which runs to 1836, and it was traditionally known as 'Ledger A'. It is one of the earliest such minute-books for an English town. It was formerly kept in the Council House at the east end of the market place, and it was badly damaged by water used to extinguish the fire which damaged that building in 1780.¹ It was transferred from the Salisbury District Council muniment room at Bourne Hill, Salisbury, to the Wiltshire (now Wiltshire and Swindon) Record Office at Trowbridge about 1981, and was given the call number WRO G23/1/1. The volume consists of 163 paper folios, measuring approximately 40cm high by 28cm wide, and numerous interfoliated sheets, usually of parchment but occasionally also of paper. All the folio sheets, though used over a period of 65 years, have the same watermark, the outline of a steeply-roofed church surmounted by a simple Latin cross. The precise origin of the paper has not been traced, but it is most likely to have been imported from the continent, perhaps France, as a single shipment.² A local mercer trading through Southampton could have been the supplier.

The manuscript was repaired and rebound at the Public Record Office in London in 1951, perhaps at the instigation of Dr A. E. J. Hollaender, who in 1949 listed and numbered the city's accumulated records.³ No record appears to survive at either the Public Record Office or the Wiltshire and Swindon Record Office of the repair and rebinding, which seems to have retained the arrangement of an earlier rebinding made, apparently, about 1907.

The volume is made up of twelve gatherings, with two additional gatherings, one at the front and one at the back, each of four modern leaves glued to a guard round the adjoining gathering. The collation of the volume is set out below, on pages xxxixxxiii, where each folio that is not marked as an insertion or as 'single' is one half of one of the double leaves that form the gathering. Four of the gatherings are each of sixteen folios (eight double leaves), two are each of fourteen folios (seven double leaves), and four others are variously of ten, nineteen, seventeen and fifteen folios, those with odd numbers of folios containing just one single leaf. The last two gatherings, of four and seven folios, each contain only one double leaf. Many smaller pieces of parchment or paper have been sown into the book, including royal writs which are shown by internal evidence to have been inserted when the manuscript was being compiled.

The gatherings are in general in chronological order, following the dates which are recorded on them or may be inferred, and accord with the different enumerations of the folios as described below. Meetings in the period July to December 1393 (194–200) appear out of order on folios 63v–66 between two of November 1418 (193, 202) on folios 62v and 67, the recto of folio 63 being blank and the lower part the recto of folio 66 and the verso of the same folio being used for a rental of 1419 (201); the most likely explanation is that the scribe who entered the meeting of 11 July 1393 began on a new page, the verso of the third folio in the gathering, leaving blank pages for meetings that had not been recorded, that when the record was resumed in or after January 1393 the scribe went back to the first gathering, and that later, in February 1417 (174, with which folio 61 and gatheringV begins), the partly used gathering containing the record of the meetings of 1393 was taken back into use. Some other documents are out of chronological order as a result of using blank pages or parts of pages for infilling.

The folios are numbered in at least four different sequences, with a fifth surviving on seven folios and matching one or another of the more continuous enumerations. All the enumerations are in arabic figures. That designated as a in the list below is the most nearly complete and the most prominent, and for those reasons is the one which is used in this edition. It is of large pencilled numbers at the top right-hand corner of each folio, added apparently in the eighteenth or nineteenth century, perhaps when the book was repaired after the fire at the Council House in 1780. It treats insertions in the book as additions to the original pages, giving each the number of the preceding or following folio with the suffix a, b, or c. The enumeration a is missing from f. 24 and from the insertions following ff. 70, 98, 104, and 119, has been omitted from f. 132 (of which the recto is blank), and for reasons which are not clear is discontinuous at the end of the book, the last two folio, following f. 161, being numbered 171 and 172. On five folios (29, 34, 54, 56, and 62) the pencilled number has not been added, because it would have duplicated a number written earlier in ink, part of the fragmentary fifth sequence of numbers mentioned above.

An enumeration in pencil, b in the list below, appears to be of the nineteenth or twentieth century and may have been added at the rebinding of c. 1907. The numbers are small and inconspicuous, often hardly legible, at the lower left-hand corner of the rectos of the folios. Some of them have apparently been trimmed away. They treat the

insertions as part of a single sequence of numbers, but four folios have numbers with A or B added, presumably to rectify mistakes in numbering.

Of two earlier enumerations that designated c in the list below is in ink, usually faint or badly written, and may be contemporary or nearly so with the compilation of the manuscript. It ignores the insertions, and appears to contain mistakes. The numbers are in the top right-hand corner of the rectos; some may have been trimmed away, while a few have been crossed out. Also in ink and at the top right-hand corner of the rectos are numbers, designated d below, which appear to be slightly later and are much blacker. They are in only three parts of the book, are far from complete, and have in some instances been crossed out.

The damage sustained by the book in the fire of 1780 is extensive, and is most marked in the earlier folios of the volume and in the upper ends of the folios. It has not prevented historians from using the valuable evidence which it affords but has made full and systematic searching of its contents extremely difficult and discouraging. A report of 1907 on the city of Salisbury's muniments by the Royal Commission on Historical Manuscripts included eight pages of extracts from the book, but those extracts are mostly devoted to entries relating to national history rather than to the local matters with which the book is largely concerned and for which it is such a valuable source. The report stated that little of the book was legible before the reign of HenryV [1413– 22], and its remark that none of the volumes 'shed as much light on public affairs as might have been anticipated in the records of so important a municipality as Salisbury' assumes that local affairs were not public affairs. As for legibility, Fanny Street considered everything to be illegible before folio 68,² which relates to the year 1419, and the Victoria County History followed an earlier author in saying that little was legible before c. 1406.³ Several previous attempts to produce a published edition of the book were abandoned.

The book takes the form of a record of successive meetings of citizens. In most instances the meeting is entitled *Convocatio*, translated in the edition as 'Assembly', but in some it is in fact a meeting of the council or of the mayor's court. The formal record of the meetings is in Latin but some interpolated documents are in French or, increasingly towards the end of the period covered, in English. The various hands in which the book is written are, in general, regular and good, though at times the scribes appear to have written hurriedly.

MEDIEVAL SALISBURY

THE BISHOP'S CONTROL OF THE CITY

Salisbury, or New Salisbury, was a new town created by the bishop. That circumstance made it exceptional among English episcopal cities and unusual even in comparison

with continental towns controlled by their bishops.¹ Other English cities which were under the control of their bishops, including Bath, Wells, Durham, and Ely, did not owe their establishment to the bishop.² In Salisbury whatever civic authority was exercised had been derived from the bishop, who in turn had received his authority from the Crown, and all the liberties enjoyed by the citizens had been bestowed by the bishop. It has been argued that episcopal lordship gave Salisbury advantages, particularly in securing additional privileges and in avoiding negotiations with royal officials,³ but other episcopal cities had the same advantages. That Salisbury maintained its relative importance as an economic centre later in the medieval period than comparable towns was not because it was under the bishop's control, nor was it because the citizens maintained superior relations with their bishop. In fact there was a prolonged conflict between the citizens and the bishop. After a temporary settlement in the early fourteenth century, the conflict between the bishop's exercise of his rights and the wishes and ambitions of the citizens resulted in a relationship that was peppered with hostility, if not outright violence, during the fifteenth century. The hostility came to a head with the murder, perhaps by a Salisbury butcher, of Bishop William Ayscough in 1450 during Cade's rebellion.⁴ It hindered the progress towards the greater formal independence for which the citizens wished, and they enjoyed few privileges superior to other contemporary episcopal cities. Salisbury offers a clear example of the struggle in which several English medieval cities were engaged to carve out independent governmental functions in the face of repressive episcopal lordship.

Repeated confrontations between the citizens and their bishop resulted only in the reaffirmation of episcopal domination. Very slowly, however, a substructure of civic administration developed beneath, beside and in conflict with the episcopal administration and jurisdiction. The painstaking acquisition of functions by civic officers was frequently contested by the bishop or his officers and was wielded by civic officers largely *de facto* rather than *de jure*. Although the city did not secure political autonomy in the period to which it relates, the Entry Book amply demonstrates activities by which the citizens gradually won from the bishop a measure of control of the administration and jurisdiction of the city.

In 1220 Bishop Richard Poore relocated his cathedral from the hilltop city of Old Sarum to a new site in one of his manors, just above the confluence of the rivers Avon and Nadder. His motives, whether stemming from the loss of his authority over the old city, from a desire to augment his income, or from the apocryphal complaints of

the canons that howling winds drowned out their chants, are not certainly known. Simultaneously he founded a 'new town' abutting the close of the new cathedral. This site proved a fine one for both commerce and manufacture.

The bishop's powers in the new city were greater than in the old. In 1226 and 1227 Henry III confirmed his earlier privileges and granted further extensive liberties. The bishop and his successors gained freedom from the jurisdiction and fines of shire and hundred courts and the right to impose and claim at the Exchequer amercements of all his lands, fees, and free tenants save those arising from pleas of the Crown. The bishop's court was to have the view of frankpledge, held by the Crown's official but giving the bishop the fines and forfeitures arising from a wide variety of offences. The Crown's officials were not to enter the bishop's lands or to have jurisdiction over the free tenants of the bishop, dean, and canons except in pleas of the Crown. The bishop and his land were made exempt from a broad selection of aids, pleas, fines, gelds, and tolls, and the bishop might himself levy tolls. Freedom from toll, pontage, carriage, stallage, and pannage throughout the kingdom placed the bishop and his citizens in an enviable economic position.¹

The bishop's judicial and administrative control of the city was exercised by his officers, of whom the most important in the daily life of citizens was his bailiff. The bishop's bailiff received the oaths of the officers elected by the citizens, including the mayor, aldermen, and reeves, and admitted them to their offices. In the absence of the bishop's steward he presided in the court leet, where he held the view of frankpledge for the Crown and the assizes of bread, ale, and wine, and he executed the return of writs. He presided also in the fortnightly court held in the Guildhall, which belonged to the bishop. He collected the bishop's market dues and might hold pie powder courts for the rapid settlement of disputes arising in the markets or fairs. His presence was necessary for the transfer of property, whether by gift, sale, or demise, within the city.²

In 1225 Bishop Poore granted the free tenants of New Salisbury the right to hold their plots by what amounted to burgage tenure, though it was not described in those words: they were to pay a fixed money rent, or quit rent, for all services and to have freedom to transfer their holdings by gift, sale, or mortgage, other than to a church.³ Henry III's charter of 1227, granting that Salisbury should be a free city under its bishop, said that the citizens were to enjoy the same liberties as the citizens of Winchester, with the usual freedom from tolls and customs. It also gave the bishop the right to demand tallage and other reasonable aid whenever the king tallaged his own demesnes.⁴

In 1302 Bishop Simon of Ghent levied a tallage which the citizens refused to pay on the grounds that the bishop had never demanded a tallage before. When the dispute came before Edward I and his council, the bishop pointed to Henry III's charter

which bestowed the right upon the bishop and provided that the bishop's rights should not lapse through disuse, while the citizens claimed immunity from tallage on the basis that Bishop Poore had freed them from such impositions in exchange for quit rents. The king found in favour of the bishop, but permitted the citizens a choice. They could either retain their 'liberties' and pay the tallage, or lose them and avoid the tallage. They chose to avoid the tallage and renounce the liberties, but soon realized the disadvantages of not enjoying the freedoms allowed by the bishop with regard to regulating markets, fairs, tolls, and a wide variety of commercial activities. A settlement was reached in 1306, when the bishop granted a charter to the city. In return for unspecified rents and services and for recognition of the bishop's lordship, the community was permitted to choose its own officers, as they had evidently done before the dispute of 1302.Additionally the citizens were excused from obligatory attendance at the bishop's court more than twice a year.¹

Following the agreement of 1306 the mayor and others of the city's officers played a role alongside the bishop's bailiff in the bishop's court,² but they were clearly in a subordinate position. The bailiff's authority was strengthened by royal confirmations from Edward III, Richard II, and HenryV.³ Repeated attempts to avoid the requirement that the officers elected by the citizens had to be sworn and admitted to their offices before the bishop's bailiff met with stiff opposition from the bishop.

The proliferation of civic offices, discussed below, might seem to suggest growing independence, but the authority of the bishop's bailiff could severely limit the power of the city's officials, who, though elected by the citizens, were sworn and admitted to office before him. His court, held in the Guildhall, might displace all others within the city. The bailiff might tallage the citizens, act as constable, justice of the peace, and more.⁴ Surprisingly then, the Entry Book contains relatively few specific complaints about episcopal authority during the first half of the fifteenth century, and makes no direct mention of the violence during Cade's rebellion. Other sources, however, make it clear that the struggle between bishop and citizens over political authority and economic privilege was active at the time.⁵ In 1472, after a protracted dispute, the citizens agreed that the mayor should take his oath before the bishop in person.⁶ Not until 1612 was the city freed from episcopal dominance.

THE CITIZEN BODY

The citizens of Salisbury as a group had no corporate status. They nevertheless had a strong sense of community and their meetings performed many administrative functions. The record of their meetings forms the framework of the Entry Book, but the record is

far from complete. Apart from the damage which has made large parts of the book illegible or only partly legible, it is clear that by no means all the business conducted was minuted, and some of the meetings may not have been recorded at all. The book generally describes each meeting as a convocatio, a word rendered in this calendar as 'Assembly'. One meeting was described exceptionally as a council of neighbours (160), and three, in 1445, 1447, and 1449, as of the mayor's council (395, 410, 432). Those attending the meetings are often named as the mayor and fellow citizens. The citizens were distinguished in 1415 from other inhabitants (146) and then and in 1420 from other neighbours (148, 213). Some meetings, notably the annual meeting at which the mayor, aldermen, and other officers were elected, held usually on All Souls' day (2 November) though in 1412 and 1413 apparently on St. Martin's day (11 November) (113, 128), are not described other than as an election. The annual meetings were apparently not usually included in the Entry Book before 1415 (155), though the meeting in 1393 (198) is an exception. Up to 1414 the usual order of entries has the record of a meeting in October followed by notes of accounts for the preceding year and then the record of the first meeting under the new mayor in November or December. Although it is possible that the record of a few of the annual meetings is missing because of the damage to the manuscript, it is more likely that the annual meeting, held by 1393 in St. Edmund's church (198) as noted below, was regarded as different from the other meetings and recorded separately. Many of the meetings recorded under the heading Convocatio were evidently not general assemblies of all the citizens but were in fact meetings of the mayor's court (e.g. 177) or of the councils of the Twenty-Four or the Forty-Eight, which are discussed below.

The agreement of 1306 provided for the establishment of a guild merchant, a name which in other cities and boroughs was used of an administrative body. Salisbury's guild merchant is not known to have had any administrative function. As provided for in 1306 it comprised merchants, craftsmen, and others to the number of some 300, and it may have been the reconstitution of a body which had existed from the foundation of New Salisbury. The mayor and commonalty of the city were joined for religious and social purposes in the guild or fraternity of St. George, which may have been another name for the guild merchant.¹ In the Entry Book are frequent references to the fraternity, which was clearly distinct from the meetings of citizens held for administrative purposes.

Those meetings were held at apparently irregular intervals, except for the annual meeting on or near All Souls' day at which elections were made. From 1416 freeholders of the city were penalized 6d. 'and ale' if they failed to attend a meeting to which they were summoned (419, an entry summarizing an ordinance that is not found earlier in the book; cf. 203). The numbers of men named as attending the meetings fluctuated widely, from as few as seven (189, 291) to nearly one hundred (300). For a large proportion of the meetings, however, the Entry Book is illegible, while for some no list of those attending was included in the Entry Book, and in many the list of names ends

with 'and others' or 'and others whose names appear on the list' (e.g. 146), indicating that the Entry Book was not the only (or indeed the primary) record of attendance.

The question whether Salisbury had an urban patriciate has been addressed elsewhere. The conclusions are that the city's élite was drawn from a wide range of occupations and that neither a single class of great merchants nor a small group of families was dominant. Within each mayoralty, however, there appears to have been a group of between five and eight men whose attendance is regularly recorded,² but there is no evidence that such a group had any formal existence. Larger and formal groups of senior or influential citizens were the councils of the Twenty-Four and the Forty-Eight, of which the Twenty-Four was the inner or superior body. They were in existence by 1364;³ the Twenty-Four is first mentioned in the Entry Book in 1413, when the assembly ordered that its members, along with six advisers, were to wear a silken livery (128), and an election of new members of the Twenty-Four, to fill vacancies caused by death, is recorded at the All Souls' day meeting in 1417 (185). The Entry Book first mentions the Forty-Eight by that name only in April 1445 (397) and election to it in September of the same year (399). In 1419 an ordinance requiring that members of the councils present in Salisbury should attend the masses for citizens who had died mentions members of the Twenty-Four, who were to be fined 2 lb. of wax for nonattendance, and those of the other Twenty-Four, for whom the fine was 1 lb. of wax (127, 206): the other Twenty-Four was perhaps a temporary alternative form of the Forty-Eight. The fines in wax were later demanded for non-attendance at council meetings (397, 399-400, 407. 499, 411). A few lists of those attending meetings clearly distinguish members of the two councils (e.g. 438), but more are simply arranged in a way that appears tacitly to acknowledge the distinction (e.g. 425). The more important of the city's officials, including the mayor, aldermen, serjeants, and reeve, seem invariably to have been drawn from the Twenty-Four while constables and chamberlains were usually from the Forty-Eight.⁴ A larger select group of sixty citizens was mentioned in 1393, when its members were to be dressed uniformly in silk for a visit to the city by the king (194). Later references in the Entry Book suggest that the silk liveries were worn only by the Twenty-Four and the city's legal advisers (128), and only on special occasions, including Christmas (e.g. 170, 268) and visits by the king (300) and other great men (253). In 1412 a man who had served as a collector of taxes (e.g. 71, 109) was fined f_{2} for wearing the livery when he was not one of, presumably, the Twenty-Four (113).

The damage to the book makes it difficult to know precisely how frequent the meetings were, and it seems that the principle on which it was compiled was not consistent. In the 47 years from 1406 (when the record becomes more or less continuous) to 1452 there were nearly 320 meetings, not counting election meetings, an average of

a little under seven each year. The average is increased by the relative frequency of meetings recorded between 1410 and 1420, when there might be twelve or more meetings in a year. Later the number of meetings recorded each year was usually between four and six. In 1449, however, twelve meetings were recorded, five of them in the five week period from 6 June to 8 July, but in that period a high proportion of the meetings recorded were apparently not of the citizens generally but of the councils of the Twenty-Four and the Forty-Eight, whose meetings may not have been regularly recorded in the earlier years covered by the Entry Book. Since meetings were evidently called to deal with particular pieces of business, including the business of the mayor's court, they might be at very short intervals: the assembly of 15 Nov. 1415, the first of a new mayoralty, was followed the next day by one to deal with the king's writ demanding the levy of a tax (**156–7**).

The meetings of the citizens and their councils were held in various places, which are not recorded in the earlier parts of the Entry Book. The mayor paid rent in 1406 for a house where accounts were audited (54), which stood opposite the Guildhall (64) and was used for discussions (71). The Council House, apparently the building by St. Thomas's church¹ and perhaps the house being built next to St. Thomas's cemetery in 1408 (71), was mentioned by name in 1409–10, when the city's reeves were paying rent for it (89). The mayor paid the rent in 1410-11 (98) and the city chamberlains in 1413-14 (140) and 1419-20, in the latter year to the dean and chapter (217). The Council House was to be used to keep goods and chattels distrained upon for nonpayment of rent in 1417 (179-180), in 1419 a coffer containing money was kept in a chest there (212) and a charter was kept in the common chest there (462). From 1430 the mayor's chest was kept there and payments were made there (270, 275, 282, 343, 459), a bond was to be brought there 1440 (354), and accounts were audited there 1449 (423); in 1416 the common chest had been in St. Thomas's church (130; cf. e.g. 108, 158). Meetings were held at the Council House from 1416 (160, 189, 205, 214-15, 266, 291, 294, 313), but they were also held at the bishop's Guildhall (177, 181-2, 231, 293, 295, 341) and the annual meeting for elections on All Souls' day was held by custom in St. Edmund's church (198, 299, 309, 418). In 1428 the assembly was said to be at the Council House because the Guildhall was in use by the king (258). The meetings in 1445, 1447, and 1449 of the mayor's council were held at the Council House (395, 410, 432).

CIVIC OFFICERS

Of the English cities controlled by their bishops, Salisbury had the most articulated administration, and the number of offices recorded increased during the fifteenth century. The proliferation of offices was perhaps intended to spread responsibility.² The Entry Book mentions in the late fourteenth century the mayor, aldermen (14), serjeants (33),

and collectors and assessors (15), while reeves, constables, and coroners are known from other sources. To them were added by or in the fifteenth century attorneys, a city clerk, chamberlains, overseers of wards, a steward of the borough court, and a subwarden of the almshouse. To most of those offices the Entry Book describes the holders as being elected, a word may which may mean no more than 'chosen', not that the men were voted into office. Elections of the mayor, the members of parliament (233), and the chamberlains, however, were made following nominations to those offices, and the wording of a resolution of 1445 that the members of parliament, the serjeants, and the priest of the fraternity of St. George should be resident in the city suggests that a vote was held in the selection of those office-holders (396).

Men paid fines to escape from serving the offices of mayor, reeve, and alderman, to avoid either the responsibility or the loss of time involved. To be excused serving as mayor one paid the large sum of $\pounds 20$ before 1398 (11) and in 1408 another paid $\pounds 10$ (71). Neither the introduction of an annual fee for the mayor nor the increasing dignity of the position was enough to persuade all candidates to accept the mayoralty: in 1444 one paid $\pounds 3$ to be excused the office in perpetuity (394), in 1449 three men were similarly excused in perpetuity for 40 marks ($\pounds 26$ 13s. 4d.) each (432), and in 1450 another three paid $\pounds 20$ each (440). To be excused serving as reeve some men were ready in 1418 to pay a fine of $\pounds 3$ (202), and one, having refused the office, refused to pay the fine (211). The fine was only $\pounds 2$ in 1432 (418), 1445 (401), and 1449 (436), $\pounds 1$ 6s. 8d. in 1437 (333) and 1438 (341). Fines for being excused the office of alderman were levied at $\pounds 3$ in 1421 (227), 1428 (260), and 1429 (264), $\pounds 5$ in 1432 (418), at 6 marks ($\pounds 4$) in 1437 (333), $\pounds 2$ in 1438 (341) in 1440 (354), and $\pounds 4$ in 1443 (387); from 1442 a fine of $\pounds 4$ excused men the offices of both alderman and reeve (373, 394, 401, 415, 422, 436, 448, 456).

The Mayor

Salisbury may have had a mayor, acting as the leader and representative of the community, from the foundation of the city, but neither the charter of 1225 nor that of 1227 mentioned any organization of city officers. The first documented reference to the mayor was in 1249, when he carried out a decision in a civil case made by the court of Salisbury over which episcopal officers presided.¹ In 1290 and 1303 the mayor witnessed conveyances.²

The mayor presided at meetings not only of the citizens generally and of the councils of the Twenty-Four and the Forty-Eight but also of what was in effect, if not in law, a mayor's court. Before him appeared people accused of slander (e.g. 165–6), commercial malpractice (266), and irregular trading in the market (250). In 1417 it was agreed that the mayor and community should hold the seal of the deputy aulnager for

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Salisbury and Wiltshire (175), which gave the meetings presided over by the mayor greater authority in regulating the cloth trade (180–1, 186, 190).

Until 1409 the mayor was not only the city's leader but also its chief financial officer. The tax gathered by collectors in the four wards of the city was handed over to him (e.g. 280), and he received the rents and other payments due to the community. From those receipts he met a wide variety of expenses, in fees and payments in kind to the city's officials, in travelling, subsistence, and entertainment, in gifts (often in the form of wine) to dignitaries and outside officials, and in providing liveries for the members of the councils and for the city's officials (e.g. 216). In 1409 it was decided that the chamberlains should levy and receive all payments due to the community (79), as mentioned below, and in 1445 it was decided that the mayor should not receive any payment due to the city except by the hands of the chamberlains (400). The mayor presented his accounts, usually towards the end of his term of office. The mayor who presented his account apparently in Sept. 1410 agreed to forgo the repayment of some of his expenses (84). Though most if not all of them were ultimately reimbursed, the mayor's expenses may have reduced the attraction of the position. In 1416 the outgoing mayor was thought to have performed the office so well that he was given an allowance of f_{10} in addition to his expenses, and it was agreed that any future mayor who held the office twice should have a similar sum beyond his expenses (167). A regular yearly allowance for the mayor was discussed but not agreed in 1419 (212), and one of $\neq 10$, paid about that time to a former mayor and one about to take office (218), was approved by the assembly in 1420 (221). In 1424 the retiring mayor was allowed an additional $\cancel{1}$,5 at the end of his fourth (and second successive) term (244). Five years later the retiring mayor was allowed 5 marks beyond his fee of \pounds ,10 because when prices were high he had sold corn cheap (264).

An evident increase in the importance of the mayor's office during the fifteenth century was accompanied by practices which add to its dignity. A deputy mayor was recorded in the second decade of that century (**79**, **171–2**). From 1420 the mayor was to be attended by the chaplain of the fraternity of St. George (**216**). The chaplain was to live in the mayor's house, the mayor receiving an allowance for his board (**221**) and paying him 1s. a week if he was too ill to stay with the mayor (**244**). In 1429 it was ordered that maces were to be carried in front of the mayor by the serjeants (**265**, **275**), and in 1435 that the third serjeant or macebearer should wait on the mayor's serjeant (**413**, **450**), while the maces were gilded in 1447 (**414**) and one of them was to be mended in 1450 (**440**). For two annual gatherings at midsummer, recorded from 1440 when all were to wear their best clothes (**352**), the mayor was reimbursed for providing firewood and two casks of good ale (e.g. **367**); men were fined for not coming to watch with the mayor (**410**), and in 1451 it was ordered that each member of the Twenty-Four was to have an armed man to accompany the mayor on those nights (**442**).

The mayor was elected annually at the meeting of citizens held usually on All Souls' day. Two references to a mayor elect (134, 184) apparently result from the retiring mayor serving out his term after the election of his successor. For the seventy-four years

1380–1453 the Entry Book gives the names of forty-nine mayors (assuming that the mayors of 1429–30 and 1449–50 were not the same as their namesakes more than forty years earlier), and a further four may be added from the list given by Hatcher.¹ Eleven of those men were mayor for more than one term, three of them for, respectively, three, four, and five terms.² After 1453 three of the mayors of before that date held the office again.³

In 1428 the assembly agreed that anyone who had been mayor was to be quit of the office for five years, provided that there were three other suitable men who might be nominated from the Twenty-Four for election by the commons, (**258**) a rule that was confirmed, without the proviso, in 1429 (**264**) and 1451 (**448**; cf. **419B**). The rule, which was repeatedly ignored in the rest of the fifteenth century, may have been designed to prevent a mayor from serving a second term within a short period, but it is more likely that it was to spare him from serving again an office that was seen as burdensome. Perhaps unusually large fines, as mentioned above, were intended to discourage avoidance.⁴

While the Entry Book does not indicate the occupations of many of the mayors, the lists which it includes of taxpayers place them normally in the highest or second highest level of wealth. In 1436 twelve of the seventeen people assessed for 10s. or 13s. 4d. had been or were to become mayor (**321A–D**). Not all the mayors were uniformly chosen from among the ranks of the great merchants, the mercers and drapers. Two grocers, for example, were successively mayor 1392–4 (**197, 200**).

The aulnage returns of 1396–7 and ward lists of 1399–1400⁵ reveal something of the range of economic status among the mayors. The average number of cloths held by ten men who had been or were to become mayors was 55, but the numbers ranged from a minimum of 5½ cloths to a maximum of 131. Similarly the ward lists reveal an average assessment of 5s. 4d., with a range from 4d., the lowest possible assessment, to 13s. 4d,, the highest recorded. Both in the aulnage returns and in the ward lists the averages for the mayors are substantially above those for the city as a whole, especially in the ward lists where most people paid only 4d. or 6d.. That the averages for mayors are not higher implies not that the mayors were fairly close in wealth to the citizens at large, but rather that the office was held by men from within a wide economic range, a testimony to the ability of citizens to rise from relatively modest beginnings.

Reeves

The functions performed in some other towns by bailiffs⁶ were performed in Salisbury by reeves elected by the citizens, apparently annually at their meeting on All Souls' day

(e.g. 155), but responsible among other things for collecting dues to be paid to the bishop (89). In 1412, the assembly ordered the inspection of the reeves' rolls, probably to ensure that they had properly accounted for the bishop's income (113). The only mention of portreeves in the Entry Book (15) is presumably of the same officers. The book contains a single reference to the election of bailiffs, in 1417 when two were elected (185). They were presumably the same as reeves, of which the city had had two in 1265.1 An officer was described as city reeve in 1410 and 1411, when he was to have a livery, suggesting a single reeve, though the record of the same meeting in 1411 also mentions a payment to the bishop by the city reeves (91, 98, 185); it may be that one reeve was appointed by the bishop and another was elected by the citizens. The man mentioned as the liveried reeve in 1411 was called bailiff in 1418, when the question of his livery was deferred (203); in 1420 and 1423 he was to have his livery with others paid by the city (217, 237). He was not one, however, of any of the pairs of city reeves who were recorded and elected between 1414 and 1418 (140, 155, 169, 202). From 1418 various men agreed, as mentioned above, to pay a fine to be excused the office of city reeve. Later in the century the two reeves were elected at the annual meeting on All Souls' day, a new pair each year (e.g. 273, 279, 299).

Aldermen

Each of the four aldermen of medieval Salisbury presided over one of the wards or aldermanries into which the city was divided.² The aldermen occupied the second most significant urban office, ranking immediately below the mayor.³ They were responsible for both peace-keeping and tax-collection, though the assessment and collection of taxes was done by men elected for those tasks (see below). From 1415 onwards the election of the four aldermen at the meeting on All Souls' day was regularly recorded in the Entry Book after the election of the mayor (e.g. 155, 185). The assembly sometimes required them to supervise the execution of particular orders within their wards. Several men paid fines, as mentioned above, to be excused the office of alderman, sometimes the office of reeve also. In 1423 a royal writ ordered the mayor, aldermen, and community of Salisbury to desist from compelling a clerk in holy orders to serve as alderman by reason of his tenement in the city and to reimburse any fine imposed on him for refusing the office (239-40). The mayor and aldermen replied that they had not compelled him and that he had willingly sworn to perform the office (though his name does not otherwise appear in the Entry Book), appointing a deputy in his place (241).

While mayors usually had held several other civic offices, the aldermen often held only a few and were drawn from a broader spectrum of occupations. The alderman

elected for Market ward in 1418 (211) was apparently a cordwainer (213). The alderman elected for St. Martin's ward in 1436 (323) was evidently a dyer (319) whose only other known office was that of collector (318). The alderman for Market ward 1449–50 (436) was a glover who had been a collector (400) and was later reeve (456). The alderman for Meadow ward 1436–7 (323), however, was apparently a member of the Forty-Eight (431) and served in a variety of offices and not only in Meadow ward (253, 371, 385, 400, 461). Residence, or at least long residence, in the city was evidently not required of those elected as alderman since men from Fordingbridge (279) and Bristol (368), neither of whom are found elsewhere in the Entry Book, were elected, and one from Warminster was dispensed from the office, promising to give $\pounds 3$ (155).

Assessors and Collectors

Regularly throughout the Entry Book the election is recorded of assessors and collectors of levies for a variety of purposes, including the repayment of the mayors' expenses and loans and taxes demanded by the king. Each of the four wards had at least two assessors and two collectors in each instance. Collecting taxes was, as ever, an unpopular task, and in 1449 it was agreed that in future the collectors of a fifteenth and tenth should be paid a fee for their work (407).

Coroners

In 1410 the mayor obtained a writ which allowed the community to choose two coroners for the city (89) and the election of one or two coroners is recorded from time to time as vacancies occurred (e.g. 128, 358). The office was sometimes held by the mayor (275).¹ Coroners held the pleas of the crown and saw that the reeves were just administrators.

Constables

The city had two constables, who were elected either to fill vacancies as they occurred (e.g. 81, 262) or as a pair (e.g. 242). The two chosen in 1416 were said to be appointed to keep the watch (163). The number was increased in 1449 to four, one for each ward (427), and the following year to two for each ward, to keep the peace (438), reflecting, like other decisions recorded in the Entry Book, the uncertainty of the times. The increase to eight was apparently temporary: only four were elected and sworn in 1451 (442), but in that year it was agreed that there should be watchmen and wardens of the city by night 'during these days of unrest', to be sworn in by the mayor and constables (444). Most of the constables went on to higher civic office, often as members of parliament or mayors.

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Serjeants

Two serjeants were elected at the annual meeting on All Souls' day in 1416 (169) and regularly thereafter. They served for just one year (e.g. 185, 202) until the 1430s, when the same pair of men began to be elected each year (e.g. 309, 323). They were sometimes mentioned as serjeants at mace or serjeants of the gaol, reflecting their functions as, respectively, ceremonial officers and the custodians of prisoners (205). They summoned the citizens to attend meetings (350) and to appear before the mayor (e.g. 107). In 1430 they were put in charge of the common ditch surrounding the city, with the responsibility of scouring and repairing it and paying 13s. 4d. a year for the profit which they could make from it (269). In 1451 one of the two serjeants was to have a house in which he was to live and keep any prisoners, and the two serjeants were to look after the city's weigh-beam and take its profits, for which they were to pay 13s. 4d. a year (450). In 1416 it was agreed that there should be a third serjeant because of the king's expected visit (170). In 1435 the assembly ordered that a third macebearer or serjeant should be appointed, with a wide range of responsibilities: he was to wait on the mayor, act as a chamberlain in collecting rents and seeing to the maintenance of buildings belonging to the city (being paid for that \pounds , 2 a year like the chamberlains), and was to act as subwarden of Holy Trinity hospital for a wage of \pounds , 1 6s. 8d., receiving also a gown and food and drink (303, cf. 313). In 1439, when the assembly was evidently trying to economize, the need for the third macebearer was in question (349), but the following year one was appointed at a salary of 6s. 8d. with food and clothing (355) and in 1450 the salary was 13s. 4d. (450), which may have come, as in 1447, from the profits of the city's weigh-beam (413).

The City Clerk

The assembly appointed two clerks of the city in 1404 (43) apparently for distinct purposes:¹ in the following year, when their wages and their right to a livery were mentioned, one of the men was described as the city's attorney in the Common Bench and for searching the rolls to identify outlaws, while the other was then clerk of the city (44), as later (e.g. 64, 203). The city clerk was presumably responsible for recording the proceedings in the assembly and the mayor's court, and for prescribed fees he wrote and enrolled the deeds by which people held city property (292), which were sealed with the city's common seal (33). In 1420 it was ordered that no deed should be sealed with the mayoral seal, evidently distinct from the common seal, except by the city clerk (216).

The office of clerk grew in importance and was lucrative. The attorney appointed in 1404 and 1405 became city clerk in 1420 (**215–16**) and in 1442, after nearly forty years' service, retired on a pension (**370**). He had been paid an additional fee in 1421 for work in trying to obtain letters patent relating to the city's liberties (**220**) and in

1424 was to ride to London on legal business (310). His successor, having agreed in 1448 to resign (422) in favour of a notary, was in 1449 reappointed to the office (424), but was discharged in 1451, and the notary was appointed after the king had sent a writ in his favour (445). The new clerk was elected to the Twenty-Four later that year (448).

Attorneys

The citizens of Salisbury retained both an attorney, salaried and liveried as mentioned above, and other legal advisers who also received salaries and liveries. One of the two advisers retained in 1405 was John Gowayn (44), who in 1393 had been the bishop's steward (196). Counsel retained in 1417 (185) and 1418, as in earlier years (203), was still retained in 1435 at his old wages and livery (310). Other salaried advisers were appointed in 1447 (412) and 1449 (431), and in 1452 a member of the Forty-Eight and the former city clerk were paid annual fees for giving advice (455).

Chamberlains

Although Hatcher wrote of mention in the mid-fourteenth century of a chamberlain who was receiver and treasurer of the city,¹ the assembly's decision in 1409 to elect two chamberlains to receive all payments owed to the community, with a comptroller to keep a counter-roll (79), appears to have been a new departure.² While references to the comptroller later in the Entry Book are rare (90, 179), the chamberlains assumed functions previously performed by the mayor (80, 135, 227), gradually acquiring greater control of the city's finances (136, 149, 171, 221). The chamberlains were sometimes renewed in their office from year to year (e.g. 133); the replacement of the two in 1419 (208) may have been either because they had been unsatisfactory or because they deserved to be relieved from an onerous task. A new chamberlain was elected from time to time, to replace one of the two previously in office (280, 285, 293).

Auditors

Although there is little evidence of the activity of the comptroller of the chamberlains, references to auditors of various accounts and assessments, mentioned in 1404 when they were to be chosen by the mayor and a select group (43), become increasingly frequent. Audit was made a regular practice in 1417 (188), and auditors were drawn from those with experience of civic office. In 1446 the mayor, two former mayors, and two others were to supervise both the assessment and the collection of a levy for the expenses of the members of parliament (403), and in 1447 the assessors elected for the year, presumably of all accounts, were the mayor, two members of the Twenty-Four, both former mayors, and two members of the Forty-Eight (414).

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Other Officers

Besides numerous functions performed by members of the city's councils, the Entry Book refers intermittently to minor officers. In 1433 a supervisor (who was later to be mayor, 1452–3) was appointed for the weigh-beam which the chamberlains were instructed to provide (293), which in 1435 all were required to use (310), and which was later controlled by the serjeants, as mentioned above. The assembly agreed to the removal of the subwarden of the almshouse, otherwise Holy Trinity hospital, and the appointment of a successor in 1418 (204) and 1419 (208); the mastership of the hospital was vested in the mayor for the time being,¹ and the mayor's serjeant came to act as subwarden, again as mentioned above. In 1443 the assembly agreed to a levy for the wages of a 'raker' or refuse collector (388). The four porters, one for each of the city's gates, whose appointment was sanctioned by the bishop in the mid fourteenth century,² find no mention in the Entry Book; their office may have lapsed, and the watchmen and wardens who were to be sworn in 1451 served some of the same purposes (444).

THE BUSINESS OF THE ASSEMBLY

In addition to recording the names of those present at meetings and the election or appointment of civic officers, the Entry Book reflects the varied business of the assembly. That business included the election of members of parliament and the payment of their expenses, the presentation by officers of their accounts of receipts and expenses, arrangements for the assessment and collection of taxes and other dues, supervision of charities and city property, disputes between citizens, and the regulation of trade and hygiene.³The attempts by the citizens to wrest greater independence from the control of the bishop and his officials do not feature strongly in the Entry Book, though there are indications that it was a lasting preoccupation of the mayor and his colleagues, as in the order that the bishop's clerk of the market should not enter the city to perform his office (353), in the deputation to discuss with the bishop the revival (as the citizens saw it) of the city's liberties (389), and in the raising of 23 marks to appease the bishop for granting the 'old customs' (392). The Entry Book is largely silent about Cade's rebellion of 1450, which though more than a local feud resulted in the murder of the bishop of Salisbury by the hand of a Salisbury man. It does include, however, the king's certificate of a commissioner sent, following the rebellion, to inquire into sedition in the southwest (436A) and the writs mentioned in the record of an assembly of 1451 (445) may have resulted from acts of violence committed during the rebellion.

Parliamentary Representation

The assembly elected the city's members of parliament. The usual practice appears to have been to elect one senior and one less experienced man (231). All those elected

were citizens except perhaps for a man described as esquire who served in the parliament of 1442 (375). Some citizens repeatedly represented the city, and many of the representatives had or would hold the office of mayor. The assembly imposed a levy from which to pay the members' expenses, normally at the standard rate of 2s. a day, though between 1447 and 1449 the assembly, apparently in an economizing mood, paid only 1s. per day (e.g. 408, 425). The totals could be large: the members attending the parliament of 1433 were paid for 118 days (296).

Taxation and Finance

Much of the assembly's attention was devoted to the collection of various levies. Besides the expenses of members of parliament, on the one hand were the taxes granted to the king by parliament and loans demanded by the king, and on the other were local requirements, either occasional, like the money raised for the purchase of the George Inn (43) and for the payment of soldiers recruited in Salisbury for the defence of Calais (317, 321), or the recurrent reimbursement of expenditure by the mayor and other civic officers. National taxes were assessed as a notional tenth or fifteenth of the taxpayers movable goods. For the loans the citizens asked for sureties of repayment, which was often to come from the customs on wool paid at Southampton (e.g. 150).

The money held by the city's officers was presumably kept in the common chest (108) or in the small chest with two locks in the mayor's keeping (121). The assembly elected keepers of the keys of the common chest (e.g. 310), and in 1447 the chest was to have four keys, one with the mayor, one with a member of the Twenty-Four, and two with members of the Forty-Eight (414). In 1440 the common seal of the city and the common purse were to be placed under no fewer than six locks (354). The assembly's care with the money in its custody is shown also by the appointment of auditors, as mentioned above.

The Economy of the City

Cloth manufacture accounted for the bulk of Salisbury's economic prosperity in the period of the Entry Book, and the occupations most frequently recorded were connected with the making and selling of cloth. Apart from dealing with sub-standard cloths (180–1, 186, 190), the assembly was much concerned about the imposition of new tolls at Southampton in 1411 (92–4, 102) and about the introduction of new standard measurements for cloths (101, 115), which it was alleged made it impossible to produce to the legal requirements the striped cloths, or 'rays' (104), for which Salisbury was famous.¹

The craftsmen of the city were organized in trade guilds, which the Entry Book mentions infrequently. In 1441, in connection with the completion of the great ditch, it named the stewards of nineteen guilds, comprising thirty-eight specified trades. Some of the groupings of trades within a guild are surprising, cooks with barbers, saddlers

with cutlers and other metal-workers, vintners with fishmongers, bowyers and fletchers with building trades (362). In 1421, when the assembly restricted the sale of cloths made in Salisbury (219F), the book listed the names of the stewards and members, both masters and journeymen, of two of the most important guilds, the weavers and fullers (219B-E).

The Regulation of Retail Trade and Nuisances

The market was under the control of the bishop's officers, but the citizens' assembly and officers contrived to involve themselves in the regulation of retail trade. In the exercise of the assize of bread the mayor was on equal footing with the bishop's bailiff,¹ and the Entry Book records the punishment in 1401 of bakers who sold defective bread (40). It is perhaps surprising that that is the only record in the book relating to the assize of bread. In 1417 the mayor's court, sitting in the Guildhall, heard a case against a man for regrating (177). The assembly made orders in 1416 about selling outside the hours of daylight (167), in 1438 about the hoarding of grain (344), and in 1439 about the sale of cooked meat (349).

Most of the assembly's orders in relation to the market and retail trade were clearly intended to avoid nuisances, particularly from the butchers' trade. In 1415 the stalls of the outside butchers were relocated next to the ditch behind Butcher Row, where the street was to be improved (145). The orders were different for outside and for resident butchers presumably because the outside butchers slaughtered their animals and disposed of the offal before coming to the city. In 1423 the assembly ordered that animals should be slaughtered not in the street in front of Butcher Row but behind the row (236), an order that apparently needed reiteration in 1434 (295, 298), and the removal and rendering of the offal was to be done at night (236). In 1437, however, the assembly agreed that at a cost of $\pounds 3$ the butchers' stalls should be moved back from the common ditch to their former place by the market (327–8). In 1445 the assembly resolved that resident butchers should perform no slaughtering or scalding except at the newly constructed scalding house near Fisherton Bridge (398), and in 1447 that while the outside butchers should remain in the market the resident butchers should sell meat only from their own houses (413).

Fishmongers and the sellers of other produce that was liable to rot were also the subject of ordinances: in 1427 fishmongers were placed by the common ditch, with outside fishmongers apart from and behind the resident fishmongers (260), the resident fishmongers having their stalls opposite the Guildhall in 1432, and there was special provision for oysters and other shellfish. Dairy produce and fruit were to be sold in a particular place, and rabbits were to be sold only in the market (286). An order of 1418 about pigs, geese, and ducks (203, cf. 236) was probably also intended to avoid nuisance. The assembly also sought to remove or limit the obstruction and hazard of animals brought into the city either carrying goods (167, 236) or to be offered for sale (260): once pack-animals had been unloaded they were to be removed from the market and

the streets, and animals offered for sale were to be kept at Barnwell Cross and Culver Street in the south-east corner of the city.

The assembly concerned itself with two other forms of potential nuisance. It provided, early in the period covered by the Entry Book, for two refuse carts manned by a team of four (271, cf. 294). In 1438 it ordered that the mayor should negotiate with the dean and chapter (the bishopric being vacant) for digging a pit in market in which to put market refuse (335), and in 1445 it authorized the mayor to make a five-year contract with the refuse collectors (396), having two years earlier agreed to pay a 'raker', as mentioned above. To control a nuisance of another kind it ordered in 1433 that the prostitutes' brothel should be at the cottages in Friary Lane (291). In 1442 it was ordered that the prostitutes should live in Culver Street (372), as confirmed in 1450 with the addition of the penalty of imprisonment at the mayor's discretion if they did not obey (440), and in 1452 they were to be removed from Culver Street to outside the city, were not to loiter in the city, and were to wear striped hoods,¹ on pain of imprisonment (451).

Watercourses, Streets, and Bridges

The condition of the elaborate system of channels which carried water through the city was a recurrent concern. An ordinance of 1416 imposed a penalty on those who obstructed or fouled the watercourse running through the middle of the city (167). In 1429 it was ordered that willows planted in the common ditch were to be uprooted, the ground appropriated for them being remade, and all the defects in the ditch were to be made good under a surveyor appointed by the mayor (263). Apparently at about the same time a collection was made among the citizens for repairing the common ditch (262). In 1452 the condition of the ditch was to be discussed with the bishop, and a committee of seventeen from the Twenty-Four and the Forty-Eight was formed to oversee the paving of the streets and the ordering of privies, ditches, and sewers (452–3). The great ditch surrounding the city on the north and east sides, and forming part of its defences, was made the responsibility of the serjeants in 1430 (269) but two years later was assigned to one of the chamberlains (286). The same man still enjoyed the grazing rights there in 1441 (359), but in the same year major work was done on the great ditch (362, 364–6).

In 1393, with the arrival of Richard II impending, twelve citizens were made responsible for the repair and improvement of Minster Street and all broken streets (194). In 1452 when the paving committee was formed the assembly prohibited the use of sledges attached to carts and of elongated packs dragging on the ground behind pack-animals because of the damage done to the streets and ditches (453). The numerous

watercourses required bridges to cross them. In 1389 a group of men were given permission to build what appears to have been a temporary bridge to take a cart across the ditch at St. Edmund's church (271). Bridge repairs are not infrequently recorded: in 1406 and 1408, for example, the mayor claimed for money spent on work on the bridge carrying High Street across the common ditch (64, 71) and in 1414 the chamberlains claimed for more extensive work to the same (140). The maintenance of Fisherton Bridge, the way over the Avon into the city from the west, was mentioned in 1388 (3) and 1430 (272).

City Property

The city paid the 100 marks to the Crown in 1406 to secure the right to hold property in mortmain (53), a development which may have led to the appointment of chamberlains three years later and may also have resulted in less cordial relations with the bishop.¹ The citizens bought some property with money which they contributed, notably the George Inn in 1404 (before they had obtained the mortmain licence) (43), and the assembly gave its attention to the running or letting of that property (78, 121, 130, 132, 203). Other property was left to the city in wills (e.g. 113). Yearly obits in the churches of the city commemorated those who had made such gifts (e.g. 206), and rentals scattered throughout the Entry Book show the extent of the property (e.g. 126). The city's chamberlains supervised the repair of houses (e.g. 140) that were not to be repaired by their tenants (e.g. 209). In 1431 an ordinance provided that all houses within the city still thatched with straw were to be roofed in tile (275): the fire hazard posed by thatched roofs in the close quarters of the city is obvious.

War, Civil Disturbance, and the Resolution of Disputes

The Entry Book records the city's involvement with fighting elsewhere. In 1405 the mayor paid the wages of archers sent to the king in Wales (44), and a further payment for men delayed in Wales was necessary in 1407 (64). It records that the king's letter for an array in 1415 was read and quotes at length the account of the Agincourt campaign (154). Men at arms and archers from Salisbury were sent at the city's expense to defend Calais in 1436 (313, 315, 317, 321), and preparations were made for a similar force in 1451 (443–4).² For defence at home in 1440 barriers were to be raised within the city, and guildsmen were to be mustered (350); a new north gate had been built (354), work was done on the walls around the city (353), and the construction of the great ditch began (358).

Before the Agincourt campaign, on an August Sunday in 1415, a fight broke out between some Salisbury inhabitants and the duke of Lancaster's men, who were camped to the west of Salisbury beyond Fisherton Bridge. The soldiers attacked the citizens

with swords and arrows and killed four of them after a chase (151). Afterwards the city provided for extra security and paid for the burial of one of the men who were killed (153). No other incident of comparable violence is recorded before Cade's rebellion, about which the Entry Book maintains a discreet silence.

Most of the disputes which came to the attention of the assembly or the mayor's court arose from offensive words, of a more or less serious nature (e.g. 446). One man, William Reynold, appears to have been a trouble-maker, having been involved in a dispute about assessment for tax (13), petitioning the king about false imprisonment for speaking allegedly treasonable words (34), doing penance in 1416 for his wicked words against a fellow citizen (161), and being imprisoned in 1417 for accusing others of treason (178) and again in 1419 for scandalous words (205). There were, however, apparently two men of the name in 1399 (138), one of whom had been a tax collector (15, 17) and was several times recorded as a leading tax payer and as attending the assembly. Other disputes arising from taxation that came to the hearing of the mayor and his fellows concerned violence against a collector (64), refusal to pay and to answer a summons for that refusal (107), an accusation against the assessors of perjury (165), and criticism of the mayor and the ward alderman (166). A member of the Twenty-Four was in 1425 removed from the office of constable, barred from meetings, and fined for infringing the mayor's regulations about trading in the market (250). Another member of the Twenty-Four, the mercer Thomas Freeman, was in 1426 fined a pipe of red wine and £1 for a breakfast for the Twenty-Four (256) for defaming the mayor, and three years later was charged with bringing a false plea of debt and an accusation of breach of the peace against another citizen; he was forgiven on the intervention of his friends (266) and later served as mayor for two terms, 1436-8.1

EDITORIAL METHOD

This edition is in effect a slightly abbreviated translation, which omits some common form and insignificant verbiage. It ignores running cancellations and corrections in the manuscript, and excludes marginal notes that add nothing to what is in the main text. While it indicates the arrangement in columns of lists of names, it does not necessarily note where other kinds of information appear in the manuscript in columns or tabular form.

The text has been divided into distinct entries which are numbered to facilitate indexing and to indicate chronological separation. Most entries are meetings of the assembly, but some separate items, such as royal letters and the accounts of the mayors, have also been made into separate entries, particularly where the item was not evidently included in the discussion of the assembly or where it is an attachment (often vellum rather than paper) bound into the Entry Book as a separate piece.

The folio numbers of the most nearly complete foliation (see above, pp. x-xi) are given in square brackets. Where an inserted piece is omitted from that foliation it

has been assigned a folio-number according to the folio which it follows: e.g.: f. 27a; if two or more occur together, they have been designated 'a', 'b', etc., in sequential order.

Dates are given both in the form used in the manuscript and, in square brackets, in their modern form. In many places damage to the manuscript has made the date illegible, and where possible an approximate date is given in square brackets.

Damaged portions of the Entry Book have presented challenges. Much time spent with magnifying glass and ultraviolet lamp has resulted in the recovery of substantial passages which at first appeared illegible, but others, either damaged by water or obscured by repair material, have remained unread. Relatively short illegible passages are indicated by an ellipsis in round brackets (...). Presumed readings of illegible words are in roman type enclosed in round brackets, with a question mark to indicate those which are less certain.

The edition notes where an entry is in a language other than Latin. Where the actual words of the manuscript are thought to be of sufficient significance or difficulty they are added to the translation in round brackets and in italic type for words in Latin or French or, for words in English, in roman type in quotation marks. Where in an entry in Latin a word or phrase is in English or French it is put in quotation marks. Editorial corrections (including suggested revisions and words supplied to make good omissions) are enclosed in square brackets, and editorial comments are additionally in italic.

Surnames are given in the edition in the spelling of the manuscript, but forenames are given in their modern form. Place-names are, where possible, given in their modern form, with the manuscript form in brackets if it offers a point of interest. Sums of money and other figures, which in the manuscript are in roman numerals, are translated into arabic numerals, either with \mathcal{L} s. d. modernised or in marks. Sums of money which the manuscript expresses as more than 20s. or more than 12d. are translated in the edition into pounds and shillings.

Royal writ to John Neweman, mayor: John Milborn, merchant of Wiltshire, complained that whereas he had, before John Moner, former mayor, and William Bredewardyn, clerk for the recognizance of debts, acknowledged a debt of £40 to Thomas Godefray and Godefray had remitted and quitclaimed the debt to Milborn, as John Milborn, 'mercer' of Salisbury, as shown by a writing exhibited in Chancery, but afterwards sued Milborn for the same and had him imprisoned by Neweman, then mayor, and the king has ordered the justices at Westminster to hear the case and has ordered the sheriff of Wiltshire to summon Godefray to come before the justices at Westminster at one month from Easter to answer on the above, and because Ralph Spaldyng and Henry fitz John, both of Southwark, John Dene of London, 'grocer', and John [forename interlined] Weston of Salisbury stood bail for Milborn, the king ordered his release from prison if he was held only for the above reason, now the mayor is to have him released and is to come before the justices at Westminster on the quindene of Easter to show why he did not obey the order. [should be paid to]: John (. . .), Edward Clerk, Richard (Pay?), , Robert (. . .)olfel, Richard (. . .)erde, Henry Chubbe, Richard Spencer, Walter (. . .), [Thomas] Ryngwode, Robert Pottreffeld, William Wriche, Thomas Foul, John Sades, John Billyngshawe, John Mercer [*and six others illegible*], for whom there would be a tallage in the common form at the next assessment. Afterwards all were paid through Nicholas Hardyng, mayor.

The assembly was shown the king's letter patent to Richard Weston, John Noble, John Ruddok, and Richard Oward concerning the levy of a whole and a half fifteenth granted by the parliament held 2 Oct. [1407], a half to be collected on the Purification [2 Feb.], another half on 1 May following, and another on the Purification following [2 Feb. 1409].

Thomas Child and John Bakot citizens elected to parliament presented their expenses of \pounds 9 12s., to be levied with the first [half] fifteenth.

Elected as [assessors] for the first levy: Thomas Mason, Nicholas Melbury, William Doudyng, and Robert Blake; as collectors: John Durneford, (...), John Corscombe, and Nicholas Southam.

payment, William Doudyng gave the mayor \pounds 13 which he had his keeping, of which \pounds 10 was from John Forest's fine for being excused the office of mayor and \pounds 3 was from Thomas Knoyel senior for being excused from the office of alderman; Stephen Edyngdon gave to the mayor \pounds 5 acquired by him for the commonalty [for] praying for [the soul from the executors of *crossed out*] William Hykedon; John Nedler gave to the mayor \pounds 8 which he held.

Nicholas Southam and John Corscombe, collectors for Meadow ward, account for $\pounds 12$ (...) as appears in the list. They account in full and are quit. John Durneford and William Brante, collectors for Market ward, accounted in full to the mayor and auditors on 14 Mar. [1408] for the [roll] given to them containing $\pounds 15$ 15s. 2d., from which various payments and petitions were allowed to them such that they owed 7s. 6d. net. Thomas Boner and William Penyton, collectors for St. Martin's ward, accounted by the roll given to them containing $\pounds 18$ 19s. for the year, from which various payments and petitions were allowed to them as appears in the list, and so they owed 10d. net. Sum above owed from the first tallage by these collectors, 8s. 4d. The mayor, according to this account, was answerable for $\pounds 1$ 18s. 4d. received from the said collectors as appears below.

With the said 40 marks (...) the total sum to be levied by a tallage on the city was $\pounds 52$ 15s. 1d. Elected as assessors: John Beckot, John Parche, John Judde, and John Hogemann; as collectors: John Castelton, Richard Crischurche, Robert Wolf, and John Boteller.

Granted that William Penyton (?) have a place (*statum*) in the shops late of John Prentis, feoffees having had that place by grant of Richard Pate and Joan his wife, daughter of the said John Prentez by indenture paying yearly to the commonalty of the city 2 marks over and above the 2 marks to Pate and his wife for arrears in rent for the annual obits of John Prentiz, Katherine his wife, Thomas (...), and Alice his wife (...); and that Thomas Ar(...) skinner (...) above the latrine (...) friars preachers at Fisherton for the term of the indenture, paying yearly to the mayor and commonalty (...) at the Nativity of St John the Baptist [24 June] next to come, maintaining and repairing (...).

The mayor's account of his expenses and payments as in the detailed list (*per parcell'*) amounting to $\pounds 25$ 8s. 9d. He asked for an allowance for expenses, costs, and gifts given and sent to officials of the prince at his visit, for expenses sent and given to officials of the queen coming afterwards, for expenses of the bishop of Winchester coming for the money to be lent to the king, for other expenses made and sent to the bishop of Salisbury at various times and especially on his arrival from foreign parts for making peace (*pro unitate facienda*), and for other expenses made and sent to knights from Brittany at the queen's request by letter. For these said costs it was allowed that the tallage should amount to $\pounds 40$. Elected as assessors of that amount: John Hathewey, George Jocee, Richard Deverel, Stephen Edyngdon; as collectors: John Durneford, John Nouble merchant, John Shirle, John Chippenham.

city and the agreement made between Southampton and this city. They may act in the matter at the expense of the whole commonalty.

Moreover John Lake, Thomas Boner, Adam Teffonte, Richard Leche each lent 1 noble and Thomas Blechere lent 3s. 4d., towards the $\pounds 5$, together with $\pounds 3$ 10s. spent from the common purse attached with the city's seal, which $\pounds 5$ was given to Richard Spencer and William Waryn on 4 May for their expenses and costs in the matter until it can be levied on the city.

The mayor also accounted for $\pounds 5$ from William Salle late mayor from the loan of money in his hands from certain persons, each of them lending 1 noble towards the fund (*stauro*) for buying George's inn [and] for advancing the business between Salisbury and Southampton regarding the bad new customs newly started by them against the city; also for $\pounds 5$ of which $\pounds 3$ 10s. was spent from the common purse when the common seal was affixed and of which $\pounds 1$ 10s. was from other persons as appeared in the last assembly accountig for similar business; and for $\pounds 6$ 6s. 8d. [paid *crossed out*] for the costs of Walter Shirle and William Waryn prosecuting the same business in London and elsewhere, as in a pipe of wine for drink given to a worthy (*cuidam probo*) and for other expenses of the kind. Sum of the above $\pounds 16$ 6s. 8d.

Agreed by all: Walter Shirle, William Waryn, and William Walter to pursue the matter for a remedy, etc., [for which the said mayor and William Waryn put up and brought $\pounds 5$ crossed out] in aid of which the stewards of the weavers' guild put up $\pounds 5$ and the stewards of the fullers' guild [$\pounds 3$ crossed out] $\pounds 2$, until it can be levied in common through the city, to which assessment of one penny all agreed.

Present: the mayor and others his fellow citizens.

John Fissher, weaver, was arraigned for certain articles started by him to the opprobrium and destruction of the whole guild of weavers. So arraigned, he sought the indulgence (*ponit se in gracia*) of the mayor and masters of the guild, and swore to follow his craft faithfully.

104. Assembly: Monday the feast of St. Peter in Cathedra [22 Feb. 1412].

Present: the mayor and many others, both his fellow citizens and from the commons of the various guilds.

Walter Shirle, William Waryn and William Walter, sent to London for business as appears above reported that by the will of the king and other lords of the realm every striped cloth made falling short of 28 yards in length and 6 in width folded and tacked (*takkat'*) should be penalized. Agreed that three striped cloths be shown to the king in council, one unfinished ('rawe'), one partly fulled, and the third completely fulled and stretched, to show that cloth of this kind could not be made of that width.

Elected as assessors: Thomas Child, John Parch, Thomas Masone, John Corscombe; as collectors: William Slegge, Stephen Lythenard, William Stoute, George Jocee.

Richard Spencer and Walter Shirle presented the king's writ close, addressed to the mayor and bailiffs, for paying them $\pounds 11$ for [attending] the parliament held on the morrow of All Souls [3 Nov.]. Sent to London on the city's business as appears in preceding assemblies, they accounted for their expenses as appears in the list of this assembly, which were paid with their expenses in parliament, $\pounds 38$ 11s. 4d. as above. Elected as assessors: Thomas Child, John Parch, Thomas Mason, John Corscombe; as collectors: William Slegge, Stephen Lythenard, William Stoute, George Jocee.

107. Assembly: 9 June [1412].

Present: the mayor and many other of his fellow citizens.

Presented: the king's privy seal letter to the mayor, bailiffs, and good men of the city for an aid of $f_{1,000}$ for his voyage into France. After deliberation, Walter Shirle and William Walter were appointed to discuss with the king's council the reduction of the sum to 100 marks, which sum it was agreed to levy among the citizens at large according to their present status. Among whom Thomas Biston, assessed at 6s. 8d., refused to pay and would not appear before the mayor although often summoned by the city serjeant. For this presumption William Doudyng, mayor, John Moner, Richard Spencer, William Waryn, Walter Nandre, John Beckot, and many other reputable citizens personally went to Biston's house and put their seals on it because he was not found. After they had left his door, Thomas contemptuously appeared and broke the seals. For this contempt he was arrested by common consent and committed to the custody of Walter Short, the city serjeant. It was proposed to send a petition (billa) to the king's council in these words: [The petition, in French, is set out in full, reciting the events and requesting exemplary punishment for Thomas.] When the petition was made known to Thomas he submitted himself to the mercy and indulgence of the mayor and citizens and found as surety for his good behaviour Walter Nandr', who entered a bond of $\pounds 40$ with the mayor for Thomas, which bond remains in the [common] chest.

The mayor accounted for keeping the expenses and fees of the city (apart from the account of other expenses as appeared in the preceding assembly of 8 June), which as shown in the list amounted to $\pounds 19$ 11s. 8d. Agreed: the sum to be assessed and levied with the half of a tenth to be paid to the king on the morrow [12 Nov.] of St. Martin. Elected to help the assessors: John Noble, Laurence Lane, William Penyton, Richard atte Mulle; as collectors, [William Depedene crossed out] John Helier, 'irmonger' [interlined], Robert Warmwell, William Cokkes, Henry Suthewyk.

110. Assembly: morrow of Michaelmas 13 [recte 14 Hen. IV, 30 Sept. 1412].

Present: the mayor and very many other fellow citizens.

[The following entry is doubful, being faint, heavily abbreviated, and much amended.] Moved: payments (...) [for the purchase of?] George's inn, concerning which William Harnhull, barbour, voluntarily granted to the mayor and commonalty after the death of himself and his wife Alice for prayers for their souls a cottage, at an annual rent of 16s., towards St. Martin's (church?), and he added from a gift of 10s. paid to the house (called?) 'almeshous' 6s. 8d. for prayers for their souls. Other contributions towards the same business [of buying George's inn] Richard Gage \pounds 1, Thomas Boner \pounds 1, John Gilbert 3s. 4d., William Stoute [blank], Stephen Lythenard \pounds 1, John Cornyssh 1 mark, Robert Stonard 1 mark, Thomas Yevele 3s. 4d., William Penston 1 mark, Thomas Blechere 1 mark, Edward Purdy 1 mark, William Phebis ½ mark, John Castelton 1 mark, John Sampson 10s., William Grante 1 mark, John Ruddok 1 mark, John Dounton 2 marks, John Corscombe 10s., Simon Bakere 1 mark, John Clyve 1 mark, Richard Chesham ½ mark, Robert Gilbert 'tannere' £1, Edward [no surname] 1 mark, Reginald Glovere gave a cuirass (*loricam*), a gold ingot (?, *palat'*), and a pair of apothecary's scales (?, *par botecarum de plates*) jointly with (*in c'*) W. Furbour. {?}

111. Assembly: 7 Oct. 14 [Hen. IV, 1412].

Present: the mayor and many other fellow citizens.

Agreed by all: John Moner and Richard Spencer to be fully enfeoffed of all lands, tenements, and rents to be given to the mayor and commonalty, so that when the time should come they may be granted to the mayor and commonalty according to the king's and the bishop and chapter of Salisbury's licence, which was afterwards done [? *i.e. the enfeoffment*] and in the following year in the mayoralty of John Beckot was in part completed [? *i.e. the grant to the mayor and commonalty*].

112. Account of William Doudyng then mayor accounted of his receipts and payments with the agreement of the neighbours as appears in the assemblies on the feast of the conversion of St. Paul [25 Jan.] and 8 June 13 [Hen. IV, 1412].

From the tallage assessed by virtue of the said assemblies, \pounds 42 16s., for which the collectors for New Street and Market were William Stoute [and] George Jocee, for St. Martin and Meadow, William Slegge and Stephen Lynthenard. From which he paid to William Stoute and Walter Shirle citizens for their expenses and wages at the last parliament held on the morrow of All Souls [3 Nov. 1411] at Westminster according to the writ to the mayor and bailiffs \pounds 11, and to Walter Shirle for various other expenses in London on the city's business (...) and to Richard Spencer likewise (...).

To John Hemyngby and other clerks going with the said collectors, 3s. 4d.; allowed to the same collectors for eleven men each assessed at 4d. but fugitives and having nothing, 3s. 8d.; allowed to the collectors for full payment to the masters of the guild of weavers of the $\pounds 5$ advanced by them, and to the masters of the guild of fullers for the $\pounds 2$ advanced by them, as appears in the preceding assembly in said mayoralty.

113. [Heading:] Assemblies of citizens held in the mayoralty of John Beckot from the feast of St. Martin 14 Hen. IV [11 Nov. 1412] to the same feast 1 Hen. V [11 Nov. 1413].

First assembly: Friday the eve of St. Katherine the virgin [25 Nov. 1412; Friday 25 Nov. was the feast, not the eve, of St. Katherine].

Present: the mayor, John Moner, Richard Spencer, Walter Shirle, William Waryn, William Doudyng, Adam Teffonte, William Walter, William Busshup, Walter Nandre, John Levesham, Thomas Child, Nicholas Belle, John Judde, Thomas Mason, Robert Warmwell, Richard Oword, Robert Tannere, Robert Stonard, William West, William Nedler, Henry Southwyk, William Barbour, Richard atte Mulle, Richard Gage, Thomas Rede, Edward Frith [named twice], Edward Dubbere, George Jocee, and others.

Agreed: the reeves' rolls to be supervised and corrected carefully (*bona examinacione*), and the next sheriff (*futurus*) to have [a] pipe of wine presented in the city's name of the city for his friendship and the common livery of the good citizens (*inter probos cives*) at Christmas. William Sturton and John Gowayn, and William Lord attorney for the city [and] Stephen Edyngdon city clerk to continue at the wages and liveries earlier agreed and granted.

Walter Shirle, William Doudyng, Nicholas Belle, Thomas Rede, Robert Warmwell, and Richard Gage were appointed to procure and carry forward the city's business with competent men in aid of the licence granted (*in auxil' licenc' concesse*).

Elected as a constable: Thomas Mason draper, to fill that office with Thomas Child, already sworn.

William Doudyng and Robert Warmwell, as the named executors of William Warmwell, declared his will that after his death the mayor and commonalty should have all his cottages opposite the Friars Minor and also $\pounds 1$ annual rent from Stephen Lythenard's curtilage with a rack (*reck'*) in Freren Street and 10s. annual rent from the tenement and shop late John Thorbourne's opposite 'le Bolehall', to pray for his soul and hold his obit yearly in the church of the Friars Minor of Salisbury.

Henry Southwyk, called to account for wrongly wearing (*contrafecit*) the livery of the good citizens when he was not one of the number of those ordained for that livery, was fined $\pounds 2$.

114. Assembly: feast of St. Hilary [13 Jan. 1413].

Present: the mayor, John Moner, Richard Spencer, Walter Shirle, and many other citizens named in the list.

Exhibited: a writ for two citizens for the king's parliament to be held at Westminster on the morrow [3 Feb.] of the Purification. Elected: Walter Shirle and William Waryn.

William Doudyng enrolls the fact that $\pounds 4$ remains [owed] to the mayor and commonalty from the sale of the tenement of John Seevyne according to the tenour of his will, the money remaining in William's own hands until etc. [*sic*].

115. Assembly: Friday after ther conversion of St. Paul [27 Jan. 1413].

Present: the mayor, Richard Spencer, Walter Shirle, William Walter, William Busshup, William Salle, William Doudyng, Nicholas Hardyng, Nicholas Belle, John Levesham, Thomas Child, John Judde, John Chippenham, Laurence Lane, Richard Oword, John Hogeman, William Slegge, Edward Purdy, Robert Warmwell, Richard Gage, William Fuystour, William Penyton, John Shupton, and others.

Moved: that the citizens attending parliament in future do all that they can for a remedy for the assize of cloth. The king's licence and that of the bishop and the dean and chapter of Salisbury for acquiring lands and tenements for the work of the mayor and commonalty were delivered to Walter Shirle, one of those elected to parliament, for acquiring a writ *ad quod dampnum*. On the Tuesday following [31 Jan.] Robert Warmwell and Richard Gage paid Walter Shirle 100s. from the common pyx in their keeping for carrying out the said business, in the presence of the mayor, William Waryn, Thomas Child, S[tephen] Edyngdon, and others.

116. Assembly: the eve of the Annunciation 1 Hen.V [24 March 1413].

Present: the mayor and many other fellow citizens whose names appear in the list.

Walter Shirle and William Waryn, elected to parliament, exhibited the king's licence addressed to John Moner and Richard Spencer for appropriating and amortising to the mayor and commonalty four messuages and 4 marks rent within the city. And with it they proffered the king's old licence together with the said licence of the dean and chapter which had earlier been delivered to them for acquiring the present licence. (Continued overleaf.)

117. Memorandum [*inserted later*] that on the eve of St. Simon and St. Jude 1 Hen. V [27 Oct. 1413] Thomas Russel, cousin and heir of Robert Russel 'chivaler', before John Beckot then mayor, William Waryn, William Busshup, William Doudyng, Walter Nandre, John Park, Stephen Edyngdon, Roger Enterbisshe, and many other citizens present in the church of St. Thomas, Salisbury, undertook to pay and satisfy the mayor and commonalty of all the arrears of the annual rent of \pounds 4 10s. issuing from his lands and tenements and owed to the mayor and the commonalty from Michaelmas in the mayoralty of William Busshup to Michaelmas in the mayoralty of William Doudyng, viz. in the mayoralties of Walter Shirle, William Salle, Walter Nandre, and William Doudyng, in whose time at the said Michaelmas term the rents granted by indenture were etc. [*sic*].

Walter Shirle and William Waryn, elected to parliament, brought back an ordinance made there that rayed and motled (*stragul' et motle*) cloths are to contain in length in the flat before fulling and shearing (*in playto ante lotu' et tonsur'*) 28 yards and in width 5 quarters on pain of forfeiture of all cloths of this kind of smaller measure (*minor' assise*).

119. Assembly: 1 April [1413].

Present: the mayor, Richard Spencer, Walter Shirle, William Waryn, William Busshup, William Doudyng, William Walter, John Levesham, Nicholas Belle, Thomas Child, Thomas Mason, John Judde, William Salle, Walter Nandre, Nicholas Hardyng, John Swyft, and others.

Agreed: John son of John Bottenham hereafter to be excused the office of alderman by reason of the promise made to the mayor and commonalty to pay the $\pounds 25$ ordered in his father's will.

120. Assembly: 5 April [1413]

Present: the mayor and many other fellow citizens whose names appear in the list of the assembly.

Exhibited and read: a writ for a parliament at Westminster three weeks [14 May] from Easter; elected: Walter Shirle and William Waryn.

121. Assembly: 19 April [1413].

Present: the mayor and many other fellow citizens.

John Moner was paid $\pounds 4$, besides all his receipts from the rent of George's inn, from the common money of the community remaining in the coffer in the keeping of Robert Warmwell and Richard Gage; Richard Spencer was likewise paid $\pounds 12$ 0s. 7d., besides his receipts from the same rent; in full satisfaction of all payments owed to the said John and Richard for their payments for George's inn. The coffer with the money in it was delivered to Walter Shirle. All the muniments touching George's inn remaining in Richard Spencer's keeping and all the charters and muniments touching the mayor and the commonalty remaining in the keeping of S[tephen] Edyngdon, the clerk, were placed in a small chest under two locks and delivered to the mayor's keeping etc.

122. Assembly: 4 Aug. [1413]

Present: the mayor and many other fellow citizens.

William Busshup undertook to indemnify John Moner and Richard Spencer concerning a bond in his keeping which bound them to someone whose name was now not known for certain.

William Doudyng accounted for his receipts and payments during his mayoralty as appears in the list of this assembly. Remaining in his hand, $\pounds 15$ 4s. 1d.; allowed for a repayment to Finiane, wife of John Sheppere mercer, of her first payment (*de pristino prestito*) of 13s. 4d. So he paid $\pounds 14$ 10s. 9d., which money was delivered to Robert Warmwell for placing in the coffer. So he [William] is quit, saving better information (*mel' avisamento*).

123. Assembly: 25 Sept. [1413].

Present: the mayor and many fellow citizens whose names appear in the list.

Elected as coroners for the city by virtue of the king's writ: John Judde and John Swyft.

124. Assembly: 16 Oct. [1413].

Present: the mayor and many other fellow citizens whose names appear in the list.

Exhibited: the king's commission addressed to Laurence Lane, Henry Southwyk, John Leokere, and Robert Gilbert tanner for the half of a tenth granted by parliament to the king to be paid on the feast of St. Martin next [11 Nov. 1413], and likewise for the other half to be paid at Easter then next following [8 April 1414]. Elected as assessors: William Walter, Walter Shirle, William Doudyng, and William Fuystour, Thomas Rede and Richard Coof; as collectors: Nicholas Southham, John Nouble, John Pope, and John Chippenham.

Granted: the £18 for the expenses of citizens elected to parliament to be added and levied with the £27 10s. 1d. to be levied in the city for the half of a tenth.

125. Assembly: 8 Nov. [1413].

Present: the mayor, Richard Spencer, Walter Shirle, William Busshup, William Salle, Walter Nandre, John Levesham, Nicholas Belle, and others.

William Walter openly declared that it would be his last will that the tenement newly built by him, where Richard Coofe draper lives, opposite the market, will, after the death of William and Petronilla his wife, remain in perpetuity to the mayor and commonalty for holding their obits in the church of St. Edmund, Salisbury, in perpetuity.

A tenement in Castle Street which Thomas Steor holds, with a shop, garden and appurtenances, pays yearly with repairs $\pounds 2$ 13s. 4d., for which John Wollop's obit will be held in perpetuity in St. Edmund's church in the first week of Lent.

Three cottages which William Penyton holds in Wyneman Street, with a garden adjacent, pays yearly in quit-rent [*inserted*: from the legacy of John Prentis] $\pounds 2$, for which John Prentis's obit will be held in perpetuity in St. Edmund's church in the second week of Lent for the souls of him and Joan and Katherine his wives and of Thomas Thursteyn, Joan his wife, and William their son.

The whole of the newly built messuage which Richard Spencer holds towards St. Edmund's church in Gigant Street pays yearly in quit-rent by the charter granted to the same Richard $\pounds 1$ 6s. 8d.

A tenement by the corner tenement late William Hull's in Winchester Street ('Wynchestret') is now empty [Added] afterwards demised to John Parch by indenture who pays yearly for the same $\pounds 1$.

A building above Fisherton bridge which Thomas Artour 'skynner' holds by indenture, to be repaired at his expense, pays yearly $\pounds 1$.

A building above the common ditch adjacent to a shop at Pynnoke's inn, which John Noble holds, pays yearly in quit rent 2s.

The hospice called George's inn pays yearly at farm by the indenture granted to John Burton, with the laundry adjacent, $\pounds 20$, from which hospice there goes yearly to the scholars of De Vaux College (*domus de Valle*) of Salisbury 19s., and for which the obit of William Teynterer junior and Alice his wife will be held annually in perpetuity in St. Thomas's church of Salisbury on the feast [*unfinished*] and John Becket's similarly at the Exaltation of Holy Cross [14 Sept.].

The capital tenement which John More baker [holds] by indenture by St. Thomas's cemetery pays yearly, with the shop immediately adjacent, in free and quit-rent $\pounds 4$.

Another shop there with a room which a parish chaplain holds pays yearly, with a solar, 10s.

Another shop there which two chaplains hold by the same shop pays yearly, with a solar, 10s.

Another shop there which Nicholas Wight chaplain holds. with a solar, pays yearly 10s.

Another shop, with a solar upstairs, which John Sherman holds pays yearly $\pounds 1$.

A tenement which Thomas Steor holds in Castle Street with appurtenances pays yearly $\pounds 2$, for which tenement the obits of John Moner and John Wollop draper will be held annually in perpetuity at the same time in St. Edmund's on the Sunday before Christmas.

A tenement and three cottages which William Penyton holds at the corner of Wyneman Street pays yearly in free and quit-rent besides all charges $\pounds 2$, for which tenement and

cottages the obits of John Prentis, Joan and Catherine his wives, Thomas Thursteyn, Joan his wife, and William their son will be held annually in perpetuity in St. Edmund's church in the second week in Lent at the expense of William Penyton and his heirs.

A tenement in Gigant Street (Gigorstret) towards St. Edmund's church lately Richard Spencer's pays yearly in quit-rent freely $\pounds 1$ 6s. 8d.

Another corner cottage there which Thomas Rede 'taillor' holds by indenture pays yearly 16s.

A tenement in Winchester Street (*Wynchestret*) which John Parch holds by indenture by William Cok's tenement pays yearly in free and quit-rent $\pounds 1$.

A separate tenement with adjacent cottages late of William Asshle chaplain which now Thomas Messager holds by an indenture pays yearly in free and quit-rent 5 marks besides all charges, for which tenement the said William's obit will be held annually in St. Thomas's church at Thomas Messager's expense on the feast of St. Peter in Cathedra [22 Feb.].

A tenement by the same tenement, late the said William's, in which Robert Hyndon lately lived pays yearly during the life of Edith, wife of John Vincent 'webbe', kinsman of the said William Asshele, whose obit as above, $\pounds 1$ 4s.

10s. a year rent from two cottages late John Thorbourne's in Brown Street next to the corner there, from the legacy of William Warmwell.

2s. a year from a building above the common ditch by Pynnoke's inn, by an old ordinance.

A building by the common latrine above Fissherton bridge, which Thomas Artour 'skynner' holds by indenture, pays yearly in free and quit-rent besides all charges $\pounds 1$.

A tenement which Richard Coof holds in the market, late William Walter's, pays yearly \pounds 5, for which tenement the said William's obit will be held in perpetuity in St. Edmund's church [on the feast crossed out; on the morrow inserted] of Ascension and at the same time William Wichford's obit. [A marginal note, crossed out and marked vacat, gives the date of William Wichford's obit as the Tuesday after Michaelmas.] At which obits, it was ordained in full assembly held 31 March 7 Hen. V [1419] in the mayoralty of Robert Puynant, in the presence also of Walter Shirle, William Waryn, William Busshup, Thomas Mason, Walter Nandre, John Judde, John Swyft, Thomas Boner, John Bremle, Robert Warmwell, Henry Man, John Wichford, Richard Oword, Richard Gage, Edward Dubbere, John Parch, John Everhard, and others, that all citizens of the Twenty-Four present in the town should come to the mass at the offertory on pain of 2 lb. of wax, and similarly those of the other Twenty-Four (xxiiii al' prob' magis civibus) should also come at the offertory on pain of 1 lb. of wax, unless they have a reasonable excuse.

[The sum is £102 13s. 4d.]

147. Assembly: 11 April 3 Hen.V [1415].

Present: the mayor, John Moner, Walter Shirle, William Waryn, William Walter, William Busshup, William Doudyng, Walter Nandre, John Beckot and many others named in the list.

Walter Shirle was chosen to (...) to the king (...) of the loan made to him to have sufficient sureties for repayment.

148. Assembly: 27 May [1415].

Present: the mayor, John Moner, Walter Shirle, William Waryn, William Walters, William (Doudyng?), Thomas Mason, John Beckot, Walter Nandre, and others named in the list.

The mayor with Walter Shirle and W(. . .) Danyel went to William Cambrigge [MS. Mainbrigge] and his wife, being in Salisbury, showing them lists containing \pounds 19 13s. 4d. which (. . .[William of London]) in his lifetime owed to the community in various amounts. In the presence of the mayor and his fellow citizens, William Cambrig (. . .) in the presence of John Walpoll', John Brenchesle, William Vale, and others neighbours of William of London, declared and acknowledged that he [sc. William of London] would pay the said sum within a short time. The mayor with his fellow citizens referred [or returned (retulit)] the acknowledgement to the said neighbours. And with this he [sc. William Cambrigge] paid to Walter Shirle the \pounds 5 5s. for which the said William Cambrig's wife was assessed to the said loan while she was unmarried [sola], in addition to the \pounds ,100 paid earlier.

149. Assembly: 17 June [1415].

Present: the mayor, John Moner, Walter Shirle, William Waryn, William Busshup, Walter Nandre, William Walter, John Beckot and others named in the list.

Walter Shirle, coming from the king, reported to the mayor and his fellow citizens that he could not obtain a surety or pledge for the said loan until the king's arrival in these

parts. So by agreement of the mayor and fellow citizens the money was entrusted to Walter until it should be known what was to be done with it.

150. Assembly: 3 July [1415]. [The entry begins not in the usual way, but with Et postea in alia convocacione.]

The said Walter [Shirle], coming from the king's council at Winchester, reported that if he had not there paid the said sum the community would have incurred the king and council's grave indignation. For the payment of the $\pounds 100$, the chancellor promised repayment by assigning the customs on wool at Southampton at a certain time.

151. Memorandum that on 4 Aug., the Sunday after St. Peter in Chains [1415], a crowd of the duke of Lancaster's men (as it was said), lodged at Fisherton by Salisbury, whose leader was James Haryndon, and engaged to set out with the king overseas, attacked many of the city's men on Fisherton bridge, driving them off with arrows and swords and killing four of them with arrows, viz. John Baker 'laborer', William Hore 'touker', Henry his servant, [and John Tannere, *cf. no.* 153]. To consider: what to do about the deaths and the terrible affray, with bells rung all around (*campanis undique pulsatis*).

152. Assembly: 9 Oct. [1415].

Present: the mayor and many fellow citizens named in the list of the assembly.

Exhibited: the king's writ addressed to the mayor and bailiffs for a parliament to be held at Westminster on Monday after St. Luke the Evangelist [21 Oct.]. Elected: Walter Shirle, Henry Man.

Elected anew as city chamberlains to levy the rents belonging to the community, to receive the income, and to do other things belonging to their office; John Swyft, John Parch. Elected to keep one key of the common chest: Richard Coof.

John Levesham mayor accounted for his payments during his mayoralty, amounting to ± 1.8 s. 5d., which was paid to him by William Walter and Robert Warmwell, chamberlains for the preceding year, the particulars as follows.

153. Account of John Levesham for his payment during his mayoralty:

To a king's messenger bringing a [letter] patent for a levy of two tenths, 1s.; to Nottingham herald, 3s. 4d; to a king's purveyor (*provisori*) for sparing the malt (*verbrasium*) in the city when providing oats for the king's journey, 6s. 8d.; in bread given to him and his clerk for taking measurements, 5s. 2d.; (...) given to the chancellor of England's official,

1s. 8d.; to an official at Winchester, 1s. 2d.; to an official from Wales for bread and oats when taking measurements (...) in the city's defence at the time of the attack at Fisherton bridge by the earl of Lancaster's men, 1s. 6d.; in drink given to another official (...), 8d.; for having a watch at St. Edmund's gate against hostile strangers at the time of the great watch, (1s. 1d?); for expenses in burying John Tannere, killed by those attacking the city at Fisherton bridge, 11d.; for bread sent by the city chamberlains to Walter Hungerford, knight, and for two crossbowmen sent to him [2s. 8d. *crossed out*]; to the diggers of earth to form the barrier at Wyneman Street, [*blank*]. Sum $\pounds 1$ 3s. 9d.

154. Read: a letter patent under the great seal, to John Levesham mayor, Walter Shirle, William Charlyng, and (. . .) for the arraying of light horsemen, bowmen, and other fencibles within the city. (. . .) the chancellor of England by way of advice to the mayor and fellow citizens for fortifying the city and for keeping the peace. In accordance with the patent a muster was held in the city.

[There follows an account of the king's expedition to Harfleur, of his victory at Agincourt, and of his return to Westminster. It is printed in translation in H.M.C. Var. Coll. IV, pp. 195-7.] Be it known that our lord the king of England, Henry V, passed with his great army overseas towards Harfleur (Harfler), and made the said port on the vigil of the Assumption of the blessed Mary [8 May] in the third year of his reign [1415], where he laid seige to the town with the dukes of York, Clarence and Gloucester, and various others, earls, barons and lords. Afterwards, on Sunday 22 Sept., the town surrendered and so the king valiantly took it. The town thus taken, he made arrangements for its safe keeping, appointing the earl of Dorset captain thereof. This done, the king himself with his army withdrew towards Calais (Calesia) by reason of the grievous pestilence that was prevalent at Harfleur. And while he was thus on the march a great French army, some 100,000 strong, offered him battle, he having with him no more than 10,000. Which said two armies valiantly joined battle, and therein were slain of the French on the field of Agincourt (Argencort) on Friday, the feasts of SS. Crispin and Crispinian, 25 Oct., in the year of our Lord 1415 and the third year of the said King Henry V, to wit [there follows a list of 91 names, in which the document lapses into French] and 4,000 valiant knights and squires without counting the rest. [The language reverts to Latin.] And in like manner were taken prisoners of our lord the king [7 names] and other gentlemen. And on the side of our lord the king were slain the duke of York, the young earl of Suffolk ('Southfolk') and of lords no more, but of their varlets about fifteen. Thus on that day did our lord the king overcome all his enemies, giving thanks to the most high God, and His mother the Virgin Mary, and St. George and all the saints of God. And being come with his army to Calais, he there rested and refreshed himself, and sent whom he would of his said army to England there to refresh themselves. After which rest our said lord the king, being cumbered with various affairs of his realm, returned to England, making Dover (Dovoria) on Saturday 23 Nov. in the third year of his reign [1415], bringing with him the said French lords his prisoners and captives. And as he approached London he was met by an immense multitude of folk of that city wearing red garments with white capuches, who attended him on either hand into the city on the following Saturday, to wit, the last day of the said month, being the feast of St. Andrew. And so great was the multitude of both men and women who stood in the

streets from the corner by St. George's church in Southwark (*Suthray*) as far as Westminster, that starting at ten o'clock the king with the said lords his captives was scarce able to reach Westminster by three in the afternoon, which delay was also in part occasioned by the presentation to him of various ordinances and gifts by the said city upon his arrival. A great victory: glory to God in the highest.

155. City officials elected on All Souls day 3 Hen.V [2 Nov. 1415]

Mayor: William Waryn. Reeves: Edward Frith, Henry Man. Aldermen: New Street ward, John Wichford; Market, Robert Gilberd; St. Martin's, William Cok; Meadow, John Shad. Serjeants: Walter Short, Roger (Qutkin ?).

Among various persons for their benefits, Edward Frith by unanimous assent was dispensed from election to the office of alderman, and for this dispensation he gave $\pounds 4$, but he was elected to the office of reeve, as appears above, in place of Nicholas Melbury. Henry Man was likewise dispensed by the mediation of various of the good men of the city from election to the office of alderman, and for this dispensation he promised (...) elected to the office of reeve, as appears above, and was bound by the said promise. (...) Thomas Cardmaker of Warminster an outsider (*forincecus*) citizen of Salisbury (...) by his friends the good men of the city was dispensed from all office of alderman (...) and for this dispensation he promised $\pounds 3$, for which William Doudyng was his surety (...).

(...) charter of William Asshlegh, chaplain, to Nicholas Hardyng, Walter Shirle, and Stephen Edyngdon, citizens, and their heirs and assigns in perpetuity of tenements, shops, and a cottage in Salisbury in St. Martin's Street, Brown Street, and Castle Street as appears in the enrolment of the same in the book called Domesday, the charter being in Nicholas Hardyng's keeping by the donor's wish and assignment, with attached to it a schedule of the donor's intention declared publicly before the mayor and feoffees, namely that he should have all the things contained in the charter freely and quit during his life and that after his death the said feoffees should make the tenement named in the charter in which Thomas Messagier dwells in St. Martin's Street and all the shops and the cottage to be appropriated to the mayor and community of Salisbury and their successors in perpetuity so that they be put to no other use but only in aid of their charges and in mitigation of the tallage and to the honour of God and the support of the chapel of the fraternity of St. George, for the prayers and other dispensations of the poor in the city's almshouse, and for other prayers of the community for benefaction made and to be made, and for the souls of the donor, of (William?) Asshlegh his father, of Joan his mother, and of all the faithful departed for ever.

After the donor's death the feoffees gave to his cousin Edith, daughter of the late Robert Blake, an estate for term of her life in the tenement named in the charter, which was formerly John Gatecombe's, after Edith should be married to some honest man. After her death the tenement was to be sold by the feoffeees and the money forthcoming to be paid to the donor's executors to be disposed of for his soul.

Also after his death the feoffees gave to John Heliere and Margaret his wife and to the longer living of either of them an estate for term of life in the part which was late their mother's of the tenement in Castle Street, after their deaths that part of the tenement to remain to the feoffees for appropriation in perpetuity to the mayor and community for prayers for the souls as above.

Because William the donor died within a month of making the charter and after making the feoffment, the tenements and cottage with their annual rent were viewed by the feoffees, having been conferred and after it had been enfeoffed. The rents as to the tenement in St. Martin's Street and the cottage in Brown Street were granted to the donor's executors, to pay his debts and carry out his legacies, for the Easter payment following the date of the charter, as follows:

Thomas Messager pays yearly for the tenement which he holds by indenture 4 marks for all services, so for the term 13s. 4d.; Walter Haudlo pays for a corner shop which he holds there yearly 12s. for all services, so for the term 3s.; Edith Westmor for a small shop there pays yearly 4s. 6d., so for the term 1s. $1\frac{1}{2}$ d.; Edith Brian for another shop there yearly 4s. 6d., so for the term 1s. $1\frac{1}{2}$ d.; Ysaac Howtoon for another shop there yearly 4s. 6d., so for the term 1s. $1\frac{1}{2}$ d.; William Byde for a cottage there pays yearly 7s., so for the term 1s. 9d.; John Sende for another cottage there pays yearly 7s. 4d., so for the term 1s. 10d.; John Pariclet for another cottage there yearly 6s. 8d., so for the term 1s. 8d.

Present: the mayor, John Moner, John Levesham, William Busshup, Walter Nandre, William Doudyng, John Beckot, William Tuyl, Edward Frith, Robert Warmwell, Walter Fuystour, Richard Oword, John Swyft, William Walter, Nicholas Belle, Thomas Bouer, William atte Lee, John Bottenham, Thomas Reede, John Sampson, Edward Gilbert, John Parch, John Hogeman, Richard Coof, Robert Gilbert, William Cok, John Shad, John Shute, Richad atte Mulle, William Febis, John Ruddok, William Purchase, Thomas Messager, and others.

[An entry largely illegible, including] Stephen Edyngdon as [city] clerk to have his livery at the community's expense. (. . . the Twenty-Four to have robes?) at Christmas (. . .) in default 6d.

(Elected as auditors?): Walter (Shirle?), William Walter, Walter Busshup, William Doudyng, Thomas Mason, Walter Nandre, William [Tu]yll, Thomas (. . .) [and another illegible name].

157. Assembly: 16 Nov. [1415].

Present: the mayor, Walter Shirle, William Walter, (. . .), William Doudyng, William Busshup, John Beckot, Walter Nandre, and many other neighbours greater and lesser.

Exhibited and read: the king's writ for a whole tenth payable to the king (half at the Purification next [2 Feb. 1416] and half) at the Purification following, as granted at the parliament at Westminster in the mayoralty of Thomas Mason. Elected as assessors: John Swyft, Robert Warmwell, (Richard?) Gage, Edward Dubbere; as collectors: John Ruddok, John Heliere 'irmongere', John Cornyssh, and William (. . .); assigned [to help them?]: John Spencer, John Everhard, William Besket, and John Sydenham.

158. Assembly: 22 Jan. [1416].

Present: the mayor, Walter Shirle, William Doudyng, William Busshup, Thomas (Mason?), Thomas Bouer, Thomas Rede, William Walter, John Swyft, John Parch, Robert Warmwell, Walter Sergeant, Stephen (Edyngdon?).

Robert Warmwell and William Walter [past chamberlains] offered $\pounds 43$ 10s. in gold (*de auro*) remaining in their keeping from the time of their predecessors as city chamberlains, and the money was placed in the common chest in St. Thomas's church until etc.

William Doudyng paid to John Swyft and John Parch, city chamberlains elect, $\pounds 3$ for Thomas Cardmaker's fine for being excused the office of alderman, as appears above [no. 155].

159. Assembly: 20 Feb. [1416].

Present: the mayor and many others his fellow citizens named in the list of the assembly.

Read: the king's writ addressed to the mayor and bailiffs for a parliament to be held at Westminster on 16 March. Elected: Walter Shirle and Henry Man.

160. Council [sic] of neighbours held at the 'Counseilhous' 9 March [1416].

Present: the mayor, Walter Shirle, William Walter, William Busshup, William Doudyng, John Beckot, John Swyft, Henry Man, Thomas Bouer, Robert Warmwell, William atte Lee, Thomas Rede, John Shute, and others.

Read: an indenture made by the mayor and warden of the hospital (*domus pauperum*) of Holy Trinity that Robert Chirche, rector of the church of Minterne, Dorset, should have the nomination during his life of seven of the poor in the said hospital, and after his death the nomination of the same number of poor should belong to the abbot of Cerne and his successors in perpetuity, the rector procuring for the grant both the

mayor's and the warden's seal. Because John Chaundeler, dean of Salisbury, advised that the grant be made the citizens agreed unanimously. On this Walter Seriant having discourse with the rector received from him 100 marks and left the indenture with him. The money was afterwards put in the common chest of the hospital for its support.

Walter Shirle was paid the full sum of $\pounds 1$ 16s. for his wages at the parliament summoned for the morrow of All Souls [3 Nov.] last past. Henry Man his fellow citizen was paid $\pounds 1$ 10s.; 6s. remained payable to him [added later, and was afterwards paid to him].

161. Thursday the morrow of the Annunciation [26 March 1416].

In the presence of the mayor, Walter Shirle, William Walter, and many other fellow citizens, William Reynald was arraigned for his wicked words and the scandal uttered against John Moner, for which he did penance, promising that he would not further offend against him.

162. Assembly: 3 June [1416].

Present: the mayor, William Walter, William Busshup, William Doudyng, and many other citizens both greater and lesser.

John Goudman 'webbere' appeared saying that one John Harry 'webbere' said in the presence of various men of the city that the mayor was a traitor to the king in that he was not seen nor present with the city's men at Southampton. He denied the words. John Goudman confirmed the accusation, which was to be verified. John Harries was committed, and afterwards bailed.

163. Assembly: 4 June [1416].

Present: the mayor and many other fellow citizens named in the list of the assembly.

John Bottenham and William Tuyl, elected as constables, were excused the office. Appointed in their place to keep the watch: Richard Oword and William Fuystour.

164. Assembly: 8 June 1416

Present: the mayor and many fellow citizens and others named elsewhere.

(...) Exhibited: the king's commission for the levy of a tenth, payable at the feast of St. Martin [11 Nov.]. Elected as assessors: William Walter, William Doudyng, John (...), and Walter Nandre; to assist them: John Everhard, Richard Coof, John Parch, and John

Noble: as collectors: Thomas Felde, John Boteller, Henry Blakemore, and Thomas Durneford. The amount with (the usual?) expenses, $\pounds 80$.

165. Assembly: (seventh day?) of Whitsun [14 June?, 1416].

Present: the mayor, Walter Shirle, William Walter, and many other fellow citizens.

John Wichford was arraigned for saying that William Doudyng and all his fellows were falsely and manifestly perjured in that they had assessed him in the tallage at $\pounds 1$. He denied the words, and the matter was to be considered.

166. [Assembly]: 26 Aug. [1416].

Present: the mayor and many others of his fellow citizens.

William Fuystour was arraigned before the community for uttering scandalous words about the mayor in saying to Robert Tannere, alderman of Market ward, that he did not care for him or for the mayor and that he would not give them a halfpenny even though the alderman constrained him to observe the mayor's precepts. William denied the words, but so that the mayor should not be troubled on his account he asked the mayor's pardon (*ponit se in gracia eiusdem*) which was respited.

167. Assembly: 2 Oct. [1416].

Present: the mayor, Walter Shirle, William Walter, William Busshup, William Doudyng, John Levesham, Walter Nandre, Thomas Mason, John Judde, Thomas Bouer, Richard Oword, Edward Frith, John Swyft, Thomas Rede, John Noble, John Griffith, John Bremle, Richard Sherman, Thomas Messager, William Penyton, John Cornyssh, John Sampson, John Parch, William Stoute, Edward Dubbere, Robert Tannere, William Cok, John Shad, Richard Gage, Richard Coof, William Febis, John Shute, William Warwyk, Richard Crischurche, Thomas Slegge, John Dounton, Stephen Lythenard, William Dounyng, John Clyve, Robert Stonard, William Brante, John Durneford, William Slegge, Edward Purdy, William Fuystour, and others.

Exhibited and read: the king's writ for a parliament at Westminster on 19 Oct. Elected for the city: Walter Shirle and Thomas Mason 'draper'.

Account of William Waryn, mayor, for his expenses and payments:

A pipe of wine given to Thomas Calston sheriff of Wiltshire with the assent of his fellow citizens, $\pounds 3$; for the liveries of three city officials, $\pounds 1$ 5s.; given to a herald and to other officials of various lords and for wine sent to Sir Walter Hungerford and to other at various times, $\pounds 1$ 6s. 4d. Sum total $\pounds 5$ 11s. 4d. Agreed: that he be paid by the chamberlains should pay him.

Agreed by all present that because the mayor had performed the office well and with honour he should have in remuneration $\pounds 10$, besides his said payments, considering that he had performed the office well and honestly twice. It was further ordained that any future mayor who held the office twice, governing well and honestly for a second year, should have as large a sum besides his reasonable payments as accounted.

Likewise they agreed in that assembly that the ordinances drawn up by the mayor be henceforth observed, namely:

that victuallers bringing food to the city for sale do not sell in secret or before full daylight, but only in the places prescribed for them;

that horses coming to the city with victuals, after unloading are not to be allowed to stand in the market or in the streets because of the hindrance to passers-by and the damage to the city's (...);

that victuallers with cheese, milk, grapes, plums, apples, pears and other fruit should keep to the place assigned to them in the market opposite Richard Oword's tenement;

that outsider (*extranei*) butchers (...) in the place prescribed opposite the market in 'Whelerardrowe';

that the common ditches running through the middle of the city are to be kept clean and without obstruction under pain of (...);

that secret tenures (possessiones) and feoffments are henceforth invalid and void.

In the same assembly it was announced that Nicholas Hardyng had given to the mayor and community $\pounds 2$ in aid of the city (. . .) John Swyft and John (Ruddok?) by (the chamberlains?) (. . .).

Walter Shirle, mayor, Thomas Yevele, William Pakyn, John Pope, Thomas Brighampton [aldermen], Walter Shere', Roger Burdbusshe, serjeants, Robert Pyndone, Walter (...), reeves.

The bishop, then chancellor of England, promised in good faith that (. . .) repayment would be made both of that sum and of the other $\pounds 100$ advanced to the king in the mayoralty of John Levesham, and granted on sufficient security. Recorded that the loan was repaid in January 5 [Hen.V, 1418], as appears below:

Present: the mayor, William Waryn, William Busshup, William Walter, William Dowdyng, Thomas Mason, John Levesham, Walter Nandre, John Swyft, Richard Oword, Robert Poynant, Henry Man, William Fuystour, Robert Warmwell, John Bottenham, Thomas Rede, John Bremle, William Cok, George Jocee, William Barbour, John Shad, John Nouble, Thomas Yevele, Robert Gilbert, John Wichford, Richard Gage, Edward Dubbere, Richard atte Mulle, Thomas Felde, Richard Coof, John Botiller, William Nedler, William Febis, John Ruddok, Henry Southwyk, Thomas Randolf.

Agreed by all: the sheriff of the county in future to have a pipe of wine for his friendship and favour to the city; all those who have been retained with the city counsel henceforth to be retained for their present wages and liveries; the common livery of the Twenty-Four of silk to be worn at Christmas; and the mayor this present year to have John Boteller as a third city serjeant because of the visit to the city of the king and other lords at the mayor's expense.

171. [Note]: on 4 Dec. [1416] in the presence of W[illiam] Waryn [deputy] mayor [d. no. 172], John Swyft chamberlain and the others, Walter Shirle, elected and being at the parliament held at Westminster which was continued from 16 March 3 Hen.V [1416] until the Whitsun following [7 June] was paid $\pounds 6$ 6s. for his wages there. Likewise Henry Man, his fellow, was paid the same sum. After which the mayor paid to John Swyft, one of the chamberlains, the money remaining $\pounds 4$ 15s. 8d.

172. Assembly: 18 Dec. [1416].

Present: William Waryn the mayor's deputy [*locum ten'*], William Walter, William Busshup, William Doudyng, Henry Man, W[illiam] Tuyl, Robert Poynant, R[obert] Warmwell, J[ohn] Judde, John Swyft, R[ichard] Coof, R[ichard] Gage, William Fuystour, Thomas Bouer, W[alter] Nandre, Edward Dubbere, J[ohn] Shad, R[obert] Tannere, Thomas Rede, John Bremle, and others.

William Waryn, William Walter, W[illiam] Doudyng, W[illiam] Busshup and W[illiam] Tuyl were appointed to negotiate with the chancellor and others being sureties if a loan is requested for the king or for anyone else.

173. Assembly: 31 Dec. [1416].

Present: the mayor, William Waryn, William Doudyng, Thomas Mason, William Busshup, Walter Nandre, John Swyft, and many others, both citizens and other neighbours.

A warning from Walter Shirle and Thomas Mason, citizens at the parliament, of the tenth and half a tenth [granted] by the parliament held at Westminster from 19 Oct. to a week [19 Nov.] from St. Martin, payable at the Purification next [2 Feb. 1417]. Named as commissioners: John Clerk 'lympner', John Spencer, Thomas Frogge, and William Halstede; as their fellows: John Teffonte, Thomas Slegg, Robert Pynnere, and John Wynchestr' 'irmongere'; as assessors: John Judde, Robert Warmwell, Thomas Bouer, Robert Tannere, William Febes, and John Shad.

Assembly: eve of the Purification [1 Feb. 1417].

Present: the mayor, William Waryn, William Busshup, William Doudyng, William Walter, Walter Nandre, Thomas Mason and many others named in the list of the assembly.

Discussed: the king's letter about the sureties both for the 100 marks to be advanced to the king and loan of $\pounds 100$ in the mayoralty of John Levesham. All wished that the half of a tenth payable at the feast of St. Martin [11 Nov] (...) and the rest to be had from the king's customs at Easter if possible (...).

175. Assembly: 1 April 5 [Hen.V, 1417].

Present: Walter Shirle mayor, William Warmwell, William Doudyng, William Busshup, (Walter) Nandre, Thomas Mason, and many others.

Agreed that the seal of the aulnager's deputy for the city and the county of Wiltshire be held by the mayor and community by the grant and wish of John Harlestone, farmer. John Noble, (...) was chosen to hold the office.

Agreed that Thomas Messagier should hold the corner shop with annexe late of Sir William Asshele, previously held by Robert Hyndon, for fifty years, rent ± 3 13s. 4d.

176. Assembly: 19 (April?) [1417].

(Present: . . .), William Buss(hup), John (Levesham?), Thomas Mason, Walter Nandre (. . . , and others) named in the list.

[The remaining line and a half illegible except sexta ordo (restitutione?).]

177. Assembly: 4 May [1417].

Present: the mayor, William Waryn, William Busshup, William Doudyng, and many (others and the city) officials in the guildhall, before whom appeared John Barham of Nether Wallop (to answer a charge that ?) on 1 May he bought in the market malt that had been regrated for resale (. . .) to the earl of Warwick's use. Afterwards he admitted that he had sold it to one John Hele of Wallop and he was committed to prison until etc. And afterwards he was delivered by the court.

178. [Assembly]: 17 May [1417].

Present: the mayor, William Waryn, William Busshup, William (Edyngdon?) clerk, Thomas Mason, John Judde, William Bowier and many others.

On an accusation of treason, Richard Shapewyk 'webbe' [and] William Biston clerk of St. Martin's church appeared and were sworn on the book to tell the truth. William Biston said that he heard on the preceding day William Reynald 'webbe' saying openly and viva voce in his own home that there were fifteen false traitors to the king in this city, of whom the first was William Febis, who knew all the others. On the order of the mayor and other neighbours present William Reynald was [brought] by Walter Serjant, the city serjeant, and was interrogated and called to account for those words. He did not deny saying certain words, but said that he was ready to say before the king the words which he had spoken. Then John Judde the king's coroner came and asked if he would say anything to him as counsel for the king, and William was silent, saying as before that what he had said he would say before the king. On this he was placed in custody. The mayor and some of his fellow citizens discussed with some of the king's council what should be done, and on their advice William Reynald was asked about the said words, whether he would avow them, and he then said that he would not. Then by favour he was pledged by John Bremle and Richard Gage to good behaviour and peace to the king and the people and all inhabitants of the city.

179. Assembly: 6 June [1417].

Present: the mayor, William Busshup, William Doudyng, Walter Nandre, John Swyft, John Judde, William Tuyl and many others whose names appear in the list.

Agreed by all: the seizure of the goods and chattels for arrears of $\pounds 18$ rent which Thomas Russel esquire owed for his tenement in the city of Salisbury, as appears in an assembly in the mayoralty of John Becket, to be taken to the 'Counseilhous' and there be appraised and sold, after which if they do not reach the said value John Becket, John Judde, and Thomas Rede are to answer now for then to the chamberlains and the comptroller.

Also, if anyone receives wages from the city and is counsel for another impleading someone from the city about free tenements, he is to lose his wages unless he has a reasonable excuse.

Also, that the mayor, William Doudyng, Robert Warmwell, and Richard Gage, previously elected, should strive to levy and collect money from those who pledged various sums for the city's use and for George's inn.

180. Assembly: 12 July [1417].

Present: the mayor, William Waryn, William Busshup, William Doudyng, Thomas Mason, Walter Nandre, John Swyft, John Judde, and many others.

Exhibited: a dozen [cloths] of white motley ('motle'), and there in the presence of Walter Mede, John Machyn, and John Pridy, stewards of the weavers' guild, and for their lesser width they were adjudged to be forfeit; to remain at the 'Counseilhous' until [unfinished].

181. Assembly: Monday the morrow of the Assumption [16 Aug. 1417].

Present: the mayor, William Waryn, William Busshup, William Doudyng, John Swyft, William Tuyl, and many others at the 'Gildhall'.

Before the mayor and bailiffs and other officials there was surrendered, produced, and exhibited a cloth part woven but for most part not woven, found in the keeping of John Lauerence 'webbe'. And because the thread of the warp ('werp') was black mixed with thread of a green colour in deception and against the city's ordinance, it will be considered what is to be done, whether it should be burnt or otherwise.

[The rest of the entry is largely illegible but relates to chaplains holding tenements in the city.]

183. Assembly: 10 Oct [1417].

[The rest of the entry is largely illegible; it appears to include an election to the parliament to be held at Westminster on 16 Nov. 1417, which Walter Shirle and William Waryn attended.]

(. . .) Retained by the council as attorney of the city: William Alisaundre, (for his wages and livery?) as in earlier years.

The pipe of wine for the sheriff respited. Likewise the common livery for the good men (...).

186. [Assembly]: morrow of St. Thomas the apostle [22 Dec. 1417].

Present: the mayor, Walter Shirle, William Doudyng, Thomas Mason, Henry (Man?), Thomas Bouer, Richard Gage, and many others.

Adjudged that a cloth of John Lauerenz 'webbe' in part woven with the wrong warp (de Bosud' [?] Warp falsitate) should be burnt publicly in the market place.

187. Assembly: on the feast of St. Silvester [31 Dec. 1417].

Present: the mayor, Walter Shirle, William Waryn, Walter Nandre, Thomas Mason, John Swyft, Henry Man, Robert Puynant, Edward Frith, Robert Warmwell, and many others named in the list.

Exhibited: the king's commission addressed to John Hampton, Gilbert Tannere, Robert Grene, and John Furbour for two whole tenths and granted in the parliament held 16 Nov.last, one to be paid at the Purification next [2 Feb. 1418], the other at the Purification

following, which parliament was held at Westminster before the duke of Bedford in place of the king who was in Normandy. Elected assessors: William Nedler, Henry Man, John Bromle, and Edward Dubbere; as collectors, together with the commissioners: for New Street aldermanry: John Wynchestr' 'barbour'; Henry Hamme for Market; Richard Nedlere for St. Martin; John Mulle for Meadow.

188. Assembly: 15 Jan. [1418].

Present: the mayor, Walter Shirle, William Waryn, Walter Nandre, William Doudyng, Thomas Mason, John Puynant, William Tuyl, Robert Warmwell, and many others named in the list of the assembly.

Ordered: the chamberlains, collectors of tallage, and all others owing money to the city to account without delay. Elected as auditors: the mayor for the time being and Walter Shirle, William Waryn, Richard Gage, and John Everard. Those auditors and all others in future to have a day every year on the feast of St. Luke [18 Oct.] for certifying to the mayor and community in an assembly held for the said auditors, and for receipts etc.

The coffer which was kept in the common chest was opened, and found in it was $\pounds 43$ 6s. 8d. From this sum Walter Shirle was paid $\pounds 12$ for his expenses and payments during his mayoralty in the preceding year. At the same time the said Walter paid to the mayor $\pounds 28$ 3s. 4d. which he received in London to satisfy those who advanced money for the next loan to the king, viz. 100 marks, whose names are listed in [the record of] Walter's mayoralty.

189. Assembly at the 'Counseilhous': 11 March [1418].

Present: the mayor, William Waryn, William Busshup, William Doudyng, Walter Nandr', John Swyft, Henry Man, and many others.

Exhibited: a letter addressed to the mayor and his fellow citizens from John [*Chandler*], bishop of Salisbury, giving notice of his installation three weeks after Easter [17 April], the service beginning with 'Jubilate', and asking them all to attend the service and a dinner (*prandio*).

190. In the next assembly [*no date given*] John Corscombe of New Salisbury was arraigned before the said John, mayor, and Walter Shirle, William Waryn, William Busshup, William Doudyng, Thomas Mason, Walter Nandre, John Puynant, and many others, and before John Harleston, the king's aulnager in Wiltshire and in the said city, for the fact that John Noble, the aulnager's deputy (*substitutus*) in the city, found in John Corscombe's possession in his house twenty-one rayed (*straguil*') cloths sealed with a seal counterfeiting the king's seal and that ordained for the city. On which it was to be decided what should be done. Agreed by all: the deputy aulnager to visit all houses every Monday for sealing cloths.

Ordered by common consent: the bishop to have as the city's gift at his installation 40 marks. Elected to provide that sum: William Shirle, William Waryn, William Doudyng, Richard Gage, John Bremle, and William Warwyk, to assess it at their discretion and to be repaid next Whitsun [15 May 1418]. The names of those paying appear below [no. 193].

[*the contributors, in two columns*] William Gys, T. Bowyere, R. Play, John Buterleygh, John Salesbury, mayor, W. Warmwell, John Moner, Edmund Enefeld, John Chaundler senior, W. Asshton, John Cammel 'grocer', Robert Body, R. Deverel, T. Castelton, John Kyngesbrugge, T. Sexteyn, J. Sompnour, J. Franklayn, William White, [*column two*] John Nedlere junior, Nicholas Hardyng, John Lymyngton, Adam Teffonte, Simon Drapere, William More, Philip Goldsmyth, W. Wilton 'bocher', and others.

For various expenses at the arrival of the king's justices (...); to officials of various lords (...); for a pipe of wine given to the sheriff (...) as in the said assembly (...) $\pounds 9$ 1s. 8d. (...). From which are accounted for his receipts as appears above $\pounds 20$, and so there remain of arrears $\pounds 4$ 3s. (...). Agreed: the said $\pounds 69$ 1s. 8d. to be levied on the community of the city. Elected as assessors: Hugh Hore, Walter Nandre, Richard Oward, William Busshop; as collectors William Fuystour, John Mury, John Poleyn, and Richard Weston. Agreed also: to levy the $\pounds 3$ given to the mayor and community by John Franklayn wheeler and remaining in the hands of Philip Goldsmyth.

198. Election of the mayor: Sunday the feast of All Souls 17 Ric. II [2 Nov. 1393]. Assembled in the church of St. Edmund: the mayor and his fellow citizens, sc. John Salesbury, mayor, William Warmwell, John Nywan [sic], Robert Deverel, John Nedlere junior, Thomas Boreford, George Joce, John Moner, John Chaundeler senior, Thomas Castelton, William Asshton, William Gys, Richard Leche, John Cammel, Thomas Bowyer. [The name of the new mayor is not given.]

199. Assembly: Friday after St. Leonard 17 Ric. II [7 Nov. 1393].

Present: the mayor and his fellow citizens, viz. A tenement in Gigant Street ('Gigorstret') late Richard Spencer's by Richard Weston's cottage \pounds 1 6s. 8d. quit rent. John Parch for all the cottages late of John Baker 'grocer' in Nuggeston ('Nhuggeston') towards St. Edmund's church $\pounds 2$ 6s. 8d. guit rent. The same John for a tenement late Nicholas Hardyng's in Winchester Street ('Wynchestrestret') and previously John Nyweman's £1 quit rent. A tenement late John Becket's in Winchester Street by the ditch \pounds ,2 13s. 4d. quit rent [For this item the annual and quarterly rent, 13s. 4d., are transposed in the MS.]. Thomas Messagier for a chief tenement and cottage late Sir William Asshle's in St. Martin's Street (vico Sancti Martini) and Brown Street ('Brounstret'), £3 6s. 8d. quit rent. Another tenement late the same William's and previously Robert Hyndon's in the same street $\pounds 1$ 4s. Cottages which W. Waryn now holds, late John Thorbourne's, in Brown Street ('Brounstret') by the chief tenement there late the same John's 10s. The building above the ditch by Pynnoke's inn ('Pynnokes in') in Minster Street ('Minstrestret') 2s. quit rent.

Election of the mayor and other officers: All Souls' day 6 Hen.V [2 Nov. 1418].

John Wichford and John Bremle elected and sworn to the number of the Twenty-Four good men, in place of John Moner and John Levesham deceased.

Richard Coof 'draper', for ± 3 to be paid for the city's use, was excused the office of reeve and from election to lower office. Likewise John Wichford gave to the community (\ldots) to be excused henceforth from filling the office of reeve.

Elected as mayor, Robert Poynant; as reeves, Edward (...) and Robert Gilberd; as alderman of New Street ward, John P(...); of Market, Thomas Stallbrigge; of St. Martin's, John Deverel; of Meadow, Robert Grene; as serjeants, Robert E(...) and Walter Short.

203. First assembly: 11 Nov. [1418].

Present: the mayor, Walter Shirle, William Waryn, William Busshup, William Doudyng, Walter Nandre, John Swyft, Edward Frith, Richard Coof, John Bremley, William atte Lee, William Fuystour, Richard Oword, William Tuyl, Robert Tannere, Edward Gilbert, Richard atte Mulle, John Shad, John Marshel, John [Botenham *crossed out*; Chippenham *interlined*], John Cornysshe, John Furbour, Thomas (Ch)arlyng, John Deverel, Robert Grene, William Cok, George Jocee, Thomas Randolf, John Parch, Thomas Messager, and others.

Agreed by all: William Alisaundre for advice, William Lord as attorney, and Stephen Edyngdon as city clerk, [to be retained] for the wages and liveries as before. As to the livery of William Westbury, bailiff, respited until etc. The common livery to be worn by the good men this year. Anyone summoned to the assembly and absent without reasonable excuse to pay 6d. according to the preordained custom. The incoming (*futurus*) sheriff of Wiltshire to have a pipe of wine as a gift from the city for his friendship.

All outside (*extranei*) victuallers, both butchers and fishmongers, to be separated in their standings from the victuallers of the city. No one living in the city to take in grain after the ninth hour under penalty of ½ mark, or fish or meat or any food under the same penalty. Those having pigs, geese, or ducks are altogether prohibited from putting them out (*exire*).

Because lately the auditors elected for the accounts of the collectors and others, both the chamberlains and the stewards of the fraternity of St. George, did not carry out (*continuarunt*) their office assiduously, there are joined with them William Doudyng, John Judde, William Tuyl or another whom they may wish to call on for help. Renewed and named as auditors: the mayor for the time being, Walter Shirle, William Waryn, William Doudyng, and William Tuyl.

204. Assembly: 16 Dec. [1418].

Present: the mayor and many fellow citizens named in the list.

Agreed by all: after Thomas Rede merchant has been removed from the office of subwarden of the 'almeshous', William Panter to replace him if he is willing, but if not William More to be subwarden for the usual and preordained wages.

Elected to hold one of the keys of the common chest: John Swyft.

Robert Warmwell, late a city chamberlain with William Walter deceased, accounted fully for his time. Before the auditors, he [sc. William Walter?] was said to owe net \pounds 1 19s. 4d., which the chamberlains are charged with levying.

205. Assembly at the 'Counseilhous': 6 Feb. [1419].

Present: the mayor and many fellow citizens named in the list.

By grant of all then present John Parch took [a lease of] all the cottages with curtilages and other appurtenances which the mayor and community lately had by grant of John Baker 'grocer' in Nuggeston ('Nhuggeston') from Easter next for 20 years, paying $\pounds 2$ 6s. 8d. a year to the chamberlains and the rent and charges due to the bishop and anyone else, and maintaining and repairing the cottages, the chamberlains having the right to repair them if he does not and to repossess them if the rent is in arrears for one month.

It was attested and proved by John Wotton and Walter Gilmyn [and by John Cammel *interlined*] that William Reynald in the presence of some people of the city spoke odious and scandalous words, which appear in the list of the assembly and for which he was committed into the custody of Walter Short the city serjeant. He was afterwards freed by sureties.

Present: the mayor with other fellow citizens named in the list of the assembly.

Alice late the wife of John Becket appeared and publicly granted to the mayor and community her life estate in the tenement late her husband's in Winchester Street ('Wynchestrestret') by the ditch of running water, the reversion of which belonged to the mayor and community by virtue of the said John's legacy for holding his obit annually in St. Thomas's church. That obit is ordered to be held with that of William Walter and his wife Alice on the feast of the Exaltation of Holy Cross [14 Sept.] at the community's expense.

The executors of John Moner's will unanimously grant to the mayor and community the tenement with its appurtenances by the bridge, which John Crablane 'digher' [*i.e.*

dyer] lately held, for holding annually the said John [Moner's] obit in St. Edmund's church. That obit is ordered to be held.

The obit of John Wallop 'draper' (on Sunday next after the feast of ...).

Ordered: the obits of William Walter and William Wichford in St. Edmund's church on the morrow of Ascension for ever at the community's expense.

Ordered: the obit of William Asshle chaplain and the obit of William Asshle his father to be held for ever in St. Thomas's church on the feast of St. Peter in cathedra [22 Feb.] at the community's expense.

The obit of John Bridel called Prentiz and of Katherine his late wife, also of Thomas Thursteyn and Joan his wife, to be held annually for ever in St. Edmund's church in the second week of Lent at the expense of William Penyton and his heirs by reason of the farm granted to him in perpetuity of the cottages (adjoining?) his tenement in Wineman Street ('Wynmanstret').

Ordered: all the good men of the Twenty-Four to attend all those obits at the mass, under penalty of 2 lb. of wax, unless they have a reasonable excuse. Likewise the [second] Twenty-Four of the city's good men to be there also under penalty of 1 lb. of wax, unless they have a reasonable excuse.

207. Assembly: 22 May [1419].

Present: the mayor with others his fellow citizens named in the list of the assembly.

Elected constable: Henry Man, with Thomas Bouer, in place of William Nedler deceased.

208. Assembly: eve of St. Peter and St. Paul [28 June 1419].

Present: the mayor with others his fellow citizens named in the list of the assembly.

John Swyft and John Parch were removed from the office of chamberlain. Elected in their place: John Bremley and Robert Gilbert 'tannere'.

William Panter was removed altogether from the office of subwarden of the 'almeshous'. Appointed in his place: William More.

209. Assembly: 8 July [1419].

Present: the mayor with other fellow citizens named in the list of the assembly.

Agreed by all: the whole tenement or hospice called George's inn ('Georgesyn') to be

committed at farm to John Bourton innkeeper (ostellar). The said John received the said hospice with certain necessaries and other appurtenances, to hold to him and his assigns from the nativity of St. John the Baptist last [24 June 1419] for ten years, paying \pounds 15 a year to the mayor and community for all other rents and services, saving that he and his assigns maintain and repair the said hospice in all its necessaries at their own expense, together with all the necessaries committed to him, and at the end of the term to demise them so repaired.

John Bofer 'bocher' received the tenement late John Moner's by Fisherton ('Fissherton') bridge, which John Crablane 'digher' [*i.e. dyer*] lately held, to hold to him and his assigns for a term of [blank] years, paying $\pounds 3$ a year, beginning on the feast of [blank] next, and maintaining and repairing the premises at their own expense, and receiving for maintenance and repair four cartloads of timber. Also granted to the same John that he should have all the tenure and the houses which Thomas Artour holds there when Thomas's term is finished, paying then both for the said tenement granted above and for what Thomas Artour now holds $\pounds 4$ in all at the four terms. Granted also that John have there a 'scaldynghous' to be maintained in all things at his own expense.

210. Assembly: eve of the Assumption [14 Aug. 1419].

Present: the mayor with other fellow citizens named in the list of the assembly.

Exhibited: the king's privy seal letter addressed to the mayor and citizens for ordering an aid to the king in Normandy either in men or in money for wages. To be considered: what should be done.

Election of the mayor and other officers: All Souls' day 7 Hen.V [2 Nov. 1419].

Before the officers were elected, there was discussed the dispute and disagreement (*contradictio*) of John Wichford, elected the year before to make up the number of the Twenty-Four, in that he refused [*dedicit*] to pay the ± 3 imposed on him by his own consent for being excused the office of city reeve in the presence of Robert Puynant, mayor, Walter Shirle, William Busshup, Nicholas Hardyng, Walter Nandre, John Judde, Thomas Castelton, Robert Warmwell, Henry Man, John Swyft, (Thomas Androw?), Richard Coof, John Bremle, John Bottenham, and John Wichford, who then all agreed that in the next assembly the disagreement (...), unless John Wichford makes satisfaction before that assembly, should be discussed as to what should be done, particularly in that William Waryn, Thomas Mason, Edward Frith, William Tuyl, and Richard Oward (...[were not present?]).

Discussed: the death of William Doudyng, William atte Lee, William Fuystour, and William Nedlere of the number of the Twenty-Four. Elected in their place: William Alisaundre, Richard Gage, John Noble, and Robert Gilberd 'tannere'.

Because the said John Noble (. . .) did not appear having been elected as reeve, he gave to the community (. . .) that he henceforth be excused election to that office.

Afterwards they proceeded to the election: as mayor, Robert Warmwell; as reeves, Thomas Randolf, John Pape junior; as alderman of New Street ward, John Wodehay; as alderman of Market, William Shupton; of St. Martin's, Richard Nedlere; of Meadow, Thomas Hankyn; as serjeants: Walter Short, John Boteller.

212. First assembly: morrow of St. Andrew 7 Hen.V [1 Dec 1419].

Present: the mayor, Walter Shirle, William Waryn, William Busshup, Walter Nandre, John Judde, Henry Man, John Swyft, John Bromley, John Bottenham, John Wichford, Robert Gilbert, Thomas Bouer, John Noble, John Sydenham, William Cok, Thomas Reeded, Thomas Blechere, William Barbour, John Cornyssh, John Wodehay, John Chippenham, George Jocee, John Ruddok, John Shad, Richard Nedlere, Roger Serjant, John Marchel, Thomas Messager, Edward Dubbere, Thomas Randolf, William Halstede, John Shute, Richard Coofe, Thomas Durneford.

Stephen Edyngdon openly offered $\pounds 2$ from William Doudyng's legacy to the city, which John Bromley one of the city chamberlains took for the city's use and accounted for. [*Added*:] Nothing here because charged in the account of the mayoralty of Robert Warmwell by the said John Bremle and Robert Gilberd then chamberlains.

Discussed: the recompense and repayment that future mayors should have while in office. Because it could not be fully agreed through the absence of many fellow citizens, adjourned until the next assembly.

Agreed: those retained by the council for their advice to be retained this year at the same wages and liveries as in the preceding year. The incoming (*futurus*) sheriff to have a pipe of wine from the community's goods for his friendship.

On the day of the assembly, before the mayor and many other citizens, the coffer that was kept in the chest at the 'Counseilhous' was opened and the money in it was viewed and replaced (...) with the community's seal (...) the chamberlains in safe keeping until etc.

213. Assembly: 10 Jan. [1420].

Present: the mayor, Walter Shirle, William Waryn, William Busshup, Thomas Mason, Walter Nandre, John Judde, and many other fellow citizens.

Exhibited and read: the king's letter patent addressed to John F(. . .), John (. . .), Thomas (. . .) for levying and paying a tenth and fifteenth granted to the king in the last parliament. A third part of the tenth is to be paid on the feast of St. Martin next [11 Nov]. Elected as assessors: John Swyft, John Furbour, John Shad, John Chippenham; as collectors, together with the commissioners: John Parch, Geoffrey Goldsmyth, John (Charlyng 'currier'?), and Robert Pottere 'corvysor'.

Exhibited: the king's letters patent addressed to the mayor for repaying the loan or money to the mayor and his fellow citizens lending it on the feast of St. Martin next from the third part of the tenth then payable to the king, as above. The citizens and neighbours of the city were assessed for various sums according to their status [the significance of the abbreviations following six of the amounts is obscure]:

John Clerk 'lympner' presented before the mayor, Walter Shirle, William Waryn, John Judde, Robert Puynant, Henry Man, Thomas Bouer, and Robert Gilbert being present in 'la Counseilhous' two bonds by one of which Reginald Kyngbrigge chaplain [was bound] to Thomas Biston in \pounds 100 and by the other the same Thomas [was bound] to the said Reginald in a like sum, with a defect in the indenture, and delivered them to the mayor, and for that delivery those present promised to indemnify John by reason of the delivery.

215. Assembly at the 'Counseilhous': the feast of St. Fabian and St. Sebastian [20 Jan. 1420].

Present: the mayor, Walter Shirle, William Waryn, Henry Man, John Swyft, John Bromley, and Robert Gilberd.

Before them the sealed purse, as mentioned in the first assembly of this year, which remained in the keeping of the two chamberlains, was opened and in it was $\pounds 3$ 1s. 2d. of good money. From that $\pounds 1$ 11s. 8d. was paid to William Lord the city's attorney to sustain the pleas against Thomas Biston for the costs of the last and the coming term, and 3s. 4d. was paid to John Clerk 'lympner' for the fee or payment to the bailiff for taking possession by writ [?] (pro feodo sive soluc' Ballivo capti per breve). There then remained $\pounds 1$ 6s. 2d., which was paid to the chamberlains to render their account for it.

Delivered to Henry Man, broken gold weighing 1³/8 oz. to be exchanged in London, and to him also 10s. in false gold and to John Bromley 10s. to get what they could for it in London; if they get anything it is to be turned to the community's profit. [Added later, partly interlined] John Bremley paid the 10s. as 1 noble and 2 quarters of silver-gilt which he had received earlier; the payment was made before W. Waryn mayor, Walter Shirle, Robert Warmwell, John Everard, William Lord on Wednesday after St. Peter and St. Paul 1 Hen.VI [30 June 1423].

On St. Vincent's day following [22 Jan. 1420] the mayor paid to Henry Man \pounds 25 in gold to take to London and pay to the treasurer of England, raised by way of a loan from the citizens by virtue of letters patent addressed to the mayor, from the persons written above, on receiving from the treasurer sufficient security for repayment on the feast of St. Martin next [11 Nov. 1420] from the third part of the tenth granted to the king and then payable according to the form of the said letters patent.

Nor may any of the said people sell by sample or by letter bearing a specimen (*intersignum*) between the parties any rayed or motley cloth or any part of the same to anyone outside the city, under penalty of forfeiture of the same and under penalty of $\pounds 20$ to be raised from the goods of the offender for each offence (*tociens quociens in hace parte contrarie contigerit*) for the use of the city at the discretion of the mayor for the time being and his fellow citizens.

In Whitsun week 3 Hen.VI [27 May-2 June 1425] at the time of the market the said John had an outsider to run a stall there, contrary to the mayor's limitation and will, to his detriment, and challenging his authority (*in derogationem et status sui reprobationem*). When William Waryn supported the mayor in this matter, as he was bound to do (just as John Hunte and all others of the Twenty-Four were obliged to assist the mayor for the time being in what he did), John scurrilously and falsely challenged William, using improper and unfitting words in the presence of the crowd, contrary to his oath. It was decided by Robert Warmwell, Henry Man, John Swyft, Thomas Mason, John Bremle, John Noble, Thomas Randolf, and Richard Gatour, to whose correction John Hunte had submitted himself, that he be discharged from the office of city constable, that as an example to others henceforth he no longer attend meetings [?] (*in nullo modo decetero se intromittat*), and that he feast all the citizens or pay £1 for a banquet.

It was alleged against Thomas Freman 'mercer', and on behalf of the mayor and citizens it was complained, that he feigned a plea of debt on Friday next before Michaelmas last [23 Sept. 1429] under the name of one John Horf of Taunton, when there was none such, in the court of Bristol town, and became pledge in a suit against Thomas [sic, recte William] Hamelyn of New Salisbury, their neighbour, in a plea of debt, so that he [William] was placed under arrest in Bristol for three days; and that he [Thomas Freman] meanwhile, riding about in various parts of Somerset, procured and excited various people to bring actions against the said William in the said court in pleas of debt, in which he owed nothing, as was said; and that he procured others to empanel him in a court of law held at New Salisbury on Wednesday next after St. Edmund the king last [23 Nov. 1429] to accuse the said William concerning a knife drawn in breach of the peace by one Thomas Gerveys, whom he supported, against the said William, [the offence being] presented against Thomas Gerveys by the alderman of the place where it happened, which the same Thomas [Gerveys] denied and put himself on [the judgement of] the jury. All those failings redounded not only to Thomas Freman's condemnation but also to [the discredit of] the fellowship (*ritus*) of the Twenty-Four. Even so, on the intervention of his friends and at their supplication, all the aforesaid [offences] are forgiven, and so long as he behaves himself well he is received [back] as one of the fellowship, but if in any of the foregoing or in like matters he offends he is to be expelled for ever.

For which [they had] a privy seal [letter], which was placed in the mayor's chest in 'le Councelhous', in these words:

[In French, at length, summarized here] Needing money for his proposed expedition to France in April to put an end to the war, the king, by letters under the great seal, commissioned the bishop of Bath, Lord Hungerford the Treasurer, John Juyn knight chief baron of the Exchequer, the dean of Salisbury, Humphrey Stafford, Edmund Cheyne, William Boneville, John Stourton, knights, William Darell esquire, and the sheriffs of Wiltshire, Somerset, and Dorset jointly and severally, to treat with the city for a loan of money and to promise surety in the king's name for repayment.

Agreed: the said citizens to lend to the king 100 marks. And as to the \pounds 100 which the citizens had lent King Henry V through the cardinal bishop of Winchester and which were to be repaid by him, Sir Walter Hungerford treasurer of England to receive them from the cardinal to lend them to the present king, and to give surety for repaying them to the mayor and community.

Elected as assessors for the expenses of the citizens [in parliament] which amount to $\pounds 28$ 2s. for 141 days as appears in the king's writ sewn in here [no. 267]: Richard Gatour, Stephen Mercer, Robert Gilberd, John Chippenham; as collectors: Thomas Payn, Richard Plouman, Edward Gudyer, John Crikemour.

[Paid] for a painted clothe ('Peytidcloth') for 'le Councelhous', 5s.; for a mace there, 21/2d.; to John Estbury and John Alisaundr', collectors for the expenses of the knights' [i.e. citizens at parliament], 6s.; to William Lord for his work and for writing letters to the king and the certificate of tenements held in socage and of rents-seck and everything [?] (om's or on'is) in the city returned before John Westbury and his fellow justices [no amount given]; to William Balfot, 3s. 4d. So Richard Gatour owes on his account \pounds , 8, which he was to pay at the Purification next [2 Feb. 1432]. Later he was to pay £1 at the nativity of St. John [the Baptist] and afterwards \pounds term by term until the \pounds was fully paid.

The support was given on the duke's acceptance of five articles, of which the second was that no Englishman be allowed to sell English cloth at any market within the duke's lordships, and the fifth that the Flemish towns should have the wool [stored or sold] at Calais. A large force was preparing to besiege Calais. [f. 105] On this, the king sent three privy seal letters to the mayor of Salisbury, which are transcribed in full in the book. The first [in French], dated Westminster 14 Feb. [1436] and addressed to the mayor and other good folk of Salisbury, summoned the mayor to appear at Westminster two weeks from Easter next [22 April] to hear what the Council shall decide. The second [also in French], dated Westminster 14 Feb. and addressed to the mayor and community of Salisbury, required a loan of 300 marks for the army to be sent to France under the duke of York. The third [in English], dated Westminster 26 March and addressed to the mayor, bailiffs, and inhabitants of Salisbury, enclosed the report of the negotiations at Ghent and the massing of the force against Calais, and [f. 105v.] required the city to send to the king as many persons 'defensables and habiles' for the war to raise the siege, certifying to the county sheriff within eight days of receipt of the letter the number of people to be sent.

Copy [in Latin] of the response of the mayor, bailiffs, and inhabitants made to Edmund Hungerford knight, sheriff of Wiltshire, on Tuesday, the sixth day [17 Apr. 1436] after the receipt on 11 April of the king's letter: twelve men were ready to set out.

To be noted: The mayor Stephen Coupere, by virtue of the king's privy seal letter addressed to him, appeared before the king two weeks from Easter [22 Apr. 1436] and with all the mayors of England was asked by the Council what sum of money he could provide for the king for the defence of the realm. Because the Council was informed by Walter Hungerford of the various burdens undertaken by the city in that defence, he

was excused from providing any sum.

The sum of 300 marks specified in the said letters was discussed by the mayor and community with Lord Hungerford, according to the privy seal letter sent to him, on 11 April in the chapter house of the canons of Salisbury, with the sum of $\pounds 25$ provided by them for the king, which had been paid on the feast of St. Martin last [11 Nov. 1435]. Afterwards, under a privy seal letter, the payment not yet made was to be deferred to the following Easter, and the money was increased to $\pounds 50$. The said Stephen asked to have surety both for the $\pounds 25$ which long ago had been delivered by Richard Ecton and for the $\pounds 25$ newly granted, payable at Whitsun following Whitsun next. For the mayor's expenses in this matter, William Swayn paid to the said mayor $\pounds 2$

Elected to the number of the Forty-Eight for others who are to be commended to God: Thomas Bokebrigge, Walter Huntle, John Halsted, Thomas Gyle, John Lumbard.

The king by his writ ordered the mayor to have and levy the expenses of the citizens at the parliament at Westminster on 25 Feb. 23 Hen.VI [1445], amounting to $\pounds 40$ 8s. for 202 days for each of them, viz.William Hore and Richard Hayn.

Elected from the Twenty-Four to assess [the levy for] the said expenses: John Aport, Simon Poy constable, Walter Corrogan, John Wyse, John Parant constable; from the Forty-Eight: John Wynchester, Thomas [Pakker' crossed out] Stoppe, Stephen Hiwode, [Anselm Hebbyng crossed out, Thomas Whitynge added]; as collectors: Reginald Wynle 'bruer' from New Street, Simon Newman from Market (mercato), Thomas Gile from St. Martin's, William [Carevic'r crossed out] Beste 'smyth' from Meadow. The mayor, John Wyot, and William Swayn, were appointed to assess both the assessors and the collectors, and Thomas Payn and Anselm Hebbying with them.

404. [Heading:] R. Payne mayor.

Assembly: Saturday next after St. Peter [in chains] 24 Hen.VI [6 Aug. 1446].

The king sent a privy seal letter to the mayor and community to appear before his commissioners, viz. the dean of Salisbury cathedral, Robert Hungerford, John Stourton, and John Baynton knights, appointed to treat with the mayor and community for the advance to the king of a certain sum of money.

Memorandum: on Thursday next after St. Martin 25 Hen.VI [17 Nov. 1446] William Cormayle and Thomas Payn, chamberlains, accounted before Robert Warmwell and the other auditors, and there before the mayor and auditors there was delivered \pounds 13 10s. 6d. for the use of the mayor and community, everything being accounted for, and so they went quit, as appears in their account. From the \pounds 13 10s. 6d. Robert Warmwell and William Swayn delivered to John Wheler and Clement Fourbour, stewards of the brotherhood of St. George this year, 20 marks, and the stewards accounted for that and the issues and profits of the brotherhood annually before the mayor and other auditors with the chamberlains. For the 20 marks the stewards and Stephen Hendy and John Thursby were bound in writing to Robert Warmwell, William Swayn, Simon Poy, and Thomas Payn for the use and benefit of the mayor.

405. Assembly: 12 Nov. 25 Hen.VI [1446].

Present: thirteen from the Twenty-Four, twenty-eight from the Forty-Eight.

Agreed: the mayor to have his pension and allowances as other mayors have been used to have, and the other allowances written below, viz. for the mayor's pension this year, \pounds 10; for the board and clothing of the chaplain of St. George, \pounds 2 13s. 4d.; for the city officials' clothing, \pounds 1 3s.; in a gift to the duke of Gloucester, 14s. 8d. in a gift to Lord Hungerford, 11s. 8d.; to the king's official, 6s. 8d.; to the duke of Gloucester's official, 6s. 8d.; to the cardinal of England's official, 6s. 8d.; to the duke of York's official, 3s. 4d.; to the duke of Exeter's official, 3s. 4d.; to the marquess of Dorset's official, 3s. 4d.; to the archbishop of Canterbury's official, 3s. 4d.; to the earl of Devon's official, 3s. 4d.; to the marquess of Suffolk's official, 3s. 4d.; to Robert Hungerford's official, 1s. 8d.; in expenses and costs of riding to Sonning to show to the bishop of Salisbury the charters for various articles, 10s.; in gifts to the prior of the Charterhouse on two occasions, 4s. 3d.; [for two cartloads of firewood on the eve of St. John the Baptist and of St. Peter, for two casks of good ale at the same time, *crossed out*]; given to John Uffenham and John Mone for [? the detailing *or* the reduction (*the word looks like* menucione)] of the fifteenth in New Salisbury, 6s. 8d. Sum, \pounds 18 5s. 3d.

Agreed: two keys of the common chest to be delivered one to Thomas Payn and another one other to [John Wynchester *crossed out*] Henry Frend.

Names of those elected to audit the chamberlains' accounts in the mayoralty of Richard Payn: Robert Warmwell, William Swayn, John Mone 'gent', John Skott.

Agreed in the presence of the mayor, Robert Warmwell, William Swayn, John Scott, and John Mone, the auditors, and also of William Halstede, William Knollys, and Thomas Payn that the said chamberlains pay to Richard Payne 13s. 4d. which Richard advanced to the mayor and community for the work of William Lord, to be had as an allowance due in the next account, and to John Peraunt $\pounds 1$ 13s. 4d. which he paid to William Pakyn as part of his fee.

Agreed: the present mayor to have in relief of his costs all the fees and other charges granted before this time as he used to have.

Also, the officials to have their wages and livery as they used to have in earlier years.

Also, the collectors of a fifteenth and tenth granted to the king always in the future to have for their work $\pounds 1$ for a fifteenth and tenth, 10s. for half a fifteenth and tenth, and so on *pro rata*.

408. Assembly: Wednesday 18 Jan. 25 Hen. VI [1447].

Elected to attend the parliament at Cambridge on St. Scholastica's day, viz. 10 Feb. next, each receiving for his work 1s. a day and not more, viz. Thomas Temse and [Philip Morgan *crossed out*] John Mone 'gent', Thomas and Philip [*sic*] agreeing to attend for the said fee.

Assembly: Wednesday [incomplete].

Granted to Thomas Temps and John Mone for their time at the parliament held at Bury [St. Edmunds, to which the parliament originally summoned to Cambridge was resummoned] on the feast of St. Scholastica, $\pounds 4$, viz. each receiving 1s. a day.

The names of those to assess the men of the city [for the payment to Thomas Tempse and John Mone], from the Twenty-Four: Robert Cove, John Honythorn; from the

Forty-Eight: Thomas Pakker, Anselm Hebbyng; collectors of the expenses of the knights [*i.e. citizens at parliament*]: New Street, Richard Bowier; Market, John Shergold; St. Martin's, William Meriet; Meadow, John Hert 'carpenter'.

410. The mayor's council at the Council House (*domo consilii*): Monday next after the nativity of St. John the Baptist 25 Hen.VI [26 June 1447].

Before the mayor, John Wyot, Walter Carogan, Robert Cove, Simon Poy, William Cormaile, John Honythorn, John Wyse, and others, came John Holme, John Cleve, Edmund Bentley, John Toker, Richard Sexsy, and John Penell, 'tanners', and put themselves on the mayor's mercy because they did not come to watch with the said mayor on St. John's eve as they were summoned to do. They asked to be admitted to fine and they were admitted, as appears on their heads [?] (prout patet super eorum capita), and they were sworn on the book to observe those things etc. Nicholas Wedirgrove, John Maideman, Richard Campion [John Barbour crossed out, William Jones, and Thomas Herde interlined], barbers (barbitons'), came and put themselves on the mayor's mercy as above for the same cause, etc. John Luter 'corveser' [came] and put himself on the mayor's mercy in the same way and form for the same reason.

William Swayn [fined] 2 lb. [of wax], John Wyot 2 lb., Walter Carogan 2 lb., John Jervays 2 lb., John Estbury 2 lb., from the number of the Twenty-Four because they did not come when they were summoned; John Wynchester 1 lb., Anselm Hebbyng 1 lb., Thomas Pakker 1 lb., John Hall 1 lb., John Cleve 'brewer' 1 lb., Richard Plowman 1 lb., John Slegge 1 lb., from the number of the Forty-Eight, because [they did not come when] they were summoned.

[Agreed]: all the citizens to have a blue gown (tog' blod'), as in the mayoralty of W. Swayn, for the king's visit.

Also, the king to have as a gift for his visit (...).

Also, William Devenyssh to have his tenement in which he lives for 13s. 4d. [a year for term of his life *interlined*], repairing his tenement himself under the community's supervision, and to receive his estate from the mayor and community for making improvements by the city's grant.

412. Assembly: Friday after the Assumption 25 Hen.VI [18 Aug. 1447].

Agreed: the king to have as a gift from the community twelve gifts [?] (bon') on his visit to the city; and after his departure, at the mayor's appointment, the citizens to come

together to view and grant a day of bounty [?] (bonitatis) [or perhaps limitatis] so that the money for the said twelve gifts can be levied.

Also, the men [who are] citizens elected John Lye and Michael Skyllyng to be of the city counsel [for term of their lives *crossed out*], each receiving $\pounds 2$ at two terms of the year from the chamber, and they are to come and attend the city council as often as and whenever they are required or one of them is required.

Also, John Wheler to have his tenement and for term of ninety-eight years on certain conditions, viz. that the said John Wheler [*incomplete*].

413. [Heading:] J. Aport mayor.

Assembly: 15 Sept. 26 Hen.VI [1447].

Present: twenty from the number of the Twenty-Four and all from the number of the Forty-Eight, and many others.

Agreed: outside (*extranees*) butchers to have their stalls in the weekly market place as often as and when they wish, and the resident (*intrinc*') butchers to have their stalls in their own houses and not in the market; and if any resident butcher sells [or makes to sell *interlined*] meat outside his house the meat or the price of it to be forfeit. Stephen Hendy, William Lyghtfote, and all others of the said numbers [*i.e. of the Tiventy-Four and the Forty-Eight*] granted that if the mayor for the time being holds an assembly to the contrary (...) he is to lose his fee for that year.

Agreed further: William Devenysch to have and hold his office of serjeant of the mayor [and community of New Salisbury, called *interlined*] 'mayresergaunt' on this condition, that the said William should behave well to the mayor and community and their successors, and that the said William should have from the common weigh-beam, while he holds his said office, 13s. 4d. sterling [a year].

414. Assembly: Monday next after St. Simon and St. Jude 26 Hen.VI [30 Oct. 1447].

Present: [in the margin, the mayor; no others named].

Agreed: all outside fishmongers (*piscatores*) in the city to have their stands and stalls on the common ditch for selling fish, and not elsewhere, and they and each of them to sell their fish by their own hands and not through another, under penalty of forfeit etc.

Also that there are to be four keys for the common chest in which the common seal is kept, one to be kept by the mayor, one by another of the Twenty-Four, and two by persons of the Forty-Eight.

Election of auditors for this year: [in the margin the mayor], John Wyot, William Hore, from the Twenty-Four; Anselm Hebbyng, John Hall, from the Forty-Eight.

Agreed: the mayor to have his pension and his other allowances as other mayors have used to have, viz. for the mayor's pension this year, $\pounds 10$; for the board and clothing of the chaplain of St. George, $\pounds 2$ 13s. 4d.; in a gift to the duke of Gloucester's men, 10s.; in wine given to the prior of the Charterhouse, 8d.; to the king's official, 6s. 8d.; to the duke of Gloucester's official, 6s. 8d.; to Henry, cardinal of England's official, 6s. 8d.; to the duke of York's official 3s. 4d.; to the duke of Exeter's official, 3s. 4d.; to the marquess of Dorset's official, 3s. 4d.; to the chancellor of England's official, 3s. 4d.; to the earl of Devon's official, 3s. 4d.; to the marquess of Suffolk's official, 3s. 4d.; to the earl of Shrewsbury's official, 3s. 4d.; for the carriage of a pipe of wine which was given to the duke of Gloucester, 5s.; in 'gildyng' for the mace, 5s.; for clothing two city officials, 16s. Sum $\pounds 16$ 13s. 4d.

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415. Election: All Souls' day 26 Hen. VI [2 Nov. 1447].

Mayor, John Wyot; reeves, William Wotton, Robert Meteyeve; alderman of New Street, John Welweton; of Market, John Wyse 'vynter'; of St. Martin's, Roger Mayn; of Meadow, John Hert; serjeants, Edmund Eggesworth, Ralph Pakker.

John Cammell, John Hall, Thomas Payn were elected to the number of the Twenty-Four.

John Chatour 'smyth' made fine for being excused the offices of alderman and reeve, $\pounds 4$, to be paid at Michaelmas $\pounds 2$ and at the same feast then next following $\pounds 2$, pledge John Walssh 'brewer' [of that there was received at the hands of Simon Poy and John Wynchestr' chamberlains $\pounds 2$ added later].

416. Assembly: Wednesday next after the Conception 26 Hen. VI [13 Dec. 1447].

Present: nineteen from the Twenty-Four and twenty-four from the Forty-Eight, etc.

Agreed: Simon Poy and Thomas Payn, the chamberlains, and other chamberlains for the time being to have all their allowances on being examined and sworn by the auditors. Simon Poy, John Wynchester were elected chamberlains for this year.

417. [Heading:] Wyot mayor.

Assembly: Friday next after the translation of St. Thomas the Martyr 26 Hen. VI [12 July 1448].

Present [*in two columns*]: Robert Cove, Walter Carogan, John Gerveyse. Thomas Payn, Simon Poy, William Lyghtfote, John Esterbury, John a Port, Richard Payn, William Cormayle, John Honythorn, William Hore, Stephen Hendy, [*column two*] Edmund Langto[n], Henry Frend, William Pette, John Dogode, John Mone 'gent', Clement Forbour, John Cleve 'tanner', William Wilmot, Henry Shad, John Halstede, Thomas Whytyng, John Lumbard, John Walysch, Thomas Stopp', William Soper', John Wheler', Richard Hayne 'taylour', Walter Brydd, Stephen Hake, Thomas Copter, Richard Walker, John Slegg, William Wotton, John Wynchester, Edward Bonere, William Child, John Mone 'touker', Walter Hende, William Mory, Thomas Valeys, John Wylly.

Agreed: citizens living over the common ditch (*trenchea*) on the southern side ought for their part to scour the ditch (*fossat*') and mend it at their own cost and expense, and the citizens living on the northern side of the said ditch for their part likewise ought to scour and mend it at their own cost and expense.

Also, all citizens and all of enough wealth (*de mag' sufficienc'*) to have a gown of blue (*blod'*) colour [5d. (*i.e. in value*) *interlined*] and a hat of red colour for the king's visit, under penalty of 13s. 4d. of each of them.

418. Election of the mayor and other officers at the end of the mayoralty of H. Man, on All Souls' day 11 Hen.VI [2 Nov. 1432] in St. Edmund's church, as is the custom, with fines [*i.e. for being excused office*]. [It is not clear why the election of 1432 is so far out of place.]

Mayor, Henry Baron; reeves, Robert Pottere, William Chepman; alderman of New Street, John Chaunceler [*sic, recte* Chaundeler?]; of Market, John Alysaundr'; of St. Martin's William Mohun; of Meadow, Thomas Archebaud; serjeants, Henry Frend, Thomas Yoxford.

Fines: John White 'mercer' \pounds 5 for being excused [the offices of] alderman and reeve, paid to Robert Warmwell \pounds 5; John Park for being excused the office of alderman \pounds 2, paid to Robert Warmwell \pounds 2 by account; John Everard for being excused the offices of alderman, reeve, and all others except king's serjeant \pounds 5, to be paid half at Michaelmas next and the other half at Michaelmas following, pledges [Robert Warmwell *crossed out*], John Bremle, and Robert Gilberd; John Gerveys for being excused the offices of alderman and reeve \pounds 5, to be paid half at Michaelmas next [*in the margin*, in Robert Warmwell's account] and the other half at Michaelmas following, pledges Richard Gatour, John Wyot; John Colyngbourne for being excused the office of reeve \pounds 2, half to be paid at Michaelmas next [*in the margin*, by Robert Warmwell's account] and the other half at Michaelmas following, pledges Richard Gatour, Robert Gilberd. Sum \pounds 19.

John Hobbys 'brewer' by the Friars Minor for $\pounds 4$ which he will pay through 5s. rent arising from the tenement which William Clerk [occupied] in Castle Street ('Castelstret'), conveyed to the mayor and community, was excused the offices of alderman and reeve.

Richard Shirle [incomplete.]

John Estbury for a fine of $\pounds 2$ in the time of H. Man paid to John Boteler, as appears in the said John [Boteler]'s account, and $\pounds 2$ for [being excused the offices of] alderman and reeve; John a Port for a fine of $\pounds 3$ in the time of H. Man 10 [Hen.VI, 1431-2] paid to John Boteler, as appears in the account of the same; John Gilberd of Odstock for a fine of $\pounds 2$ paid to John Boteler.

419. Various ordinances and constitutions made for the city's use in various mayoralties, beginning with Walter Shirle 10 Hen. IV [1408–9]. [The ordinances, except for the last and with a few minor errors and omissions, are printed in translation in H.M.C. Var. Coll. IV, pp. 193–5.]

In the time of Walter Shirle, [it was ordered] that there should be two chamberlains to receive the debts owed to the city, to pay the debts which the city owes, to repair houses, and to pay, meet, and discharge other charges on the city; and that there should be a comptroller for them; for this were elected as chamberlains John Becket and John Judde, and as their controller Thomas Rede, who were to account annually to the mayor and other auditors assigned to them.

At the same time there was presented to the king, being at Clarendon, at the nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary $\pounds 26$ 13s. 4d.

In the same year John Moner in a full assembly of the citizens gave his tenement at the upper bridge of Fisherton, which John Crabilane held, to the hospice of the 'Almeshous'.

In the time of John Beket [it was ordered] that all of the Twenty-Four should come to the mass to be offered for a dead member under penalty of 2 lb. of wax unless they had a reasonable cause of absence.

In the time of John Levesham, by the mediation of the bishop of Winchester, chancellor of England, and Edward duke of York, the city advanced to King Henry V \pounds 100 in the second year of his reign, as appears in the said John's account.

In the time of William Waryn [it was ordered] that any freeholder who, being given notice to attend the assembly, made default should incur a penalty of 6d. and ale (*et s'*) for each default, as appears among the memoranda of the same mayor, 3 Hen.V [1415-16].

Also that people bringing victuals into the city for sale should not sell them in inns or secretly or before daylight but in the places ordained for the purpose.

Also that horses carrying victuals or other commodities to the city should after being unloaded be taken by their drivers or others to a resting place outside the market and the common street, so that no harm or damage should happen to passers by from them. Also that victuallers coming to the city with cheese, milk, grapes, plums, apples, pears, and other fruits should in future be made to keep to the place facing Richard Oword's tenement, now John Gage's, where the new cross is being built.

Also that the common ditches (*trench*') running through the middle of the city should henceforth be kept free of dung and other unsuitable matter.

Also that covert tenures and feoffments should henceforth be held and reputed null and void because contrary to the city's customs.

Also that outside (*extranii*) butchers should not be moved from the places assigned to them by the mayor without reasonable cause and common and solemn assembly of the citizens and commoners.

Also that all outside victuallers both butchers and fishmongers should be altogether separated in their stands from the city victuallers.

Also that no one living in the city should receive any grain put out for sale in the market into his house after the ninth hour for storage, under penalty of $\frac{1}{2}$ mark, nor any fish or meat under the same penalty.

Also that in every election, both for mayor and for citizens at parliament and other officials, each person should be free to nominate whom he wishes, but that no one should be finally elected on the nomination of just one person.

419A. In the time of John Judde it was ordered that the chamberlains and collectors of tallage and all others owing money to the city should be held to render account whenever required by the mayor for the time being, and for this audit were appointed as auditors the mayor for the time being, Walter Shirle, William Waryn, Richard Gage, [and] John Everard, and that those auditors and all others for the time being should have a day every year, the feast of St. Luke [18 Oct.], for certifying to the mayor and community at the next assembly then following as to the foot or fine [*i.e. the bottom line*] of the account.

There was presented to John Chaundeler, bishop of Salisbury, on his installation 40 marks, a sum which was loaned by certain persons and paid back to them, as appears in the mayoralty of the said John Jude, 5 Hen.VI [recte Hen.V, 1417-18].

In the mayoralty of John Salesbury 17 Ric. II [1393] it was ordered that King Henry IV should have 100 marks and two silver-gilt cups (*ij cup' arg' et deaur'*) and the queen 50 marks, and also that Robert Halom, bishop of Salisbury, should have $\pounds 20$, to be levied and collected from the whole city. [Tivo or more entries appear to have been elided: a gift to Henry IV cannot have been made during Richard II's reign, and Robert Hallum did not become bishop until 1407.]

In the time of Robert Poynant 6 Hen.V [1418–19] it was ordered that those having pigs, geese, or ducks should be prohibited from putting them outside their houses.

In the mayoralty of Robert Warmwell 8 Hen. V [1420] it was decreed that no deed should henceforth be sealed under the mayoral seal except by the city clerk deputed for the purpose.

In the time of Henry Man it was ordered that the mayor for the time being [should have] $\pounds 10$ for all expenses and charges met during his mayoralty, to be paid in the following way, half at Easter at the chamberlains' hands and the other half at the end of the year, but that if the mayor should die after Easter and before the end of his year then that half should remain in the chamberlains' hands for the use of the city, except that the city officials should have their liveries at the city's expense and that the chaplain of St. George, viz. Edmund [blank], should be at the board of the mayor for the time being, receiving 8 marks a year, for which the mayor should receive $\pounds 2$ 13s. 4d. for his board at the chamberlains' hands and that he [sc. the chaplain] should be attendant on every mayor. And if the king or another secular lord or prelate comes to the city nothing should be given to him except by order of the assembly of citizens.

419B. In the mayoralty of William Waryn it was ordered that butchers should not slaughter their animals in front of Butcher Row ('le Bocherrewe') in the common street but behind it, because of the foulness, putrifaction, and nastiness of the [offal from] said animals.

Also that they should not render down their [blank] by day but at night, and that they should not carry away the offal or intestines of their animals by day but at night.

Also that poulterers and all other victuallers bringing goods to the city for sale should sell them in the common market and not in inns and specially when it is light (*cum cl'i*) [*the reading is uncertain;* H.M.C. Var. Coll. IV, p. 195, reads it as rabbits, sc. cuniculi; *cf. no.* 286] and not at night but during the day.

If it happens that the chaplain of St. George is ill the mayor for the time being should pay him 1s. for each week that he lies [in bed].

In the mayoralty of John Bromle 6 Hen. VI [1427-8] it was ordered that outside fishmongers (*piscatores extranii*) should be separated from resident (*intrincec'*) fishmongers as above [*i.e. like the butchers*?], and that the outside fishmongers should have their stands over the common trench behind the stand of the city fishmongers.

Also that the owners of all animals put out for sale should keep to their place at Barnwell Cross ('Bernewellcros') and Culver Street ('Colverstret') to sell them there.

Also that anyone who has been mayor of the city should be quit from performing that office for five years after occupying the office.

Also agreed: John Hall mayor to receive and have from the common chest a bond deposited there, by which kept Robert Cove, Nicholas Shute, and Thomas Payn, citizens, were bound to William Cormayle, then mayor, John Peraunt, and Anselni Hebbyng, then chamberlains, in 10 marks to be paid at Michaelmas after [the date of] the bond, of which the date is 8 Oct. [blank] Hen.VI, in part payment of the expenses made by the said John Hall and allowed to him as expressed above.

Edward Chilterne appeared and presented royal letters signed with the royal signet, of which the tenor is contained below.

[Transcript, in English, the spelling modernized here:] By the king. Trusty and well beloved, we greet you well, and albeit that we herebefore by our several letters in

consideration of the good service that our well beloved Edward Chilterne, notary, hath done to us as well within this realm as in our realm of France have desired him to be chosen unto the office of recorder otherwise called town clerk of our city of Salisbury, howbeit also that he was chosen thereunto by you mayor [and] commoners of the livery and number of Twenty-Four citizens of our said city yet nevertheless our said letters have taken none effect as yet because he was not chosen in common assembly among you all, as we be informed. Wherefore we write effsoons unto you desiring and praying you heartily that at the reverence of this our special writing you will at your next assembly by your common assent [appoint] this the said Edward unto the foresaid office of your town clerk to have unto him for term of his life with the fees, profits, and commodities thereto appertaining as other clerks of that office have had before without any further delays, wherein you shall do unto us right good pleasure and cause us to be the rather inclined to show you the favour of our good grace when the case shall require it. Given under our signet at our city of Winchester the last day of June.

Also, a writ dated 8 June 29 Hen.VI [1451], to the mayor and bailiffs of Salisbury, to proclaim an Act of parliament that the king should have for his use all the alum from Foglia [?] ('Alym Foyle') belonging to the merchants of Genoa ('Jeyne') or their agents in the town and port of Southampton to the value of $\pounds 8,000$ to be delivered to those deputed by the king, but that repayment be made to the merchants of Genoa or their agents from the subsidies and customs of merchandise imported into and traded or exported from thence to the said sum of $\pounds 8,000$ which the merchants of Genoa will pay to the king and will be appropriated for his use on pain of forfeiture of the third part of the sales of alum of the kind,

Also, a writ dated 28 Jan. [year omitted, but see next entry] Hen. VI [1451], to the keepers of the peace and each of them in the town of New Salisbury for suit of peace [?] on behalf of William Maysaunt against Thomas Hawede 'skynner', John Peryn 'skynner', John Skyrby 'skynner', and John Skynner of Hereford.

Also, a writ of *supersedeas*, dated 22 Feb. the said year 29 Hen.VI [1451], to the keepers of the peace in the county of Wilts. and the city of Salisbury and each of them at the suit of Bartholomew Broke against John Westover after an information made against the said John as he suggested in that the same John Westover found mainpernors in Chancery for the said Bartholomew and all the king's people.

Also, a writ dated 7 Dec. the said year [1450], to the keepers of the peace as above for John Suter against Thomas Petyr and John Oylfot for a surety.

Also, a writ dated 16 April 29 Hen.VI [1451], to the keepers of the peace as above for John Chaundeler for the safety of his life and limbs against Robert Denby 'boucher' of New Salisbury.

On Sunday next before St. Bartholomew the said year [22 Aug. 1451] Thomas Valeys of New Salisbury a merchant in the county of Wilts. acknowledged that he was bound to Joan widow of William Warwyk late a citizen of New Salisbury in $\pounds 60$ to be paid on the feast of St. Andrew next [30 Nou], and unless etc.

On the feast of the Annunciation of the Blessed Virgin Mary the said year [25 Mar. 1451], William Magot 'bowchere' and merchant of the city of Salisbury acknowledged that he was bound to Robert Chaundeler of the said city, merchant, in $\pounds 10$ for various merchandise bought from him, to be paid to the same on the feast of St. John the Baptist next [24 June], and unless etc.

On 18 Feb. the said year James Michell of New Salisbury acknowledged that he was bound and owed to John Horn $\pounds 10$ for various merchandise bought from him, to be paid to the same on the feast of St. Matthew thereafter [21 Sept.], and unless etc.

Memorandum: John Perraunt and Anselm Hebbyng, lately chamberlains for the two years next before John Hall was elected mayor, accounted for the said two years before William Swayn, Robert Cove, John Slegge, and John Wheler, the auditors assigned, for all rents and other profits arising in the city for the said two years [*repeated*], and when everything accountable had been accounted and all allowances allowed [the mayor and *interlined*] community owed to the said accountants £8 6s. 9½d.

446. Memorandum: John Hall late mayor accounted before the said auditors on Saturday next before St. Leonard 30 Hen. VI [30 Oct. 1451]. First, for $\pounds 37$ 7s. 6d. which he received from John Laundevere, Richard Bowyer', John Parche, and Thomas Leker', collectors of the fourth part of a fifteenth granted in the parliament at Winchester and of the expenses of the citizens at that parliament; for $\pounds 37$ 11s. 4d. [*recte* $\pounds 37$ 4s. 4d., to accord with the sum total] received by him from John Dogode and Walter Stede, William Meryot and John Chaundeler', John Nobele and John Galagemakere, Thomas Mabre and John Wyse vintner ('vynter'), collectors of the expenses of the citizens lately being at the parliament of Winchester and Westminster. Sum total received, $\pounds 74$ 11s. 10d. [And there remained to be received from the said Thomas Mabr' and John Wyse vintner ('vynter') $\pounds 1$ 1s. 3d. crossed out.]

John Hall late mayor also accounts for the repayment made by him for a gift given to the king, for six [?recte four, to accord with the sum total] large oxen at a price of \pounds 1 6s. 8d. [each], for two smaller oxen at a price of \pounds 1 3s. 4d. [each], and for fifty sheep at a price of \pounds 5 [together], sum total \pounds 12 13s. 4d.; for a cask of wine, 6 quarters of wheat, 6 pipes of ale given to the reverend father Richard [Beauchamp] bishop of Salisbury at his installation, \pounds 13 13s. 8d.; paid by the same to John Whittokkesmede and Philip Morgan, burgesses [sic] for the city of Salisbury at the parliament at Winchester, for half their wages, \pounds 11 6s. 8d.; paid to William Swayn and Edmund Penston, citizens at the parliament at Westminster ending at Leicester, for half their wages, \pounds 22; to Philip Morgayn for his expenses in riding to Winchester to find out about the king's visit to the city, 10s.; for the taker of ale for the king for his reward, 6s. 8d.; in a pipe of wine given to Sir John Saymour, sheriff of Wiltshire, for gaining his good will, \pounds 3 5s.; to the undersheriff for his reward and for having his good will and all else, 13s. 4d.; in a present given to the duke of Somerset, $\pounds 1$ 6s. 8d.; for the expense of writing the rolls for the collectors of the fifteenth and for the expenses of the citizens at parliament and in other small expenses, 8s. 8d. Sum total, $\pounds 66$ 4s.

Memorandum: whereas William Swayn and Richard Balteswell, citizens and grocers of the city of New Salisbury, on a disagreement arising between them about a bond in the said William's hands in which it was contained that Richard was obliged to pay \pounds 100 sterling on a certain day stated in the document to the mayor and his brethren from the Twenty-Four on certain conditions written on the dorse of the bond and on certain other articles agreed on by certain arbitrators, viz. William Lygtfote and Symon Poye on William Swayn's part and John Wyot and Richard Payn on Richard Balteswell's part, chosen agreeably by the said parties to pronounce, define, award, and arbitrate on the foregoing, and swore [to observe] the statement, award, decision, and decree of the same arbitrators from top to bottom, on 11 Nov. 30 Hen.VI [1451] in the council house before John Hall then mayor and the said arbitrators the parties appeared in person and were present to receive the award in the matter, and after discussion between the same arbitrators they annulled the same document and gave it, divided by them, to the same Richard Balteswell, decreeing that the same Richard Balteswell should behave himself well with regard to the mayor and his fellow citizens of the Twenty-Four elders and their successors, and should not without reasonable cause annoy, disturb, or belittle them or any of them by any mocking (rixatoriis) or opprobrious words, and that if it should be lawfully proved that the same Richard acted to the contrary he is to pay $f_{2,5}$ to the common chest of the city and the same amount to the fabric of St. Thomas's church when he is duly required to do so; John a Port and Robert Cove being then present there at the pronouncement of this award.

II [*1386*] before Robert Play, then mayor, acknowledged that he was bound to Robert Harongeye citizen and merchant of London in \pounds 39, was certified by William War[m]well mayor of this city.

On 24 May 7 Ric. II [1384] Thomas Vyport dyer ('digher'), merchant of the county of Wilts., acknowledged that he owed to John Moner, John Baker grocer, Richard Juwel, merchants of the same county, \pounds 15 sterling to be paid as is more fully contained in a statute merchant acknowledged before Thomas Hynedon, then mayor of Salisbury; it was certified by William Warmwelle on 2 May 12 Ric. II [1389].

On 30 Sept. 5 Ric. II [1381] John Pykot of (Lilesford?) merchant of the county of Southampton acknowledged that he was bound by a statute merchant before Thomas Chandeler, then mayor of Salisbury, in $\pounds 40$ sterling to be paid to Robert Harneges, citizen and merchant of the city of London. It also was certified by William Warmwell, then mayor, viz. on 24 April 12 Ric. II [1389].

John Preston of New Salisbury merchant of the county of Wilts., before John Nedlere, then mayor, and Ralph Tile, the king's clerk, on 21 March 8 Ric. II [1385] acknowledged that he owed to Roger Siward now deceased and to John Siward, merchants of the county of Dorset, \pounds 140 sterling for various merchandise traded between them, to be paid at New Salisbury on the nativity of St. John the Baptist [24 June] then next following. It was certified during the mayoralty of William Warmwell on 4 May 12 Ric. II [1389].

Edmund Penston [was elected *interlined*; and Edward Chylterne were elected *crossed* out] and sworn to the number of the Twenty-Four. John Frank was elected to the number of the Twenty-Four, and was not yet sworn. [Added, Later the same John Frank was sworn.] Edward Chiltern was elected and sworn to the number of the Twenty-Four.

Nicholas Wedergrove made fine for being excused the offices of alderman and reeve $\pounds 4$, $[\pounds 2]$ to be paid at Michaelmas next, and $\pounds 2$ at the Michaelmas following, pledges [Thomas Freman and William Swayn *crossed out*; John Wyot and John Wyly *interlined*]. John Frank made fine for being excused the office of alderman and reeve $\pounds 4$, to be paid on the same feasts, pledged John Hall and John Wyot. [Both entries crossed out and each marked in the margin Fine $\pounds 4$, paid to J. Wyse $\pounds 2$.]

Agreed among those citizens who are of the Twenty-Four elders: in the election of the mayor, to be held each year according to the city's custom, they should not nominate or write to the commons the name of the person who in fact (*realiter*) occupied the office in the preceding year, so that he is accepted as mayor [?] (*ut assumatur in maiorem*), but will write and nominate to the commons for the office three suitable others of his brethren who have not held the office in the five preceding years, according to the orders (*acta*) made earlier; and if any of the number of the said citizens effectively acts to the contrary in this matter he shall pay $\pounds 10$ into the common chest when duly called upon by the mayor for the time being.

Also agreed: the auditors assigned for other things to consider how to make satisfaction to John Perraunt and Anselm Hebbying, lately chamberlains, for their arrears of $\pounds 8$ 6s. 11½d. due to them on their last account.

Also the expenses met by Geoffrey Ponyng on the city's business, viz. $\pounds 2$ 5s., were allowed to him.

Also agreed: Geoffrey Ponyng and John Knyght, the city serjeants, to have the common weigh-beam with its weights and appurtenances, paying yearly to the mayor 13s. 4d. And to William Devenysshe, the mayor's serjeant at mace, for his salary 13s. 4d.

451. Assembly: Saturday next after the Purification 30 Hen.VI [5 Feb. 1452].

Elected from the Twenty-Four elders for ordering etc.: Thomas Freman, William Swayn, Richard Payn, William Cnoll, John Hall, Symon Poy, Robert Cove, John Wyse 'draper', Nicholas Shute; elected from the Forty-Eight of the commoners to supervise etc.: John Mone 'gent', John Wheler', Henry Frende, Anselm Hebbyng, William Wotton, Robert Chynchon, Robert Meteyeve, John Dogode.

Also agreed and ordered: no carters or drivers of carts into the city to attach trailers (*ramos*) to their carts or wagons, which so attached or joined are commonly called 'dreyes', [or] to drive them within 'lez barrys' or enclosure (*æpta*) of the city. Nor is anyone in future to bring within the said bars or enclosure of the city on the saddles or

the backs of horses or pack-animals the long wooden packs which are commonly called 'trussys' or 'draguhtys' [sic] on pain of forfeiting the 'dreyys', 'trussys' or 'draughtys', so that the pavements of the city's streets are not broken up as previously by 'dreyys', 'trussys', or 'draughtys' of the kind, the banks of the common trenches are not destroyed, and the watercourses (*cursus aquar*') are not altered or blocked by the dragging of mud, as has happened. Advance notice of this matter is to be given by public proclamation.

In English, the spelling modernized here.], The king commandeth that all manner labouring men that hold not land and tenements, the which sufficeth to the occupation of half a ploughland, go into service, and that stewards of franchises and constables put all such manner men in service at the request of such men as would have their service according to the statutes thereof made, upon the pain contained in the same statutes, the which is $\pounds 10$ upon the constable for every default; and that all manner artificers go to their craft upon the pain contained in the statute thereof made; and that all stewards of franchises, mayors, constables, bailiffs, and tithingmen of cities, boroughs, hundreds, and towns within the shire of Wilts. arrest or do arrest all manner vagrants, vagabonds, and beggars begging out of the hundred wherein they dwell without the king's authority or warrant, according to the statute thereof made, and if they find not such surety that they send them to the gaol there to abide according to the statute thereof made; and that thereof made; and that none of the king's liegemen give no

beggars begging out of the hundred that they they dwell in none good without they have sufficient warrant by the king's authority, or according to the statutes thereupon made, upon pain containing [sic] in the said statutes, and that all manner labourers and servants take such wages as is ordained by the statute; and that all constables make the due sessions of the peace, holden four times by year according to the statutes; and that they bring in their certificates at the sessions of the peace holden within the said shire; if any man find him[self] aggrieved upon the said officers because they do not duly the execution of the premises or any of them, that he come to the justices of the peace of the said shire sitting in the sessions and complain him thereof, and they shall do him remedy according to the statutes.

The charter was committed to W. Shirle, William Waryn, and William Lord [in London *interlined*] to defend the wrongs [done] by Reginald Kynggesbrigge against William Waryn and William Bisshup, who had possession of the cottages in the community's name, and with the assent of the said citizens it was delivered to Thomas Daly to be carried there, and there was given to him ½ mark by Robert Gilbert one of the chamberlains for his expense and work. And the said charter was replaced and delivered by William Lord, and along with other muniments it remains in the chest at the 'counseilhous'.

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
